

ONLY INFORESEEN ACT CAN PREVENT STRIKE

600,000 Coal Miners Ready
to Quit April 1.

LEWIS GIVES HIS VIEWS

Plans for Evacuation of Diggings
Reported Already Under Way.
Final Orders Due Soon.

NEW YORK, March 18.—Six hundred thousand union miners in the anthracite and bituminous fields will quit work April 1, unless some unforeseen solution of the present wage controversy is offered in the meantime, John L. Lewis, president of the international organization of United Mine Workers, announced today.

Plans for evacuation of the mines already are under way, Mr. Lewis said. In the event of a walkout, crews of pumps, engineers, firemen, watchmen and helpers will remain at their posts to prevent flooding of the mines and maintain the properties, he said. He estimated that 1900 men would remain on duty in the anthracite and 3000 in the bituminous mines for such purposes.

Final orders for withdrawal of the men will be issued by the general policies committee of the union at Cleveland or Chicago, probably next week, it was said. Effective in case operators and miners fail to arrange a new working contract before April 1.

The order to suspend operations in the anthracite field April 1 already has been issued by the miners' general wage council at Shamokin, Pa. An arbitration committee of eight, composed of operators and miners, will meet here on Tuesday to discuss a new wage scale for this field.

Work in bituminous mines automatically will cease April 1, Mr. Lewis asserted, because of the operators' refusal to meet with the miners in accordance with the terms of their last contract.

MEDFORD MAN IN RAGE

C. M. THOMAS FILES FOR JUDGE
OF CIRCUIT COURT.

J. W. Hamilton of Roseburg Is Out
to Succeed Self to Bench in
Second Judicial District.

SALEM, Or., March 18.—(Special.)—C. M. Thomas of Medford, republican, has filed for the office of judge of the circuit court for the first judicial district, comprising Jackson and Josephine counties, with Jackson and Josephine counties.

J. W. Hamilton of Roseburg, democrat, would succeed himself as circuit judge for the second judicial district, comprising Benton, Coos, Curry, Douglas, Lane and Lincoln counties. Judge Hamilton has served 21 years in the capacity of circuit judge.

His platform reads:

"Keep in mind that the courts were designed as the most efficient agency of the people to sustain and protect their right under the law. To administer the law so as to assist in carrying out this purpose should be my endeavor, if re-elected as one of the circuit judges of Oregon."

"An impartial administration of justice unhampered by technical interposition, without unnecessary delay."

Sam H. Brown of Gervais, according to his declaration filed with the secretary of state today, would represent the people of Marion county in the upper house of the legislature.

Mr. Brown's platform reads:

"I believe that the business should be conducted with the same care and diligence as that of private business, and will, if elected, endeavor, as far as possible, to conduct the office of state senator."

"I will give consideration to every suggestion calculated to promote the general good, and will serve no special interests."

SUIT FOR \$2000 IS FILED

Clarence Olmstead Accused of Not
Paying for Stock.

With the declaration that the \$2000 worth of stock held by Clarence Olmstead in the defunct Couche Advertising Service, Inc., was never paid up, suit was filed in the circuit court yesterday by F. W. Chausse, receiver for the concern, seeking to have Mr. Olmstead adjudged liable in the amount of his stock in payment on claims aggregating \$8415. These claims have been allowed and the corporation has no funds nor assets convertible with which to meet them, it was asserted.

It is said that 200 shares of stock of the par value of \$10 each were issued to Mr. Olmstead January 1, 1920, as fully paid under a pretended agreement that they were issued as a reward to defendant for using his influence in certain particulars on behalf of the corporation, whereas in fact they were unpaid.

CORVALLIS, Or., March 18.—(Special.)—Miss Mildred Hurd and Eugene Keller were married here this afternoon at the Sigma Kappa house, which society Miss Hurd belongs. The bridegroom was graduated from Oregon Agricultural college three years ago, receiving a scholarship entitling him to post-graduate work at Ames, Iowa. After completing his year at Ames he accepted a position as manager of a large creamery at Tipton, Cal., where the young couple will go next week to make their home. Mr. Keller is a Theta Chi and met Miss Hurd at Oregon Agricultural college.

Seized by Free State.

4 PRISONERS CAPTURED

De Valera Adherents Released by
Victors After Being Held
for Short Time.

Speed Expected in Third Trial of
Film Comedian Held on
Manslaughter Charge.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 18.—The closing of the first week in the third trial on a manslaughter charge of Roscoe C. (Fatty) Arbuckle today found court and counsel still busy with the task of jury selection. The regular jury was finally selected and sworn Thursday, but the choosing of two alternates not only necessitated the examination of a number of other talesmen, but exhausted the panel of 45 which had been called for interrogation.

The first alternate was selected quickly after the opening of today's session, but the remaining talesman either had opinions regarding the defendant's guilt, or innocence of the death of Miss Virginia Rappé or were subjected to peremptory challenges.

A new panel was ordered into court for Monday and hope was expressed that the second alternate would be selected quickly and that the testimony taking would be well on its way before the morning session ends.

August Wold, the alternate selected today, created a mild sensation when he stated that his wife had been interrogated regarding the case over the telephone by a woman representing herself as a member of a civic organization.

PIER PARK IS DEDICATED

Crowd Gathers at 63-Acre Area in
St. Johns Despite Downpour.

Formal dedication of Pier park, the city's 63-acre park area in St. Johns, took place yesterday afternoon, despite the constant rainfall a crowd gathered at the park and there St. C. Pier, city commissioner in charge of parks and for whom the new park was named, planted a rose which is to be known as the "Blossom" rose. He then gave a short dedicatory address and this was followed by a talk by County Commissioner Hoyt.

The company then adjourned to the shelter of the St. Johns skating rink, where A. G. Johnson, assistant commissioner of public works, was chairman, and speeches were made by City Attorney Grant and Mr. R. H. Huntington of St. Johns. The affair was under the auspices of the Fraternal Boosters of St. Johns.

PLEA MADE FOR PATROL

Mayor of Eugene Urges Protection
of Forests.

EUGENE, Or., March 18.—Mayor Peterson of Eugene today directed to each member of the Oregon delegation in Congress calling attention to the vast areas of timber exposed to forest fires in western Oregon and Washington, and declaring that the air patrol is the most effective means of combating the fires.

He urged that the members of the delegation work for resumption of the air patrol this year.

Eugene has been the headquarters of the army airplane patrol of the forests for the Pacific northwest since a past two years. The city more than a year ago bought an aviation field for the accommodation of the planes used.

\$792 COLLECTED BY ELKS

Money Declared Hard to Get in
Salvation Army Drive.

VANCOUVER, Wash., March 18.—(Special.)—Money is harder to collect for benevolent purposes now than during and immediately after the war, it was shown by the report of the Elks' lodge, which undertook to raise \$5000 for the local Salvation army.

The report showed that a total of \$792.74 was raised, and the expense was but \$56.60. Most of this work was done before Christmas. Adjutant Jesse Roe is in charge of the local work of the Salvation army, which has one of the finest huts in the United States, built at a cost of \$25,000.

GORING BY BULL FATAL

Burton Dearhoff of Damascus Dies
From Blood Poisoning.

OREGON CITY, Or., March 18.—(Special.)—Burton Dearhoff, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Dearhoff of Damascus, who was severely gored for an infuriated Holstein bull at the Dearhoff farm on March 8, died this morning at St. Vincent's hospital. Hopes for Dearhoff's recovery were held until a few days ago, when blood poisoning set in.

It was while feeding the animal in the barn at the Dearhoff farm that it attacked him. The bull has been killed.

Umbrella Concern Asks Receiver.

M. F. Costa, president of the National Umbrella Manufacturing company of this city, filed suit in the circuit court yesterday asking appointment of a receiver for the concern, asserting that its assets are only \$2500, compared with liabilities of \$8000. John Grea and S. J. Bischoff are the other stockholders in the \$25,000 corporation.

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BELFAST, March 18.—(By the Associated Press.)—The conditions over the recent rivalry for possession of the barracks at Limerick were reversed at Castle Blaney, County Monaghan, on St. Patrick's day. Republican forces, adherents of Eamon De Valera, were in possession of the local barracks, but the holiday spirit being abroad, they left a force of only four men to hold the barracks while the remainder were out celebrating the national festival.

Noting these conditions, Free State forces, from the border seized the barracks, locking the four men in cells.

The republicans then commandeered the Hope Arms hotel. They are well armed.

IRISH BORDER SHOWS UNREST

Griffith Forbids Holding of Army Convention March 26.

DUBLIN, March 18.—(By the Associated Press.)—Disquieting conditions still prevail along the Irish border, according to messages received in Dublin today.

A message from Clones said three of the principal bridges within a radius of 30 miles of Clones, on the northern frontier, had been blown up, cutting communications between Counties Fermanagh and Cavan. A stretch of road along the northern frontier between Clones and Cavan also has been blown up.

The publicity department of the Daily Eireann today issued a long list of outrages alleged to have been committed by the special constabulary in County Fermanagh since March 6.

Approval was voiced generally in Dublin over the note which Arthur Griffith, president of the Daily Eireann, sent to the Ministry of Defense yesterday, in which he forbade holding the republican army convention, set for March 26.

The intention has been evident of submitting at the convention a resolution proposing the formation of an executive of the army, and the provision of government officials regard this as a deliberate attempt to establish a military government.

The action of Mr. Griffith, was looked upon as having again precipitated the issue set aside temporarily by the recent settlement of the army trouble at Limerick, by some it was even considered that he has challenged a definite decision.
