

RECLAMATION BILL WILL BE PRESSED

Secretary Fall for \$20,000,000
Emergency Fund.

EARLY PASSAGE SOUGHT

Period of Unemployment and Low
Costs Held Opposite to Start
Western Projects.

THE OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, D. C., Oct. 29.—Secretary of Interior Fall informed Senator McNary over the telephone this afternoon that his department is intensely interested in the passage of the McNary emergency reclamation bill providing for the advance of \$20,000,000 to the reclamation fund for use on present government irrigation projects in the west as a means of carrying out the recommendations of the president's unemployment conference.

Secretary Fall said the money could be used to good advantage at this time in advancing the construction of many projects and at the same time, in his opinion, would solve much of the problem of unemployment by putting to work on most of the old projects, some of which could be completed during the coming winter.

It was learned today that the president had been solicited to get behind the McNary emergency bill and reports were that he was favorably inclined toward the measure.

With the opening of the regular session of congress only one month away, western senators and managers are beginning to bear themselves out on legislative questions affecting the west. The house committee on irrigation is expected to report out three reclamation measures early next week and then let it be decided as to the order in which the house shall take them up.

Another Conference Set.

Two of these bills were introduced in the house by Representative Smith of Idaho. One corresponds to the McNary emergency reclamation bill providing a loan of \$20,000,000 to the reclamation fund and was offered in the house some days before Mr. McNary put in his bill. The other Smith bill is similar to the McNary \$250,000,000 bill.

The third measure, introduced by Representative Bankhead of Alabama, would appropriate \$300,000,000 to be used both in western arid land reclamation and in the reclamation of swamp land in the south.

Western republican senators will hold another meeting Monday afternoon to go over proposed legislation on western agricultural products and it is expected that at this gathering all rates to be asked in the senate finance committee will be agreed upon.

McMINNVILLE, Or., Oct. 29.—(Special.)—The Yamhill County Teachers' institute closed here yesterday after a three-day session. All the schools of the county have been closed to permit the teachers to attend and the registration reached 219. Many addresses were given by state educators.

The programme for the institute was divided into two parts, the general assemblies and the departmental work.

PRICES WILL BE PROBED

Student Committee to Investigate
Co-operative Store Charges.

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Oct. 29.—(Special.)—Prices charged for supplies by the students' co-operative store will be compared with those in Portland and the committee appointed to investigate conditions in the organization.

The 50-cent fee charged for members who are entitled to dividends will be eliminated and every college student who buys from the store will get the receipts necessary for the rebate of 10 per cent. These dividends will be paid before the end of the spring term instead of next fall, as heretofore, indicated the report of the committee of investigation at student body meeting.

ago, would not save its candidate from defeat, but instead would insure a majority, based on the unofficial compilation, probably in excess of 11,000. The returns were well in excess of 200,000, and may amount to 210,000, or slightly higher.

Kitchen of Siskiyou for commissioner of agriculture and labor. The present incumbents are William Lemke, attorney-general, and J. N. Hagen, commissioner.

MOTHER ACCUSES SONS

FAILURE TO CONTRIBUTE TO
SUPPORT CHARGED.

Frank Rhodes and Charles J. Oglesby, reputed to be in comfortable circumstances, will face charges of failure to support their mother, Mrs. Frank Rhodes, 84 years, they having been arrested late Friday on a warrant obtained by Miss Lida O'Brien, deputy district attorney, under provisions of a law which drew up and which was passed by the last legislature. Conviction allows a maximum penalty of one year in jail and fine of \$1000.

April 18, 1919, the two men were ordered, together with other children of Mrs. Rhodes, to pay \$25 a month toward her support. There were eight children, but two were not in circumstances permitting them to pay. Frank Rhodes, who reports to live in Milwaukee and own a farm at Escanaba, has paid nothing since that date, according to Miss O'Brien, and Charles J. Oglesby, who lives at Roy, Or., has paid nothing since January 1.

The other children ordered to pay were: George B. Oglesby of Colton, Or.; Mrs. Lilly Barracough of San Francisco; Sherman Rhodes of Heaverton and Mrs. Jane Irwin Novel of Portland. The latter is said to be paying nothing. Mrs. Barracough, who has been working as a chambermaid in California for \$30 a month, sends her mother \$5 a month regularly. The children who were in circumstances which prevented their helping their aged parent were S. J. Oglesby and Mrs. Anna Bales of Turner, Or.

Mrs. Rhodes is now at the Plagah home, where she was taken at the instance of Miss O'Brien, who did not wish her to be compelled to go to the county poor farm.

OWN TEACHER IS TAUGHT

Initiation Requires Girl to Give Instruction to Professor.

PACIFIC UNIVERSITY, Forest Grove, Or., Oct. 29.—(Special.)—The unusual experience of giving her own vocal instruction to a professor was the lot of Miss Jean McLean, a sophomore from Alamo, yesterday, when she gave the instruction to C. W. Lawrence, director of the conservatory, before a crowd that filled his studio to the doors.

Miss McLean did it as part of her initiation into Kappa Delta society and Professor Lawrence took his medicine well. He sang all the scales in variations of the past, in honor of his small daughter Jane, a recent addition to his family, and his lesson was ended by singing "Silver Threads Among the Gold."

He says his time was well spent because he attempted to show his pupil-teacher where her own faults lay by singing for her like she did for him when she took the lessons. He added that Miss McLean was making exceptional progress.

Convicted Murderer to Be Taken to
Penitentiary Tomorrow.

SALEM, Or., Oct. 29.—(Special.)—Dr. R. M. Brumfield, convicted murderer of Dennis Russell, will be brought to the state penitentiary here immediately following the passing of sentence next Monday by Judge Bingham at Roseburg. This announcement was made here today by George Neuner, district attorney of Douglas county.

District Attorney Neuner said a motion for a new trial for Dr. Brumfield would be argued Monday morning. Attorneys for the defendant then will file notice of appeal to the supreme court.

FIRST STOCK TRAIN ARRIVES FOR SHOW

Tillamook's Display Marks
Beginning of Influx.

MORE TRAINS ARE ON WAY

Passenger Specials With Number
of Distinguished Visitors Are
Routed to Portland.

The arrival yesterday of a special train of livestock exhibits from Tillamook marked the beginning of the big inpouring of champion cattle, horses, swine, sheep and goats which will continue throughout the coming week at the Pacific International Livestock exposition's ten-acre pavilion at North Portland, to compete for the \$75,000 in cash premiums which are to be awarded during the approaching stock show November 5-12. The Tillamook special brought five carloads of Holsteins, Guernseys and Jerseys which were unloaded yesterday morning and immediately assigned to the stalls reserved for them in the big dairy section.

General Manager Plummer was notified by Assistant Traffic Manager Henahaw of the Southern Pacific company that a special livestock exhibit train of 26 or more cars will leave San Francisco tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock and will be sent through on passenger schedule, arriving here at 2 A. M. on Wednesday, making the trip in 40 hours.

Special passengers coming.

This special will bring the winning exhibits from the California International Livestock show, which has just closed at San Francisco. There will be 15 cars of cattle, five cars of draft horses, jacks and Jennets, one car of swine and one or more cars of night horse show horses.

General Freight Agent Mulchay has sent Portland representatives to San Francisco to bring this train north. Two special trains, one over the O.-W. R. & N. railroad and the other of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle line will leave Spokane on Thursday, bringing livestock exhibits from the Western Royal Livestock show, which closes Wednesday, and arrangements are being made by Chester Mulkey of Portland for special transportation of exhibits coming from the west side of the Willamette valley.

Besides the livestock specials, several special passenger trains will come to the Pacific International, among these being a Post-Intelligencer special of many Pullman which will leave Seattle over the Union Pacific lines at midnight, November 7, bringing visitors from Seattle and points north, to the Pacific International on the morning of November 8, to participate in the Governor's day celebration at the stock show.

On the same morning a party of 32 eastern Holstein breeders and capitalists, including Frank O. Lowden, ex-governor of Illinois, will arrive in two private Pullmans which will leave Chicago on Friday night.

Arrangements have been made by the Pacific International management for an advance sale of reserved seats for the various night horse shows and matinees. The seat sale opened yesterday at Sherman, Clay & Co's, Broadway at Morrison, where reservations may be made for any of the nine horse shows in advance.

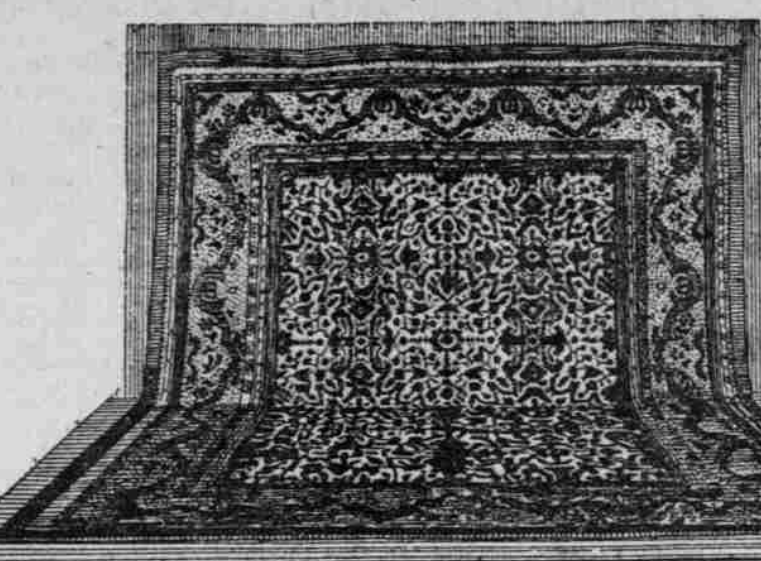
