WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 27.—(Special.)—The very height of the social normalcy—that is what we are enjoying at the various conferences now until Lent the social calendars are filled with entertainments of every sort. Every week until Ash Wednesday will be an entertainment by the president and for the president and Mrs. Harding, too. Every week the president and Mrs. Harding give either a state dinner or a state reception, and every week some cabinet officer has a dinner planned for Mr. and Mrs. Harding. And every week parties are planned for the vice-presidents, Mr. Coolidge, for the chief justice and Mrs. William H. Taft, for some of the cabinet officers, both by and for some of the diplomats, not to mention dozens and dozens of functions given both by and for resident members of society.

Monday Busy Day.
In addition to all this gaiety, the few members of the various conference missions who are still lingering in the city are entertaining and being entertained.

Monday still seems to be a particularly busy day for society. Last Monday President and Mrs. Harding had a reception, an evening affair, in compliment to the members of the farm delegations conferring in Washington, asking a few guests to meet them. Mrs. Coolidge was the guest of honor at a luncheon which Mrs. C. S. Thomas gave. The secretary of war and Mrs. John W. Weeks were entertained at dinner by Miss Helen Cannon, daughter of Representative "Uncle Joe" Cannon. The minister of the Serbs, Croats and Slovenes had a dinner party; Mrs. P. Dimock had a dinner in compliment to the ex-secretary of agriculture and Mrs. Edwin T. Meredith, and Mrs. Newton D. Baker, wife of the ex-secretary of war, and several large dances and private dinner parties.

By private I mean parties of an entirely unofficial character. The Merediths and the Bakers don't have time to call their souls their own. They are being entertained morning, noon and night. Two of the especially interesting parties of the week were a dinner at the residence of Mrs. Arthur Capner and a luncheon given by the councilor of the Polish legation and Mrs. Kwapinska, both for the Merediths.

War Secretary Entertained.
The most interesting dance perhaps of the week was that given Monday evening, preceded by a few dinner parties. The same evening the Georgetown assembly gave one of their series of four dances. The assembly is a dance organization that was in full swing when Washington was a wilderness almost and Georgetown was a flourishing city, and for several generations the members of the same families have attended these functions, which are very select. They are attended by people who, though not all so rich, have been prominent socially for the last 75 years or more.

ARBuckle TRIAL ENDING

PROSECUTION'S REBUTTAL TESTIMONY NEARLY ALL IN.

Completion of Case Is Expected
This Week—Evidence for Defense Is Attacked.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 28.—The prosecution announced today that the end of its rebuttal testimony was in sight in the second trial of a manslaughter charge against Roscoe C. (Patty) Arbuckle, in connection with the death of Miss Virginia Rappe, motion picture actress. Adjournment was taken until Tuesday to permit Gavin McNab, chief defense counsel, to argue before the Nevada state supreme court Monday in opposition to an action to dissolve the divorce of Mary Pickford, screen star.

The prosecution announced that it expected to consume all of Tuesday in its rebuttal testimony but would close Wednesday. The case is expected to be completed next week.

Mrs. Katherine Fox, Chicago, and Mrs. Kate Harbeck, Los Angeles, friends of Miss Rappe for more than ten years, were put on the stand by the prosecution today to rebut defense evidence that Miss Rappe died as the result of a chronic bladder ailment and that her death was not due to an attack by Arbuckle. Both testified with one exception, she never showed any signs of illness. The exception was testified to by Mrs. Harbeck, who said that Miss Rappe was treated by a physician in Chicago for a short period for a supposed nervous disorder.

Further testimony intended to show that Miss Rappe's health previous to the party in which Arbuckle is supposed to have fatally injured her, was good at all times, is to be introduced Tuesday, the prosecution announced.

PIONEER OF OREGON DEAD

JOHN McNAMER ESTEEMED IN WASHINGTON COUNTY.
Forest Grove Man Was Identified Closely With Growth of State and Honored as Citizen.

FOREST GROVE, Or., Jan. 28.—(Special.)—John H. McNamer, who died at his home here last Wednesday, was a widely known and highly esteemed resident of Washington county. He was brought to the Oregon country from Iowa in 1859 by his father, the latter having been a "49er in the gold fields of California, coming

to this county in 1853 and purchasing 160 acres of bottom and prairie land. Mr. McNamer's career was closely linked with the development of the Oregon country. He married Mrs. Nora Wells at Tillamook in 1911 and, aside from his widow, he leaves the following immediate relatives: Frank McNamer of Penasco, Wash., and Fred McNamer of Yakima, Wash., sons; Mrs. Alice Dolichide of Dayton, Wash., daughter; Theodore McNamer of Alaska, and Converse McNamer of Heppner, Or., brothers; Mrs. T. M. Munken and Mrs. T. A. Richer of Portland, Mrs. J. W. Goodin of Hillsboro, Mrs. Nettie Bellenger and Mrs. Alice Parsons of Forest Grove, and Mrs. Blanche Moore of Los Angeles, sisters.

Mr. McNamer was a member of the Congregational church, the Knights of Pythias, the Oddfellows and the Knights of the Maccabees, as well as John R. Mathews post No. 35, Grand Army of the Republic. In 1884 he volunteered for military service as a member of company B, 1st Oregon infantry, and, although he did not go to the scene of the fighting in the south, he did duty on the plains protecting immigrants and preventing Indian uprisings.

GIRL IN REVENGE PENS VILE LETTERS

Young Woman Revealed as
Corrupter of Tulle.

DEATH, INSANITY CAUSED

Campaign of Vicious Home-Wrecking Conducted, Psychologist Says, by Angele Levan.

Here is the sequel of the strange story of Tulle. The anonymous letter writer who turned the once quiet city into a charnel house of suspicion and scandal has been discovered. The police charged the remarkable crime to a delicate, demure girl of 21, Angele Levan, a resident of Tulle. The police charge that she was the corrupter of Tulle. PARIS, Jan. 28.—(Special Cable.)—The man who corrupted Tulle was a woman—a young and pretty woman—if the findings of Dr. Locard, greatest French handwriting expert, are correct. The authorities claim not only to have found the author of the letters, but the motive as well. It is the age-old motive of a woman scorned.

Jilted by a young man of Tulle, the woman planned her revenge upon the picturesque medieval town and all its people. No home escaped the poison pen. To avoid suspicion the "evil eye" wrote letters to herself, making her own reputation and detailing with the realism of a Balzac some escapades her fertile brain had invented.

Whether or not the culprit is rightly identified, the reign of the anonymous letters which for the last three years have threatened to turn every man against his wife and to cause him to suspect every neighbor of the vilest moral deeds, is apparently at an end. But Dr. Locard, in his triumph as a criminologist, has brought down upon his head the combined wrath of all the women of France. For in a moment of thoughtlessness the learned doctor declared that the very villainess of the letters convinced him from the first that the author could be no other than a woman. After that—the deluge.

The sequel to the strange story of Tulle is of itself strange. It came this week after the authorities, impatient with the results of the ordinary sciences that deal with criminal cases, had called the black arts into play. Three women suspects were hypnotized and while under the influence of the "evil eye" were subjected to a vigorous examination. This new application of "third degree" of police methods has also called out a storm of protest from the women of France.

France in Hysterical Frenzy.
Taken altogether, the Tulle affair has laid France into a hysterical frenzy. And therefore everybody is excited and happy, except the poor persons of Tulle who have suffered. Two dead and two violently insane persons are the toll of the anonymous letter writer to date. No one can say how deep the seeds of distrust and hatred have been sown.

Oddly enough, the older method of criminal detection triumphed in the case where occultism and hypnotism failed. The accused girl is Angele Levan. She is the pretty daughter of a municipal official and comes of old family.

One letter has been received since the finger of suspicion pointed to Angele. It was mailed in Paris and addressed to the Tulle prefect of police. It promised that there would be no more letters if the present investigation was ended.

Hypnotist Called In.
This investigation was proceeding quietly enough until Monsieur Richard, the magistrate charged with it, called in a Paris hypnotist to aid him in the examination of three women suspects. Immediately there was an outburst of national indignation. But the examination proceeded.

One of the women, facing the police sergeant, was easily put under control. But the question, "Are you the tiger's eye?" produced only silence.

The second suspect was recalcitrant and resisted to the end. She smiled at his wiles and his hypnotic eye had no lure for her whatsoever.

The third woman, succumbing easily, cried out in her trance: "I am suffering. I am suffering."

All of which brought an interpellation in the senate this week protesting against the use of hypnotism in criminal investigations and claiming it offered too great an opportunity for the abuse of power. This was followed by an official pronouncement

by Minister of Justice Barthou disapproving hypnotism as a method of extracting truth from witnesses.

Dr. Locard, who gets credit for the Tulle solution, examined minutely the handwriting of eight women suspects. He insisted from the first that the poison letters were the work of a woman. He said this was proved not only by the handwriting, but said the psychology behind the vicious, subtle letters could only be that of a woman. Hence the storm of feminist protest.

Seven of the suspected women stood the test of the learned doctor. Delicate, demure Angele Levan, after an hour of preliminary questioning, was ordered to write.

All Guilt Denied.
She wrote in obviously stilted characters. Then under sudden and brutal commands she broke down and wrote lines said to be identical with the majority of the poison letters. In another moment Angele, screaming, fell to the floor in a faint. Twice she was revived, only to lapse into unconsciousness again. Weeping bitterly, she denied all guilt.

As a result of the investigation poor distracted Tulle is divided into two camps for and against Angele. Four years ago, when she was hardly more than a child, she was jilted by her fiancé in a moment of weakness. Her friends point out that the poison letters labeled Angele's parents and even her own virtuous and chaste life a wave of crime in which Tulle was only a detail. There have been particularly brutal murders among the peasants and crochets in Paris. Dr. Locard said the use of poison letters as a weapon of revenge is frequent, but never had been known to show such tenacity or such cleverness as was employed at Tulle.

Angele, he said, undoubtedly was guilty of writing a majority of the letters. Two hundred and ten of them are held at the Tulle prefecture. The realism of these letters is so intense that even the French papers balk at their publication.

EUROPE WANTS U.S. AID AT CONFERENCE

Representation at Genoa Declared Necessary.

NEW IDEAS HELD NEEDED

Truth Spoken by Impartial Powers Essential to World Reconstruction, Declares Harden.

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BERLIN, Jan. 28.—(Special Cable.)—The best European hope is that the United States will be represented at the Genoa conference.

The war's damage cannot be paid by one nation, even though that nation be defeated. New productive ideas are necessary for the reconstruction of the world. For instance, it is Germany's duty to provide technical apparatus and organize schooled labor to help Russia on her way back to civilization. With America furnishing the credits, this would be realizable.

Through such means the Poincares everywhere would hear the truth from impartial powers. Premier Poincare's misfortune, and indeed all Europe's misfortune, is that he sees the salvation of a sinking world only in a strong army and negotiable promissory notes from Germany, notably attested. Poincare is a nationalist, and, like all other nationalists, considers only his own country and his own people.

Pope's Death Is Mourned.
This same self-deception has resulted in mourning this week the death of the pope, because it is claimed Benedict was pro-German. As a matter of fact, the pope did not venture mediation until the summer of 1917, when no reasonable person could have expected a German victory or even a favorable peace for the German Lutherans.

Berlin imagined in September, 1914, that Germany had won a victory at the Vatican when the Genoese cardinal, Della Chiesa, was elected pope over the admired and feared Raminopolis, who, in failing health, did not consider himself fitted for the papacy during a world war and furthered his colleague's selection.

Pope Benedict, outwardly neutral, heard with horror the part the Kaiser played before the council in Berlin. Starting with the thousand-times disproved fiction of Italy's "treachery" to the triple alliance, Wilhelm pictured to the council the judicial inquiry which King Victor Emmanuel must undergo before he could ascend the throne.

Pious Priest Horrified.
"How can you, false scoundrel, justify your perfidy? God will ask," said Wilhelm.

"My people forced me into war," the terrified pious man answered; "but then the Almighty, really angered, will say: 'No, little man, you won't escape so easily. Did you get your throne from the people or from me?'"

All of this, which was repeated verbatim, was in Berlin dialect, but even this did not move Benedict to smile at the travesty on the last judgment. Rather his arrogant blindness and slandersome horror of the pious priest.

Peace with Italy is almost concluded. Probably the next pope will banish completely the legend of imperialism and move freely about the world. How much does the church owe this?
