

COMMUNITY CHURCH CONFERENCE TUESDAY AND WEDNESDAY

Leading Religious Workers of Oregon and Washington to Meet in Y. M. C. A. to Attend Meetings and Discuss Problems of Merged Congregations Throughout Whole Northwest.

THE value of the community church will be discussed at a community church conference to be held at the local Young Men's Christian association Tuesday and Wednesday. Some of the leading church workers in Washington and Oregon will be in Portland for the purpose. Each church is entitled to two lay delegates and a pastor, and each community or federated church will have a voice and vote through its delegates in the organization of the Association of Community Churches. Inquiries coming from different parts of the state indicate a real interest in the community church movement.

The afternoon and evening of the first day will be given to the presentation of different phases of the work by men who are not only interested in the movement, but who, from experience, are qualified to speak. The second day will be more in the form of a round-table conference, where an effort will be made to get a better understanding of the problems with the view of establishing a more cooperative program.

The public will be most welcome to all of the sessions and will be entitled to voice on the floor in the discussion of any question. Leslie M. Rutledge, of the River will be chairman and Professor L. S. Hopkins of Ridgefield, Wash., associate chairman.

The first meeting of the Portland Ministerial union for 1932 will be held at the auditorium of the Y. M. C. A. Tuesday at 10:40 A. M. The subject of the community chest will be presented and the committee appointed to look into the matter will report. The theme of the meeting will be "The Ministerial Union," Dr. Harold L. Bowman, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, will treat the subject, "The Minister as Student." Dr. W. B. Hinson, pastor of the East Side church, will speak on "The Minister as Preacher." Dr. W. T. McElveen, pastor of the First Congregational church, will take as his subject, "The Minister as a Citizen."

Dr. Ira Landrith of Chicago is to speak in Portland in the First Presbyterian church Wednesday night, January 25. Dr. Landrith is extension secretary of the United Society of Christian Endeavor, which is one of the most powerful and popular speakers in the United States along religious, citizenship and social lines. He has spent much of his time in connection with the Anti-Saloon league work and had a great share in passing that legislation on its feet financially, as well as in arousing public opinion on the liquor question to the point where that iniquitous trade was legislated out of business through the 18th amendment to our national constitution. In connection with his work for the prohibition ticket about six years ago.

As a speaker along all lines of religious activity, Dr. Landrith is sought after by conventions and gatherings all over the country. He is a great favorite in Christian Endeavor conventions and has been used with tremendous effectiveness in them in many states. He has been touring several states recently in connection with the Christian Endeavor organization and the reports of his meetings are more than enthusiastic. The Pacific coast is fortunate beyond measure that this gifted Christian statesman is to spend 17 days in California, Oregon and Washington. His itinerary is as follows: Redlands, January 12; Los Angeles, January 13; Fresno, January 15; San Francisco, January 17; San Jose, January 19; Stockton, January 20; Sacramento, January 22; Portland, January 25; Seattle, January 27, and Spokane, January 28.

At the Christian Endeavor world convention in New York last July it was Dr. Landrith who was chairman of the resolutions committee. That proposed the slogan, "A Warless World by 1932," and it will be more or less along the line of this slogan that he will address the mass meetings that will be held here on the coast. It was Dr. Landrith, also, that had a hand in the adoption of the slogan, "A Saloonless Nation by 1929," which was created by the International Christian Endeavor convention in Atlantic City in 1911.

A man of this great caliber will receive an enthusiastic hearing not only from the Christian Endeavorers of the city but also from the older church members and all who are interested in the vital matters that this "prince of platform men" will present.

All who are interested in the popular study of the bible will be glad to learn that the Portland Union Bible classes have again obtained the services of Dr. B. L. Sutcliffe as lecturer for another period. These classes, which proved so acceptable to large numbers of the church people last season, will reopen this week. Dr. Sutcliffe has consented to teach the International Sunday school lesson for the following Sunday each week.

This will be Tuesday nights at 7:15 in the White temple. At 8:15 in the same place he will teach the gospel of Matthew, the opening lecture being introductory and explaining why there are just four gospels instead of three or five or any other number.

Wednesday at 3 P. M. in the Westminster Presbyterian church Dr. Sutcliffe will begin a series of studies covering the bible from Genesis to Revelation. The course is calculated to give those who attend this class a full grasp of revelation as it grows from the earliest period down to the end of the last book in the bible. Thursday at 7:45 P. M. in the Vernon Presbyterian church the class will discuss the Epistle of Paul to the Philippians. Any one interested in bible study is cordially invited to any of these classes. There are no religious fees or other formalities, but all who attend are made welcome.

Vesper Service Will Be Held Today at Y. W. C. A. Hall.

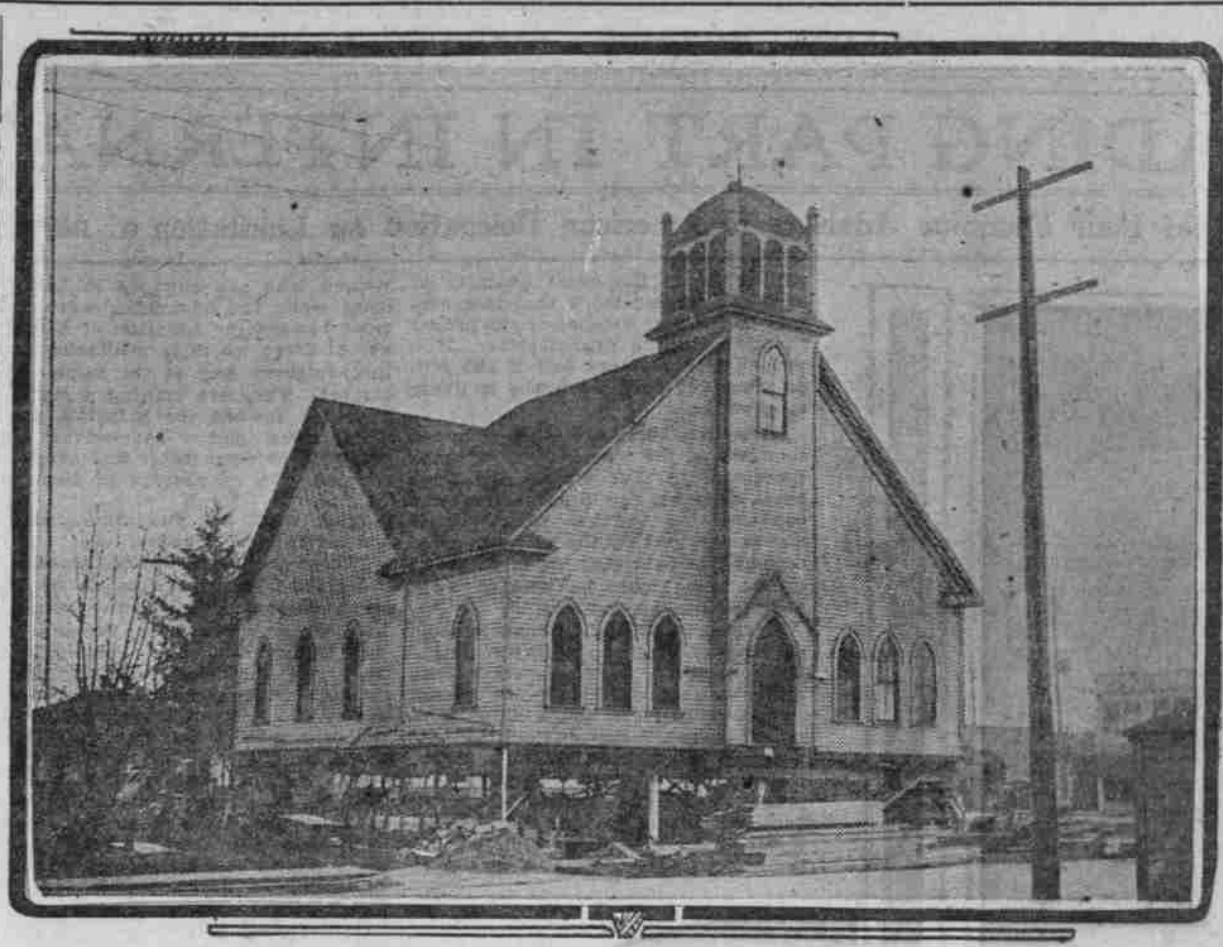
