

SHAKE-UP IN PARIS DISTURBS GERMANS

French Nationalist Triumph
Spells Trouble.

POINCARÉ IS DISTURBED

From New Premier Teutons Expect
Sabre-Rattling, No Moratorium
and Conference Wrecks.

BERLIN, Jan. 14.—(Special by Wire)—In the fall of Aristide Briand and the triumph of the French nationalist bloc the Germans see trouble for themselves. To them Raymond Poincaré is primarily a Lorrainer who seeks revenge. M. Poincaré was born at Bar le Duc, eastern France, in 1856. The Germans now realize too late that M. Briand was as reasonable as possible and was trying to follow Premier Lloyd George's lead.

From Poincaré, as premier of France, the Germans expect sabre-rattling, threatening sanctions, no moratorium, something better than the conference and wreck of the Genoa conference. Their only hope is that M. Poincaré will overrule himself and cause an open breach between France and England.

Split Entente Forecast.

The reactionaries who best understand the nationalist French assembly believe the French crisis may prove useful to Germany in splitting the entente, but, as the reactionary Tagblat says, "What chance has the crisis? The peace of Europe has not been so threatened since 1914—one thing is certain: Germany will not pass a bill. What will come later rests in the lap of time, but with the grim French Chauvinism and in the hope lies deep in German hearts that French Chauvinism will overreach itself and that out of what seems to be worst now, something better will be born. Meanwhile we face times of grave apprehension."

The Deutsche Tages Zeitung says: "What worse can we expect from Poincaré than we have already had? Whether making the relations between France and England more strained would be useful to Germany is doubtful. England must somehow come to terms with Poincaré over the Versailles treaty and reparations. It does not seem that it will make future decisions even more serious for us."

Liberal Papers Despair.

The Berliner Tagblatt says the French nationalist bloc does not plot against the economic reconstruction of Europe, but against a common European policy which, as they rightly and clearly see, is opposed to the policy of setting Germany under the rule of French imperialism. It became apparent that the bloc did not belong to the nationalist bloc, so he had to go. He is for the policy which Europe and the whole world demands but which France does not want.

questions which caused the deadlock or two weeks ago if they hope to reach a settlement of the Shanghai problem here. It is believed a formula under discussion is that Japan provide a loan by Japanese capitalists for the restoration of the railway, but with the abandonment by Japan of her claim for the indemnity of Japanese railway experts to such posts as traffic manager and chief accountant.

Discussion Is Progressing.

The delegates today advanced far in the discussion of the restitution of the leased territory of Kiao Chow. The Japanese agreed to turn over to China all official documents which have been accumulated, notably those referring to land titles. On Monday the delegates will take up the question of how soon the territory is to be restored and then go on to the questions of the salt fields and the iron and coal mines.

Meantime the question of Pacific fortifications is in the hands of the Japanese cabinet, as a result of the new proposal to define an exact zone of limitation of fortifications to the present status.

It is expected that a favorable answer will be given from Tokyo in time to complete naval discussions next week. It was learned today that the new zone proposition which emanated from the British delegates was the cause of a somewhat heated discussion when it was broached to the conference, but no one expects a serious hitch will develop now.

Disappointment Is Expressed.

Dr. Wang's assertion that the "21 demands" question would be pressed before the far-eastern committee was received with manifestations of disappointment in several other delegations. Japan entered the conference on condition that "closed letters" would not be discussed, and the representatives of other powers have conceded privately that they saw no way to bring into the discussions any subject which any sovereign nation refused to consider.

Rejection Held Inconceivable.

Dr. Wang, however, said that it was "inconceivable" that the "21 demands" should not be discussed by a conference convened by a desire to remove far-eastern embassies. Prospects of Chinese success in the attempt to abolish discriminatory railroad practices and secure surrender of leased territories seemed at this stage to be almost as hopeless as her case against the "21 demands." Japan has indicated she would not give up the Liaoting peninsula and Port Arthur, with a consequent French insistence on retention of her sphere of influence, while the question of preferential railroad rates has shown itself almost impossible of solution after a prolonged session of informal examination.

RYE WHISKY JETTISONED

SKIPPER OF BOOTLEG CRAFT
LOSES HEAD OFF COAST.

North Carolina Fishermen Now on
Hunt for Case of Contraband Liquor.

BEAUFORT, N. C., Jan. 14.—(Special.)—Placing for contraband rye whisky on the Cape Lookout shoals is the latest and most lucrative sport along the Carolina coast, and thereby hangs a sad tale.

A few days ago a schooner was noticed in distress off the cape. Evidently she had grounded. Eventually a tug noticed the plight of the unfortunate vessel and bore down upon her, with smoke pouring from the funnel, thinking to salvage the imperiled craft.

But the schooner was a high seas bootlegger. The skipper saw the tug coming straight for him and he jumped to the guilty conclusion that it was a revenue cutter bound on taking him captive. So up came all hands and overboard went a cargo of 150,000 of the choicest rye which had been shipped out of the country when prohibition was imminent and was on its way back for home consumption. The bootleg skipper realized his mistake when the tug finally got within hailing distance, but the liquor was gone. Then ensued a wild dredging and dragging debacle. The news of the overboard liquor spread along the coast and fishing smacks came from everywhere to join in the hunt. One fisherman hauled up five cases in one net.
