

MR. HUNTLEY TO BE SEATED ON TUESDAY

M. A. Miller Moves from Internal Revenue Office.

MANY EMPLOYEES TO STAY

Civil Service Protects 60 Per Cent, but Field Deputies Eventually Will Be Replaced.

Clyde G. Huntley will take the oath of office and become collector of internal revenue for Oregon Tuesday morning at 9 o'clock. M. A. Miller, who has held the office for the last eight years, was busy yesterday removing the last of his personal effects, his library and his gallery of pictures. Today the office will complete its checking, so that when Mr. Huntley steps in Tuesday morning everything will be in readiness for him.

Only one appointment that Mr. Huntley contemplates is known. John W. Cochran, who has been serving as assistant secretary of state, resigned that post a few days ago in anticipation of becoming chief clerk to Mr. Huntley. He will succeed Jack Letell, present chief clerk. In course of time there will be other changes in the office and in the field division, but when or how many changes will be made Mr. Huntley is not prepared to say. Eventually all of the field deputies will go, for these field men are political appointees and the present crew consists of democrats. They will have to make way for republicans. The field deputies require special qualifications, for they must be expert accountants as well as possess a thorough familiarity with the ruling of the department with respect to the income tax laws.

Civil Service Holds Many. About 60 per cent more of all the men and women in the office of collector of internal revenue are under regulation civil service. These places are not subject to change at the political administration at Washington. However, Mr. Huntley has a mountainous stack of letters containing applications from party workers.

When George U. Piper will succeed Will Moore as collector of customs is not known. Mr. Piper has been confirmed, but his commission and oath of office have not arrived. These documents will be forwarded to the office of collector of customs after Mr. Piper's bond has been approved, and Mr. Piper will be notified when his commission is placed in the mail. When it arrives in Portland Collector Moore will so notify Mr. Piper. Then all the new appointees have to do is to take the oath of office, blank walk up to the federal building and have one of the federal judges swear him in. After that he takes charge of the office. There is no complicated checking out in the office of collector of customs, as in the case with collector of internal revenue.

E. N. Wheeler Confirmed. Word has been received by Collector Moore that E. N. Wheeler's appointment as appraiser has been confirmed and that his commission is on the way. Mr. Wheeler is the only one of the new federal appointees who does not have to furnish a surety bond to the government. Why this exception is made no one knows. When Mr. Wheeler's commission arrives he has only to take the oath and begin drawing pay. He probably will assume his new duties next Tuesday. Mr. Wheeler has no patronage and Mr. Piper's staff consists of civil service employees with the exception of a watchman.

Throughout the state the newly confirmed registers and collectors of the land offices are preparing to go to the job November 1. There will be little patronage left to dispose of by the senatorial delegation except the postmasterhips. Almost any day now word is expected from Washington relative to the postmaster of Portland, as the reports of the inspectors who investigated all applicants have been in the hands of the department for some time.

ST. JOHNS WILL BENEFIT

Telephone Improvements Include Better Service for District.

Among the improvements which the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company is making in Portland are complete changes in the telephone service between St. Johns and Portland. This is included in the total expenditure of \$3,500,000 to cover a period of nearly three years. The improvement for the North Portland industrial center will begin shortly. The first unit of the change to the machine-actuating system will cause large additions and alterations in the St. Johns, Woodlawn and Alberta districts.

Telephone numbers of subscribers in the Columbia office in the North Portland district are to have the prefix "Columbia" Directory cut goes will be shown in the December issue. Part of the programme this year includes assigning of overlapping boundary lines caused by the consolidation of the automatic and manual telephone systems.

Among the changes to be made will be the Woodlawn prefix to Walnut.

DR. SCHOLZ TO SPEAK

Whitman Gets Reed President for Armistice Day Programme.

WHITMAN COLLEGE, Walla Walla, Wash., Oct. 29.—(Special.)—Dr. Richard F. Scholz, newly inaugurated president of Reed college, and professor of history and international

relations at the University of Washington, has accepted an invitation from Whitman college to speak at Whitman the morning of Armistice day, November 11, in connection with an all-college Armistice day programme.

Formal exercises observing the day will be held in the college chapel, with President Scholz delivering the principal address. Special musical numbers and several brief talks on the significance of the day will be among other features of the programme.

In the afternoon a football game between Whitman and Whitman will be played at Whitman on Ankeny field.

SALEM PIANIST AT HOME

MISS WINNIFRED BYRD PREPARING FOR CONCERTS.

Talented Oregon Girl to Spend November in Tour of Cities of Pacific Northwest.

SALEM, Oct. 29.—(Special.)—Miss Winnifred Byrd, talented pianist and daughter of Dr. W. H. Byrd, has arrived in Salem from the east and is "tremendously busy," to quote her own words, preparing for her concert tour, which starts about November 1. Since her arrival in Oregon Miss Byrd has attended a number of social functions arranged in her honor.

"I am tired from my long journey, but am delighted to get back to Oregon," Miss Byrd said. Although a definite schedule for Miss Byrd's appearances in Oregon and Idaho has not yet been completed, it is probable that she will be presented in a number of the larger cities of the Pacific northwest. Her date for Portland has been definitely fixed for November 9 at the Helix theater. It was announced today that W. H. Fangle will have charge of her northwest tour. It is Miss Byrd's present intention to spend the entire month of November in the northwest and leave early in December for her eastern engagements.

She was born in New York and spent the first 15 years of her life in Salem. She then went to the New England conservatory of music in Boston, where she studied for several years under Carl Baermann. Subsequently she studied in Berlin, under Teresa Carreno, recognized as the greatest woman pianist in the world. The following winter Miss Byrd made her first appearance in New York City.

"Unhappily she entered the arena of New York and at her first performance made the tired and somewhat blasé music critics of the New York dailies sit up and take notice," said one of the leading newspapers of the east.

PATRIOTIC FETE PLANNED

ARMISTICE DAY CELEBRATION TO SET NEW MARK.

Military Planes to Fly Over Line of Parade—10,000 Expected to Join Marchers.

Portland will see on Armistice day the greatest military demonstration in its history if the plans of those in charge mature in any near degree to their expectations. Military airplanes will fly over the parade as it marches through the city. The Vancouver barracks, national guards, auxiliary organizations and a dozen spectacular features will make up the demonstration.

One of the interesting sections in the parade will be the allied battalion made up of 500 soldiers from the allied armies—English, New Zealanders, Canadians, French, Belgians, Italians and Australians. More than 10,000 ex-soldiers are expected to march. The units from Vancouver and the national guard will march with complete field equipment, consisting of artillery pieces, machine guns, escort wagons and all paraphernalia used by an army in the field.

At the same moment the unknown soldier ceremonies are being started in Washington the Boy Scouts will sound taps on their bugles at street intersections. At this signal the public will either salute or stand uncovered in tribute to the soldier dead.

As soon as the parade is over the programme in the municipal auditorium will begin. The principal attraction is to be delivered by Chaplain W. S. Gilbert, and it is probable that Frank Lowden, ex-governor of Illinois, also will talk to the assembly. Other speakers will be Rear-Admiral Henry T. Mayo, Governor Olcott and Mayor Baker.

Police Force Found Unnecessary.

ANACONDA, Mont., Oct. 29.—Arrests have become so few in Anacoda during the past few months the city council has decided to disband the police force.

Law and order is now being preserved by the county sheriff and his deputies. Should it become necessary, the police force will be reinstated. Anacoda has a population of 10,000 and claims to be one of the largest smelter towns in the world.

Idaho Gets Farm Loan Agency.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 29.—Establishment of agricultural loan agencies in Idaho and New Mexico was announced today by the federal farm corporation. Crawford Moore was named chairman of the Idaho agency with headquarters at Boise, Idaho.

LEGION COMMITTEE FOR JAPANESE BAN

Report Favors Practical Exclusion of Immigrants.

FEDERAL ACTION WANTED

Resolution to Come Up This Week for Action by Members of National Convention.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Oct. 29.—Practical exclusion of the Japanese immigrant by a new international agreement based on mutual respect and reciprocal in nature was recommended in the report of the American Legion's oriental committee, to be submitted to the national convention next week.

The report, a statement by the committee said, is the result of exhaustive investigations made at the direction of last year's convention. The report described Japan's immigration as "unassimilable." The instances in which the Japanese in other countries have become assimilated, the report said, "are almost non-existent."

"We find that in places where there has been a large influx of Japanese in proportion to other populations, the Japanese, as citizens of Japan, incline to become dominant, and certainly are a great detriment to the people originally inhabiting the country."

Economic Bars Great. "The difference in the economic conditions and methods between the Japanese and the people now in the United States is so diverse that it is bound to create even worse friction than it might in any other country where the conditions are more similar."

Declaring that sentiment in Pacific coast states was found to be almost unalterably opposed to permitting naturalization of Japanese, the report said:

"We feel strongly that the handling of this question is a matter that should be dealt with by the national government rather than by state governments, and we believe that the state governments feel the situation themselves. We are sure it is a fundamental right of the United States to say who may and may not be immigrants. It seems to us clear that a new agreement should be made with Japan; that it should be reciprocal and based on a feeling of mutual respect and fairness. The right of acquiring and owning property by the nationals of each country in the other should be properly safeguarded and restricted in order that alien ownership may not furnish a basis of conflict between the two peoples."

Tourist Visas Favored. "There should be permitted freedom for the nationals of each country to visit the other as tourists, scholars or visitors for pleasure or study, but we feel positive that at present it is both undesirable and impossible that there should be any intermingling on a large scale."

The report said that in view of the Washington conference, it felt it would be injudicious for us to say anything that might embarrass our government.

Memories Are Recalled.

Here and there in the groups were seen men leaning on crutches or limping, and many of them wearing medals and frequently pale faces would light up with animation as one or another would call to mind some feat of heroism performed by "Yanks."

Frequently members of a group would crowd their way aside to give a hug and a handshake to a new arrival.

Particularly colorful was a western group of ex-service men who wore high boots, sombreros and flannel shirts of vivid hues. Members of each state delegation sought by means of slight dress or ornament to make themselves distinctive. Tomorrow the first of the noted foreign military men who will attend the convention are to arrive.

General Diaz of Italy and General Baron Jacques of Belgium. Elaborate welcoming ceremonies have been arranged.
