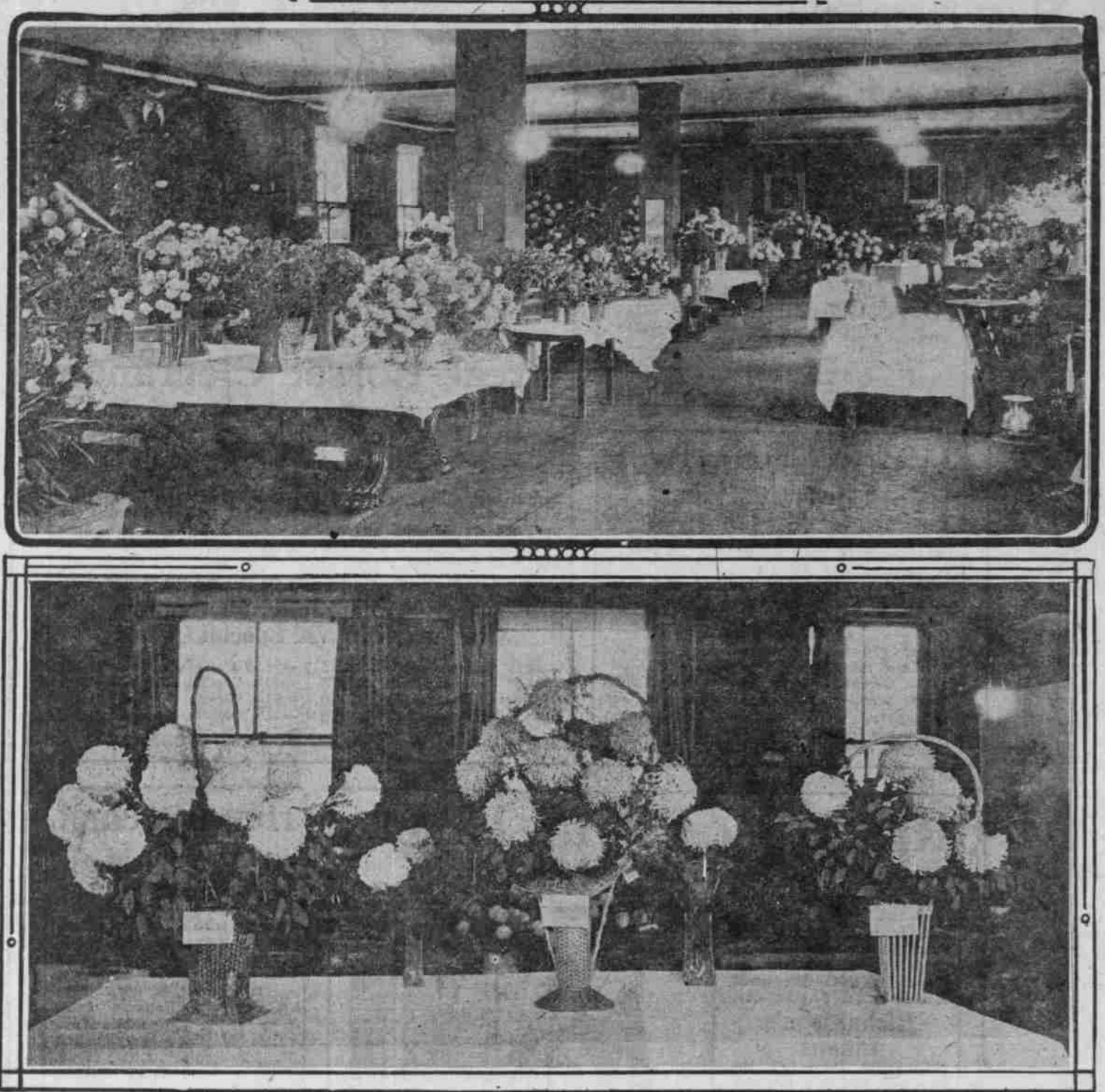


PORTLAND'S CHRYSANTHEMUM SHOW IS REMARKABLE FOR BEAUTY, CULTURAL SKILL AND SYSTEM OF ARRANGEMENT

Jesse A. Curry, Horticulturist and Rose Expert, Pays Tribute to Quality of Exhibits—View Is Expressed That City Will Have Nothing to Fear From Outside Competition—Blending of Colors Indicates Oregon Florists Have Artistic Touch and Originality.

THE Portland chrysanthemum show held last week in the Green room of the Chamber of Commerce was a most remarkable showing of flowers, declared Jesse A. Curry, Portland horticulturist and rose expert, in a report made to Chairman Oscar M. Smith, in charge of the show. Mr. Curry's report will be laid before the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce.

The report paid a high tribute to the work of Oregon flower growers and expressed the belief that they need not fear competition with growers from any other section of the country.

"The show as a whole is a most remarkable exhibition of blooms and plants, and although I have visited hundreds of flower shows throughout the country and frequently been called on as a judge, I feel that our local growers have nothing to fear if ever placed in competition with the growers of the city," said Mr. Curry's report. "While the show is not large as flower shows go, it is as large as could be held in such a room, but the striking thing about the display is the remarkable finish to the blooms and the wide variety shown."

Display Shows Skill.

"Every display shows advanced cultural skill, and the arrangement and blending of colors demonstrate that the Oregon florists have not only the artistic touch, but also the originality which brings out the ringings of an exhibition. The exhibition is a striking lesson that when we have the 1925 exposition the florists of Portland should have a big place in it, not only for the display of blooms, but also the handling of the grounds and horticultural display. I want to suggest now that, as Oregon can produce flowers continuously through the period, the directors of the exposition should include in their program at least three large flower shows, starting with roses in June, followed later with dahlias, and then a chrysanthemum show."

In a report of this kind it would be impossible to go into the details of the various exhibits, but there are some striking notes to which I wish to direct your attention. The displays of Fred M. Young and the Sweetland flower shop, which adjoin each other, is a remarkable blending of colors and blooms and is especially noteworthy. The color combinations secured by the Tonsch Floral company in their two small table baskets topped off by the big basket of yellow chrysanthemums demonstrated great artistic skill in arrangement. Of all carnation displays I have witnessed, including the big one in Washington by experts of the department of horticulture, I have seen anything to equal from a cultural standpoint those shown by Weideman Bros. and their new carnation, "November Dignity." I feel that a big future for it is a real pleasing shade of pink, but its real value comes from its great size and the apparent long stems on which it grows. The new unnamed red carnation by the Van Kirk Carnation company is also, I feel, a very fine specimen, for it has remarkable brilliancy. The center piece of the show, the large table of roses and orchids by Martin & Forbes certainly adds to the reputation of Mr. Martin as an expert rose grower. The Crusader roses in the center indicate that this new rose has not been overrated in the announcements of its introducers and the vase of May Martin roses, strictly an Oregon product produced by Mr. Martin, shows why this rose is in such demand by growers of this country.

"Mr. Clancy of Salem upholds the reputation for originality and the combination of dark red and yellow chrysanthemums with the striped Scotch broom branches dyed in varying shades produced a most happy combination. All of the blooms in Mr. Clancy's exhibits were well finished and showed his skill as a grower."

"Niklas & Son's table baskets showed originality of composition and blending, the one in yellow and pink being a collection of the most harmonious tones of these two colors. Their basket of straw flowers brings a new note into floral culture in Oregon, for in years past it has been considered that California has a monopoly on this class, but Mr. Niklas has shown that blooms of this type of better brilliancy can be produced in Oregon better than further south."

"It would be impossible to go into the details of the display of Clarke Bros., which occupied the northwest corner of the room, for every flower shown the greatest cultural skill, the big vase basket of deep bronze bells, strikingly good. In the pompons, due probably to haste in staging, one of the finest varieties of pink and yellow, I think, was hidden in the rear row. The striking note of this whole display was undoubtedly the mantle decoration and demonstrated how flowers can be made most appropriate. On the wall is an oil painting of Robert Burns and, smiling upon this as a note, the entire mantle was filled with Scotch heather, thistle and yellow roses, the color blending being most soft and wonderfully effective. I think this mantle effect was one of the most striking features of the entire show, the heather and other flowers not only exhibiting great skill in growing, but the arrangement displayed the highest artistic touch."

"The White Chieftain chrysanthemums shown by Mr. Cherry of La Grande I feel have never been equaled in any show I have ever attended. They were perfect as to size and color, shading from white at the tips to the dark rose reflex. Every bloom in this display was a finished flower, and I am free to say I never imagined there was a grower of Mr. Cherry's skill in eastern Oregon."

"For size and finish the white Turner chrysanthemums, shown by Joe Kioda, the Japanese grower, were most wonderful, and friends who saw them, and also the recent shows in Los Angeles and San Francisco, say they were not surpassed by any in those displays. The exhibit of pompons by the Nippon florists is worthy of more than passing mention and their novelty of a quill-like chrysanthemum in a bronze and gold tone was most striking."

"Summing up the entire display, I feel that every grower is worthy of mention and that the city of Portland has reason to be proud of its florists, and it certainly shows that floral culture in Portland is an industry worthy of the encouragement and support of every business man."

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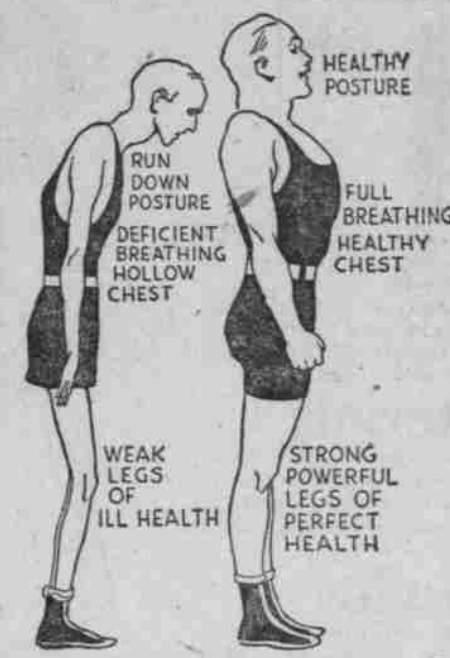
