ASSURED BIG CROWDRecord Attendance Expected
for Homecoming Classic.

INTEREST AT HIGH PITCH

Eugene Will Enter Practically
Same Lineup as Held Down
Cougars to Tie Score.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Nov. 12.—(Special.)—Oregon is preparing for the biggest homecoming in the history of the university. Applications for reserved seats at the big game next Saturday against the Oregon Aggies have been pouring in from all parts of the northwest. It looks as if a record crowd will be on hand.

Graduate Manager Benefiel says applications for reservations have been rolling in since the game at Pullman, a week ago, in which the Cougars and Oregon battled to a 7-to-7 tie.

Only one night this week has Coach Huntington let his team practice in public, and that was at the time of the big pep rally Thursday. The first scrimmage of the week was held Thursday night and Friday also was devoted to scrimmage workouts. Huntington does not believe in long and strenuous scrimmage workouts this late in the season. His programme this week has consisted mainly of kicking and passing the ball and light signal practice.

Lineup Practically Settled.

Monday night will see the start of the final rounding out process for the game with the Aggies. It is not likely that there will be many changes in the lineup which battled the Cougars to a 7-to-7 tie score at Pullman. The coaches were so pleased with the team that day that they will put their trust in the same combination against the Aggies.

The coaches have been drilling a few new plays, some of which will be used against the Aggies. The pet play and the one about which the greatest secrecy hinges, is called the "dream play" by the members of the squad. Huntington has been trying this play on the squad and apparently is satisfied with it. Its origin is responsible for its name. 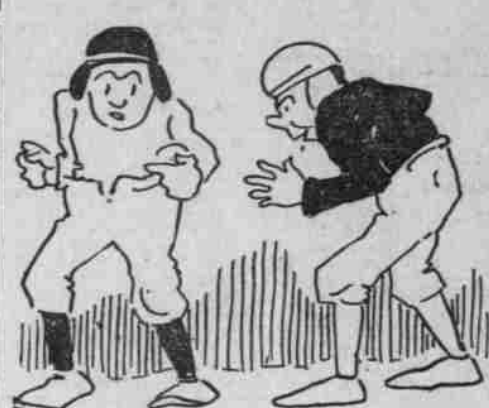

EUGENE CONTEST PROMISES

WHAT happened at Corvallis Friday makes this game at Eugene next Saturday the real "big game" of the year in fact as well as tradition. It's funny how these things worked out. Three weeks ago the Aggies looked like near-champions of the world and Oregon seemed to have nothing. Since then the Aggies have absorbed two defeats, while Oregon has bucked up wonderfully.

Any team that can hold that powerful Washington State outfit to a 7-to-7 tie, and make its touchdown, besides, on straight line bucking, must have something. Oregon did that a week ago. Coach Huntington's green team seemed suddenly to find itself. Sometimes a team does that and becomes invincible. Huntington has said from the first that if his green hands ever did "catch on" they would surprise folks, and they seem to have "caught on" at last.

On their comparative showings against Washington State, that seems to give Oregon a very slight edge over the Aggies. And yet we absolutely decline to do up this game on that angle or any other. Sometimes a football game runs true to the so-called dope. This one never does. For this game, as we have remarked before, there is no dope.

The very fact that Oregon now has a slight edge ought to please the supporters of both eleven. It is the history of this annual game that whenever the Aggies seemed to have

CALIFORNIA BEARS
CRUSH WASHINGTONSouthern Grid Machine Runs
Up 72-to-3 Score.

DROP-KICK LONE TALLY

Northerners' Line Is Like Sieve Before Onslaught of Powerful
Football Eleven.

BERKELEY, Cal., Nov. 12.—California overwhelmed Washington, 72 to 3, in a Pacific coast conference game here today, almost squaring up a 72-to-0 defeat the northerners gave the Bears here in 1915. Today's total was the largest the undefeated California machine has made this season. Washington's team, only a shadow of the great northern eleven of six years ago, was helpless before the charging California backs, and on the defensive was almost at the mercy of the Bear line men, who broke through and smothered nearly every Sun Dodger attempt. Only one play, a delayed quarterback run, was able to gain anything against California. Washington made no attempts at forward passing.

Nisbet made the only California touchdown scored in the first quarter, and Barnes added two to the total by tackling Hall behind the Washington line for a safety. In the second period the Bear offensive started, and three touchdowns were made, two by Nichols and one by Dunn. In this period the lone northern tally was made, when Wilson sent over a drop kick after Washington had intercepted a punt.

In the third period Morrison went over for the only touchdown, but in the last quarter he went across four times and Bell once. The last touchdown, which made the score 72, was made on a play which started just before the game ended and was finished after the gun sounded.

Morrison and Toomey were the only regulars in the California lineup in the last period. In all, California used 17 substitutes.

For Washington, "Ham" Greene, negro half back, played one of the best defensive games ever seen on California field. Captain Eckman, Washington's sensational open field runner, was unable to get away for any gains. Lineup and summary:

First Period.

The California machine sent its first touchdown over the Washington goal eight minutes after the game opened.

After an exchange of punts between Nisbet, California and Wilson, Washington, the Bears settled down to line work and from the Sun Dodgers 40-yard line advanced by line bucks and end runs to goal. Nisbet taking the ball over and Erb kicking goal.

California added two points to its total when Hall was tackled behind his own line for a safety. After Barnes kicked one of Wilson's five-yard punts, Erb kicked goal for another goal. The ball having been advanced another exchange of punts followed by a forward pass and driven by Nisbet and Toomey against the northern center and right tackle.

Second Period.

The Bear drive was continued in the second period and Nichols, on the first play, a six-yard run, scored the first point. After a punt by Toomey, Erb kicked goal. On the next drive toward the goal, lower end, the Bears were successful, forward passing and a five-yard line, where it was in California's possession as the half ended.

Third Period.

More than half the California regulars had been replaced by substitutes when the third period opened. Washington's defense differed at the opening of this quarter and twice held the charging Bears when inside the 10-yard line. On one of the first plays Toomey sent a 40-yard run by Nichols to Washington's 12-yard line, where the ball was kicked over the five-yard line, but there held forcing California to lose on downs. A few minutes later, when the Bears were again on the Washington 50-yard line, but lost it when Washington intercepted a forward pass. On the next drive toward the goal, lower end, the Bears were successful, forward passing and a five-yard line, where it was in California's possession as the half ended.

Fourth Period.

The first period opened with a plunge by Morrison over the line. Cline kicked goal.

California made it 51 to 3 in the last period, when the Bears took a kick on the 25-yard line and from there made the goal on line bucks. Bell, Morrison and Van Bent carrying the ball. Morrison took it over. Cline kicked the goal.

Washington's defense crumbled in the fourth period and California made 12 touchdowns in five minutes. Morrison taking the ball over both times. The Bears' back went through the northern defense at will. Cline kicked both goals.

California made it 72 to 3, just as the gun sounded for the close of the game, Bell taking the ball over.
