

COLONEL HAMMOND LAUDS ARMY UNITY

Commander of 162d Infantry
Home From Capital.

BALANCED DEFENSE AIM

"One for All and All for One" De-
clared Slogan of Regulars, Na-
tional Guard and Reserves.

"One for all and all for one" the
pledge of The Three Musketeers, has
been made the slogan of the new
American army with the regulars,
the national guard and the reserves—
its unified components—according to
Colonel Creed C. Hammond, com-
manding officer of the 162d infantry,
Oregon national guard, who returned
home yesterday after an absence of
18 months in Washington, D. C. on
duty with the war department gen-
eral staff.

Colonel Hammond was the sole rep-
resentative for the eight regiments
states, comprising the ninth army
corps area among a dozen national
guard and reserve corps officers of
long service and broad experience,
who were called to duty with the
general staff following passage of
the national defense act. He served
part of the time with the war plans
division and later with the operations
and training division.

Balanced Defense Sought.

"After a careful examination of the
law and the desires of congress, and
with the friendly co-operation of the
general staff officers, who evinced
a keen interest and desire to carry
out the intention of congress and
to meet us more than half way, com-
mittees were formed consisting of
regular, guard and reserve officers,
the latter two forming a majority,"
reported Colonel Hammond.

"We took up a study of national
guard and national army history and
statistics, and the necessity of a
properly balanced force of all arms
for the national defense, so that in
the event of a major emergency all
that would be necessary would be
the quick and orderly expansion of
existing units to war strength, with-
out changing any unit from one arm
to another over night, as was done
to the disruption of the guard during
the world war.

"I made the distribution and allo-
cation of the guard (24,000) to the
states of the ninth corps area, which
was accepted by them at San Fran-
cisco a year ago.

"A couple of other guard officers
and myself spent considerable time
and study on a revision of the na-
tional guard regulations. Many
changes had to be made to meet the
requirements of the new law and
policies, and we from civil life were
given every opportunity to present
our views.

"Now that we have a definite mili-
tary policy, you can say that the
guard and reserves have a definite
place and mission as vital components
of the army of the United States. An
actual mobilization of 2,000 men
for a major emergency would, in the
three field armies, consist of one-
sixth regulars, two-sixths guards, and
three-sixths reserves. The first three
components would be called right off
the bat, and the last as soon as pos-
sible thereafter.

"Guards are available at all times for
call in peace or war, at home or over-
seas, while the reserves are a war
force only.

"Every war plan, on any front, con-
templates the use of the guard in any
emergency too large for the regulars,
and likewise in any regular war
too large for the regulars and guards
to handle will call out the reserves, so
you see the guards and reserves are
vital forces in all war plans.

"The guard is particularly fortu-
nate in having Major General Rick-
ards as chief of militia bureau. He is
an old guard officer of great ability,
sound judgment and ripe experience.
He is keenly and to the best of his
abilities, and withal is absolutely
square. He also enjoys the utmost
confidence of the war depart-
ment and works in it in splendid
accord and co-operation.

"I think I have the finest bunch
of officers and men on earth in my
regiment, and I am happy to be back
with them. Now that we have a
definite military policy and the war
department and army appreciating
and helping us, and our own services
and experiences, all together will
give this country the largest and
most efficient national emergency
force in its history. The only retarding
force is the lack of adequate appro-
priations by congress.

Colonel Hammond, during his 18
months in the war department, was
able to assist and participate in lay-
ing the foundation for broad plans
based on sound policies and princi-
ples for the future national defense,
and particularly in cementing the
existing relationship of the different
elements of the new army of the
United States, and giving them a
definite programme for the future.

The personnel of the orphaned
regiment are delighted to see the
"old man," as they are wont to call
their popular and loyal colonel, home.
He is the senior line officer of Ore-
gon and has almost 30 years' service
to his credit in the regular, national
guard, volunteers and reserve corps.

HIGH HONOR CONFERRED

FIVE ARE MADE 33D DEGREE
MASONS, HONORARY.

Banquet Held by Members of the
Degree in Memory of Albert
Pike, Distinguished Mason.

Before the largest gathering of 33d
degree Masons ever convened in Ore-
gon, Sovereign Grand Inspector-Gen-
eral Philip S. Malcolm last Thursday
crowned with the 33d degree, Inspec-
tor-General Honorary, Ancient and
Accepted Scottish Rite for the south-
ern jurisdiction of the United States,
William C. Alvord, Edwin D. Jor-
gensen, William Wallace Youngson of
Portland and Lark Bilyeu and Samuel
A. Mosher of Eugene. They had been
elected to receive this honor by the
supreme council of the 33d degree,
Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite
for the southern jurisdiction of the
United States, mother council of the
world, in convention at Washington,
D. C., last October.

The election to the 33d degree is
held biennially in the house of the
temple at Washington, D. C., and the
degree is conferred as a mark of
exceptional and distinguished service
in the Scottish Rite. It cannot be
petitioned for nor obtained in any
other manner. This is the highest
degree that can be conferred in Maso-
nry.

Immediately following the cere-
mony an elaborate banquet, honoring
the birthday of the late General Al-
bert Pike, poet, philosopher and Ma-
sonry's most distinguished writer and
lecturer, was served in the Tyrolean
room of the Hotel Benson.

DE MOLAY CHAPTER HERE

ORGANIZATION ESTABLISHED
FOR JUNIOR MASONS.

Ceremonial in Which Several Hun-
dred Boys Will Participate
Planned for Spring.

The first chapter of the order of
DeMolay—an organization for Junior
Masons—has been established in Port-
land and a ceremonial, in which sev-
eral hundred boys are expected to
participate, will be held in the munici-
pal auditorium, early in the spring,
according to plans.

A dispensation has been granted by
P. E. Malcolm, inspector-general for
Oregon to Sunnyside chapter, No. 42,
R. A. M., and A. M., to establish the first
DeMolay chapter. While this organi-
zation has no official connection with
Scottish Rite Masonry, Mr. Malcolm
began the movement to establish
chapters of the organization in Port-
land, and in addition is required under
his official position to issue the dis-
pensations for the various DeMolay
chapters in Oregon.

While on an eastern trip early this
year, A. L. Tetu, potentate of Al
Kader temple of the Mystic Shrine,
made an exhaustive investigation of
the DeMolay chapters already or-
ganized and collected data that he
presented to Mr. Malcolm, after he
found that the inspector-general had
launched plans for the establishment
of chapters of the organization in
Oregon.
