## CITY PAVING PLANT DEFECTS REPORTED

Tax Body Advises Stricter Administrative Control.

OVERHEAD OMITTED IS

Many Expense Items Carried by Private Contractors Should Be Included, Says Report.

More rigid requirements and better control by the city council over the operations of the municipal paving plant are recommended to the tax suservision and conservation commisn in its report to the city council. In this report many defects in the poration of the paving plant are cointed out, and, while the time for nvestigation of the department of nunicipal activity was limited, a urther investigation during the com-ng year is promised by the commis-

The municipal paving plant, according to the commission's report, is operating as a particularly favored bidder, made so by the fact that many items of expense carried by private contractors and which should be included in the municipal paving plant's bas of expenses are ignored entirely. Overhead Is Omitted.

Such costs, including overhead of rent of offices, telephone service, lights, legal expense, taxes on its piant, office expense at the city hall and the cost of a "skeleton" force during the period when construction work cannot be carried on a new work cannot be carried on, is now carried by the general taxpayers of the city, according to the report. One Defect Corrected, Many of these deficiencies may be evercome, according to the report, if greater attention to administrative details and more rigid requirements with respect to financial matters are

carried out by the city council.

The commission corrected one defect of the paving plant accounting through the transfer to the plant overhead of one-half of the salary of the assistant to the commissioner of public works. The evidence to war-rant the transfer of other items now charged to the general fund to plant operation account, was not sufficient because of the short investigation that was made, the report stated.

The commission's report on the paving plant was brought to an end with the following conclusions:

with the following conclusions:

The statement has been made that the plant by its competition has succeeded in reducing contract prices of bituminous pavements. The evidence in possession of the commission was insufficient to warrant such a broad statement, for as indicated above, the plant charges for production omit certain substantial items which private contractors must include in their bids and the reduction in material and labor costs may have had much to do with apparent reductions in unit prices. It is unfair, of course, to consider final prices alone, for the plant is not required to show profit on its operations as contractors must do and the value of the produce cannot be determined short of two or three years more. The plant is operating as a particularly favored bidder, but it is existence serves to eliminate undue profits the plant, viewed solely as a construction againty, may have justified itself. There can be no criticism of the wisdom of using the plant as a repair agency, provided that the repair work is carried out with dispatch and at a time favorable to good and sufficient workmanchip, and that repair and construction operations are completely divorced by fluancing them through independent funds.


