First Girl
Mayor

DR. AMY KANKONEN, recently elected mayor of Fairport, Ohio, is unquestionably the youngest woman mayor of the United States—that is, if she is not considerably older than the 23 years to which she confesses. Mayor Kankonen was elected on a ticket pledged to oust all bootleggers. She was the youngest woman to have been graduated from the Women's Medical college of Pennsylvania, and was a member of the volunteer medical corps of the U. S. army during the war.

Mrs. J. Norman deR. Whitehouse, chairman of the New York State Woman's Suffrage party, since the end of her service as a government political agent in Switzerland and the end of the fight for suffrage, has gone into business for herself and is now interested in a leather products factory in New York, where she frequently appears in person and helps on the machines.

Nine freshmen, four of them women, from the University of Kentucky, recently passed the "Alpha" intelligence

test with scores which place them on the borderland of genius, and also above the average army officer, the average Yale freshman and 20 other leading colleges in the country.

Smuggling of liquor across the Mexican border into the United States in airplanes was discovered by Customs Officer W. B. Evans, when he captured the first flying saloon and the automobile into which six kegs of whisky were being transferred near San Diego, Cal. The aviator, the chauffeur and the lookout were arrested.

The name of Charles Evans Hughes, as head of the disarmament conference, is the first of the 17 signatures affixed to the four-power treaty when it was agreed upon in Washington after weeks of deliberation, and which will go down in history as the important achievement of the session.

Jascha Heifetz, celebrated violinist, and Miss Helen Keller, famous deaf and blind wonder woman, both well known in Portland, recently met in Denver. Mr. Heifetz played selections, while Miss Keller "listened" by means of her fingertips.

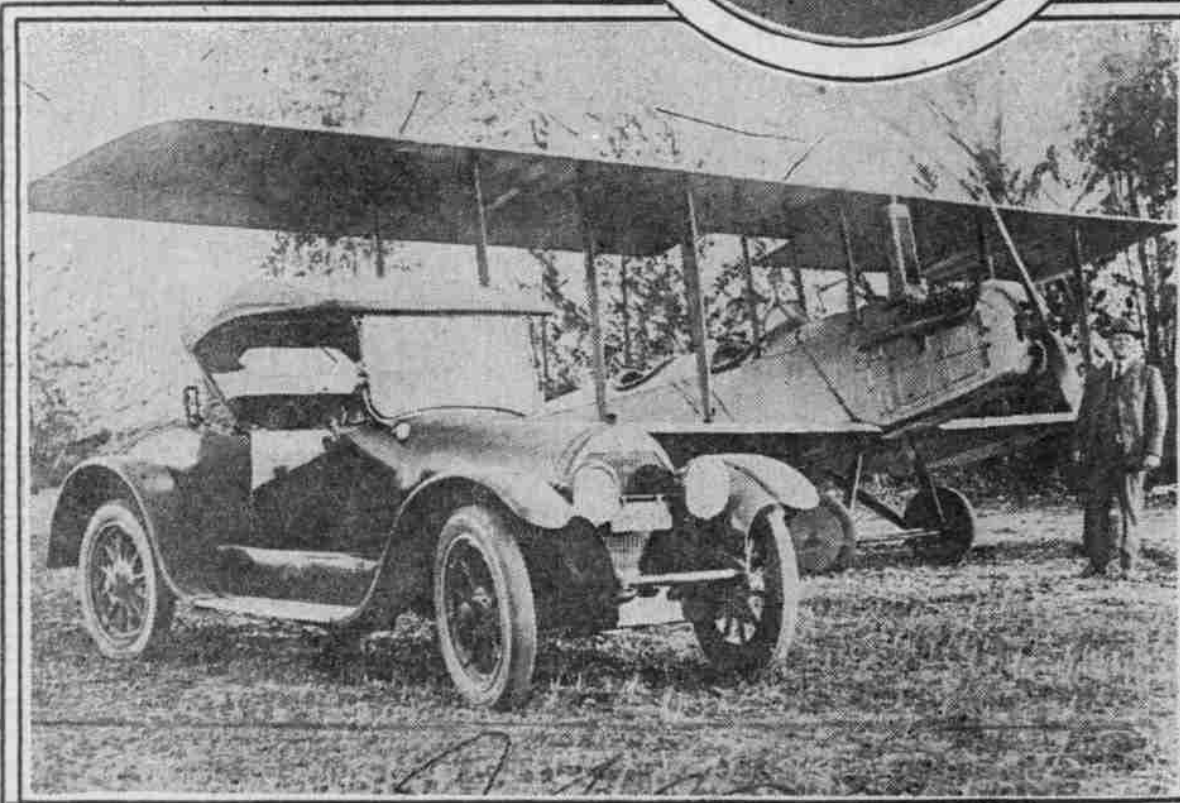

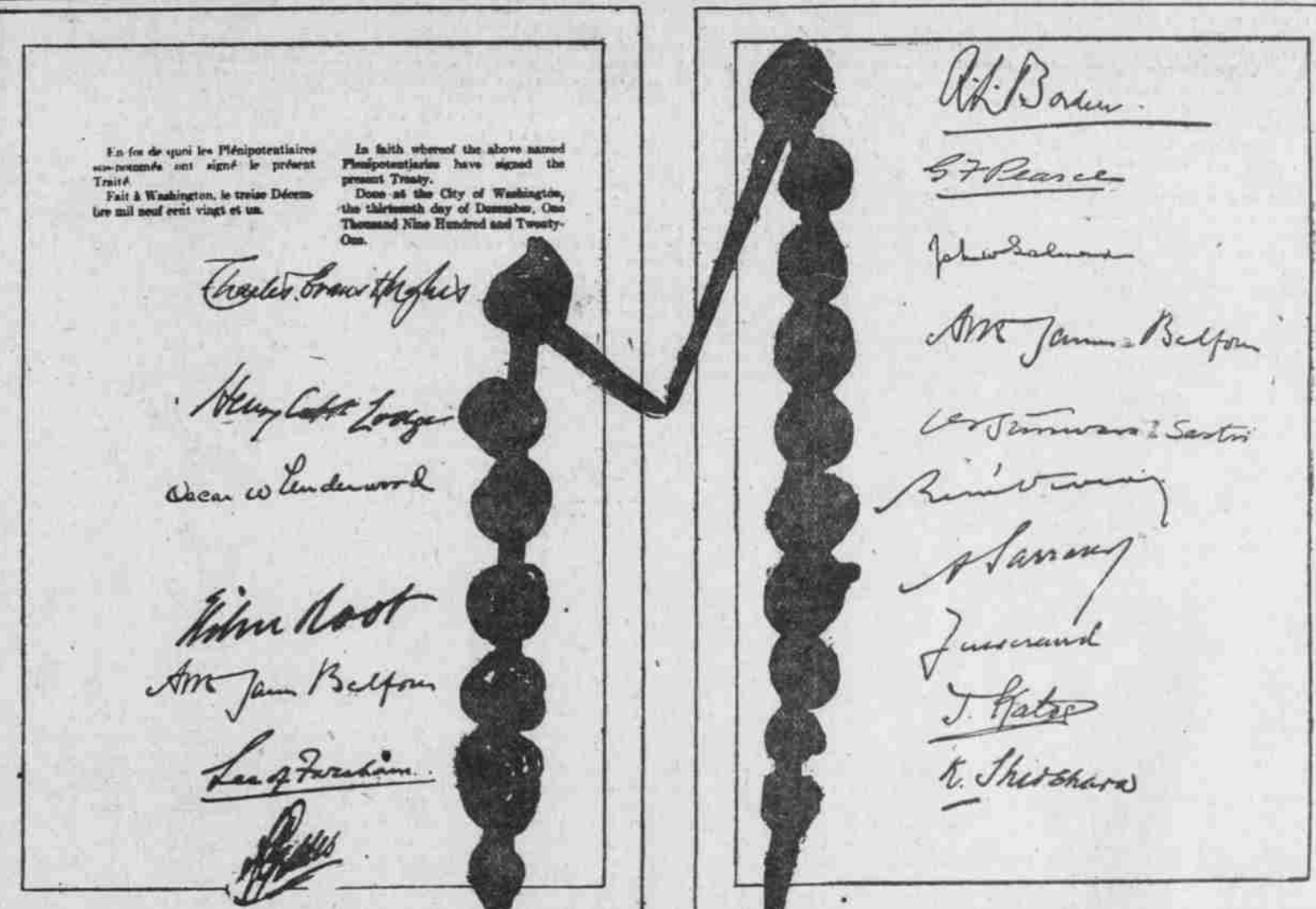
