HEIFETZ, NOTED VIOLINIST, WINS BIG AUDIENCE IN SAN FRANCISCO

Musicians Expected to Appear Before Packed House at Helig Theater Wednesday Evening.

HEIFETZ is expected to play to a packed house on Wednesday evening at the Helig, when he opens the Steers & Coman subscription series for the season of 1921-22. He gave his first recital in San Francisco last Sunday to a more than sold-out house. Of this concert the San Francisco Bulletin of November 7 says:

"Jacsa Heifetz, high priest of music, was taken to the heart of San Francisco at the Century theater yesterday afternoon, with unprecedented acceptance. There may have been greater acclaim elsewhere in his world tour, but none more intense than the west's musical metropolis laid upon the shrine of his perfectly genuine, complete adoration and appreciation.

"There never was any question from the first minute that San Francisco was waiting with open eagerness for the return of the super-violinist, and that it was eager with a more than detached musical hunger. Only the limitation of birth the mere fact that one can be born only in one place—stands in the way of all the world claiming this young man for its very own.

"The world prize was widely apparent in the faces of the immense audience yesterday afternoon, and provided for Heifetz the harmonic medium which is the setting of resistance of every artist's heart. It was more than a sold-out house. Even the stage was scientifically packed with the overflow, which a will programme and eases could not satisfy.

Three history contests, two competitive and one non-competitive, were announced yesterday to the students of Reed college by George L. Koehn, professor of history. Two of the contests are being sponsored by the Knights of Columbus historical commission and are national in scope, while the other is the annual C. C. Beckman history contest, presented by the Oregon Historical society, and is limited to history students in Oregon.

The purpose of both the Knights of Columbus contests is "to encourage investigation into the origins, the achievements and the problems of the United States." The subjects suggested by the commission are various and range from the conditions surrounding the European nations in the era of Columbus to present-day problems confronting this nation. The monographs need not necessarily be based upon international relations, but national in aspect.

There will be five prizes offered and the contestants have been classified in like number. Class A, which carries with it a prize of \$300, is offered to professors and instructors in history or social sciences of the colleges of this country; class B, \$200, to specialists in history or social sciences; class C, \$100, to scholars and graduate students who have access to the universities, libraries and archives of the nations south of the United States and are to limit their monographs to the international relations of these republics; class D, \$100, school superintendents and teachers; and class E, \$50, to undergraduates of the United States.

The subject announced this year by the Oregon Historical society is "The Discovery of the Columbia River" and is limited to students in private and public schools and colleges and universities in Oregon between the ages of 15 and 18. Four prizes will be given ranging in value from \$50 to \$30.

The non-competitive contest announced by the Knights of Columbus historical commission is based upon the same subjects as the competitive contest and will give the contestants a compensation.

The judges for awarding the prizes are Gaillard Hunt of the state department, Chairman; Professor Frederick A. Cleveland, Boston university; Professor David A. McCabe, Princeton university; Frank L. Cobb, editor of the New York World, and John H. Edmonds, chief of the archives division of the commonwealth of Massachusetts.

12 RHODES COMPETITORS

Five Oregon Institutions Represented in Contestants.

The committee of selection for the Rhodes scholarships will have 12 men from which to make their selections. The Oregonians are the names of the contestants have been in the hands of the Oregon secretary since October 29 and they represent five Oregon and higher institutions of learning. Willamette university, Oregon Agricultural college and the University of Oregon have entered three contestants each; Reed college two, and Pacific university one.

The candidates from Willamette are Lawrence E. Davies, Paul H. Doney and Bruce E. White; from Oregon Agricultural college, Paul H. Emmet, Linus Pauling and Orlando E. Romig; from Oregon, Norman T. Byrne, Kemy M. Cox and Arthur C. Hicks; from Reed, Thomas Brockway and Blair Stewart; and from Pacific, Francis E. Taylor. The committees of selection will grant each candidate a personal interview and will make final selections on December 2. The final selections will be based upon the character and leadership, the literary and scholarly ability, and attainments, and interest in outdoor sports of each candidate.

STUDENTS TALK OF ARMS

Delegates From 700 Religious Colleges Called in Conference.

CHICAGO, Nov. 12.—A disarrangement conference, at which student delegates from 700 religious colleges in the United States will meet here November 13 and 14, has been arranged by Dr. A. W. Harris of New York, secretary of the board of education of the Methodist Episcopal church. The meeting is called by the boards of education of the Protestant churches, in co-operation with the council of church boards of education, the bureau of education of the Catholic hierarchy, the educational section of the conference of American rabbis, the Y. M. C. A. and the Y. W. C. A.

C. A. The opening session will be held tonight and will be inspirational.

Dr. Harris in calling the meeting for disarrangement says: "To the youth of the land now in college and high school the significance of President Harding's attempt may be vastly greater than to any men of middle age or old age. To these younger men it means a vast change in mechanical and financial conditions, and it may mean the sacrifice of life in military service of multitudes of young men now in the schools, or of their children.

"No part of the community has a better right to speak than those who initiate the burdens and meet the troubles of the future.

"Believing this, I determined to call a convention of our schools, colleges and foundations, to meet in the city of Chicago to consider the problems of disarrangement, and to take such action as might seem appropriate. On my suggestion, the secretaries of other church boards have joined me and will send out a similar invitation to their institutions to be represented in this same convention.

SOCIAL PROGRAMME INAUGURATED AT NORMAL.

OREGON NORMAL SCHOOL, Monmouth, Nov. 12.—(Special).—With the largest enrollment of any year in its history, the Oregon Normal school at Monmouth has inaugurated a new social programme. The school has a number of changes which will benefit the students. New customs have been inaugurated by the student body.

The literary societies are giving public programmes which require extensive preparation twice each month in the chapel.
