

800,000 ON STRIKE; COAL MINES TIED UP

100,000 Non-Union Workers Included in Figures.

SOME REPORTS ARE VAGUE

Officials Do Not Expect Exact Showing for Whole Country to Be Known for Week.

INDIANAPOLIS, April 1.—Complete suspension of coal mining by union workers marked the beginning today of the nation-wide walkout ordered by the United Mine Workers of America. Union leaders estimated 800,000 miners, including 100,000 nonunion men, had enlisted in the movement and predicted no change could be expected soon.

The exact effectiveness of the suspension, especially in the nonunion sections of southern Illinois, where the miners' strike is reported, is difficult to gauge, however, because today also marked the anniversary of the eight-hour work day in the coal industry with an annual holiday in the coal fields.

Some Reports Vague.
The reports from field leaders showed the great bulk of the suspension centered in Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Missouri, Iowa, Kansas and nearby southwestern states.

Reports from other fields were somewhat vague and union officials did not expect an exact showing for the entire country would be available before the middle of next week.

President Lewis estimated that 6000 of the 7000 mines in the country that have been operating recently had closed and in addition it was pointed out that 2500 mines have been idle for some time.

Meetings Are Planned.
In various fields—particularly in Pennsylvania and West Virginia—the field leaders of the union were planning meetings during the next few days, their purpose being to gain as much support as possible from the nonunion workers in strongly unionized fields, which were hit the hardest today by the suspension, the union leaders regarded any break in their battlefront as impossible.

Mines in western Canada were reported as closed, but those in Nova Scotia were in operation. Five thousand union miners in Kentucky also were scheduled under the union's program to remain at work. Mr. Lewis declared that this was in harmony with a contract with the operators, which has another year to run. In addition, 12,000 nonunion miners remain in the mines to protect the properties from damage, but reports to union headquarters here indicated that disputes had developed in Iowa, Montana and Washington as to the wages to be paid these maintenance men.

The union leaders in these states were insisting that the wages provided in the contracts expiring last midnight be continued, while operators were said to be seeking reductions.

CENTRALIA MINERS AFFECTED
Two Plants Crippled by Strike and District Output Drops.

CENTRALIA, Wash., April 1.—(Special.)—Only two coal mines in the Centralia district were seriously affected by the nation-wide strike of miners, but the district's daily output of about 3000 tons has been curtailed 50 per cent.

At Tono 185 employees, every union man on the payroll of the Washington Union Coal company, are out. The mines are owned by the Union Pacific and have been turning out about 1400 tons a day.

All of the union miners employed at the Monarch Coal company's mine at Knapah, 45 in number, are also out. The Monarch mine has been turning out about 250 tons a day.

The Fords Prairie Coal company's mine was running today, but three men asked for their time last night. Several more are expected to be missing when the mine starts up again Monday.

The Mendota Coal & Coke company's properties, among the largest in the district, have been idle three years.

The Victory Coal & Mining company and the Olympia Coal & Mining company, operating northeast of the city, are on a co-operative basis and are not affected by the strike. About 80 men are employed at the Victory mine and a smaller number at the Olympia company's property.

In addition to these there are a number of smaller mines that were not affected by the walkout.

STRIKE CAUSES NO RIPLE
Administrative Officials Generally Have Nothing to Say.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 1.—The nation-wide strike of coal miners into effect today without causing a ripple so far as could be observed in the administrative operations of the government.

Department of labor offices where for weeks representatives of miners and operators have been coming and going and correspondence has been flowing in from the various anthracite and bituminous fields, were almost deserted today. No statements were forthcoming from the White House and administrative officials generally had nothing to say. Apparently these officials were unanxious in the view ascribed at the White House to the president that federal intervention must be based on the existence of public emergency and that emergency does not yet appear to exist.

Congress, however, unlike the administrative branches of the government, marked the opening of the strike with a continuation of hearing of the Hoad resolution and appointment by the president of a commission to investigate the coal industry, and with a statement by Chairman Borah of the senate labor committee that unless the coal industry was reorganized in the interest of the public it would be up to the public to make the experiment in public ownership.

NORTHWEST UNIONS QUIT
Complete Tieup of Organized Properties in Washington Reported.

SEATTLE, Wash., April 1.—Complete suspension of unionized coal mines in Washington and British Columbia was reported tonight at the close of the first day of the nation-wide strike of the United Mine Workers of America.

For Washington, official estimates placed the number of men who

joined the walkout at 2600. In British Columbia between 2500 and 3000 men went out. The striking Washington miners were largely employed in mines supplying railroad fuel.

Most of the commercial coal mines in Washington, with an aggregate daily output of between 4500 and 5000 tons, and the non-union mines of Vancouver island, B. C., averaging about 4000 tons daily, continued in operation and will not be affected by the strike. The Washington commercial mines have been operating on an open shop basis since the summer of 1921.

The Northern Pacific railway and the Union Pacific system were affected by the walkout of railroad miners in Washington. Both were said to have large stocks of coal on hand. None of the Canadian roads operating in British Columbia were affected, it was stated.

The principal fields in Washington, where shutdowns resulted from the strike, were the Roslyn-Cle Elum railroads running for miles in the state, where approximately 2100 men quit work; the Centralia field, where 230 men were reported out; and the Bellingham district, with 240 union men on strike. In the Roslyn-Cle Elum field maintenance men also joined the walkout and some of the mines were said to be in danger of flooding.

The largest British Columbia field affected was the Crow's Nest Pass section, near Fernie. About 2500 men quit work there.

Police Chief and Man Wounded.
BENTON, Ill., April 1.—Spasmoid shooting occurred today in various sections of southern Illinois, where the miners' strike is reported, as 100 per cent complete. Jesse Benson, night chief of police of Duquoin, was shot and wounded seriously, and Policeman Sconce was wounded slightly by Harry Reid, a miner, early today.

announced themselves for the legislature elsewhere, but for the Multnomah delegation the only name thus far spoken of is Elmer Lundberg, who lives in Clackamas county and is thinking of running for representative of the joint district of Multnomah and Clackamas.

The strategy of the democratic politicians is simple. They figure that after the primaries, with so many republicans running for governor, there will be many republicans who will bolt their party nominee and vote for the democratic candidate in a spirit of retaliation. So much for the governorship.

As to the Multnomah legislative ticket, the same principle is applied. With "indorsed" legislative tickets in the republican primaries, the democrats hope to turn this situation to their own advantage.

Patriotic Ticket Considered.
The strategists figure that if the legislative ticket of the federated patriotic societies wins the republican nomination, there will be a reaction in November and a democratic legislative ticket, if carefully made up of representative citizens, will receive the support of republicans who will not feel satisfied with the outcome in their own party primaries. Of course, some of the democratic legislative candidates may be indorsed by the federation, which will make the situation more complicated.

Recent years have found the democrats slighting the legislative end of their ticket, but a bold front will be made in the coming campaign and there is a chance of the minority party being more largely represented than it was in 1918.

Albert B. Hunt, representative of Union county, democrat, has no opposition thus far, and two years ago he received the nomination of the republicans as well as of his own party.

Sherman Miles Out.
Sherman Miles of Columbia county is another democrat of the 1921 session who is a candidate for re-election. W. H. Strayer of Baker will be more a candidate for the state senate and Newton W. Borders has filed for the democratic nomination for state senator from Jackson county.

W. B. Ewing of Oakland is a democrat aspirant for representative from Douglas county.

REPUBLICANS HUNTING VOTES
Possible Candidacy of George A. White Worries Politicians.

A still hunt for votes has been the policy of the various candidates for governor the past week. Louis E. Bean has opened his headquarters in Eugene, and Albert E. Patterson has opened his in the Imperial hotel in Portland, and Charles Hall has his headquarters in the Multnomah. Governor Olcott will have no headquarters, nor will J. D. Lee, so far as known.

With the exception of governor all of the republican contestants for the party nomination are on the move, and each of them expresses supreme confidence in the result. Mr. Patterson will take the stump this week, going through the Willamette valley and later entering eastern Oregon, devoting the last two or three weeks to Portland. Speaker Bean has swung around the circle once, hitting the high spots, but will cover the territory again in detail. Mr. Hall plans motoring throughout the state, and Mr. Lee, while spending most of his time in Portland, has been making sorties into nearby counties.

The question which candidates now want answered is: Will George A. White become a candidate? The letters asking that Adjutant-General White be "drafted" are well scattered over the state. Opinion is divided on whether White will run.

Drain to Get Newspaper.
HAINES, Or., April 1.—(Special.)—W. A. Prialux, who has been engaged in the printing business in the Nob Hill district in Portland, is soon to begin the publication of a newspaper at Drain, in Douglas county. Mr. Prialux has obtained his equipment in Portland and purchased his newspaper press from Woolley & Woolley publishers of the Record at this place. The press will be shipped today, and the new publication will issue at Drain upon its arrival.

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ENGRAVING BUREAU PROBE IS ORDERED

Department of Justice Agents Assigned.

OFFICIALS ARE DAZED

Suddenness of Reorganization Is Cause—Democrat Promises to Take Issue to Senate.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 1.—Department of justice agents have been instructed to make a thorough investigation into the bureau of engraving and printing, from which James L. Wilmerth, its director, and 28 chiefs, superintendents and foremen were removed Friday night by executive order of President Harding, it was announced tonight by Attorney-General Daugherty.

Mr. Daugherty said he had assigned a number of agents to Louis A. Hill, the newly-appointed director, to go into the conduct of the affairs of the bureau, but did not indicate what course the investigation was to take or what developments might be expected.

Officials Are Dazed.
Official Washington was dazed today at the suddenness of the president's reorganization of the government's giant engraving plant "for the good of the service," and the possibility of a congressional airing of the change was indicated by Senator Caraway, democrat, Arkansas, who announced his intention of seeking the reasons for the dismissals, on the floor of the senate Monday.

Senator Caraway declared that in his opinion there had been "nothing but politics" in the dismissal of the bureau officials, and that it was the intention of the administration to follow up its action in other agencies of the government with a view of putting republicans in office.

Nothing More Explained.
Beyond the White House statement of last night no further official explanation of the swift reorganization of the bureau was forthcoming today.

Some officials, however, asserted that further developments in connection with the bureau shake-up were to be expected, asserting that the complete investigation of the plan would reveal facts warranting the quick action taken by the president.

SENATOR ATTACKS KLAN

Destruction by State Authorities Advocated in Letter.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 1.—Destruction of the Ku Klux Klan was advocated by Senator Culberson, democrat, Texas, in a letter to the executive committee of the Ku Klux Klan, in which he declared that the Ku Klux Klan was an organization inimical to orderly government. The letter was made public here.

"Steps should be taken, therefore, to arrest its progress and finally to destroy it," the letter stated.

The state, rather than the federal government, has power to proceed against the Klan, Senator Culberson declared.

Brownsville Has Hard Times Party.
BROWNVILLE, Or., April 1.—(Special.)—Dressed in outlandish garb and antique fashions, members of the Polyanna club and their husbands met Thursday night in a hard-times April fool party. Those winning prizes for the best costumes and character representation were Everett Barie Stanard, playing the character of Captain Brandy, and Mrs. Beulah Elmore, wearing clothes that her mother had worn 36 years ago.

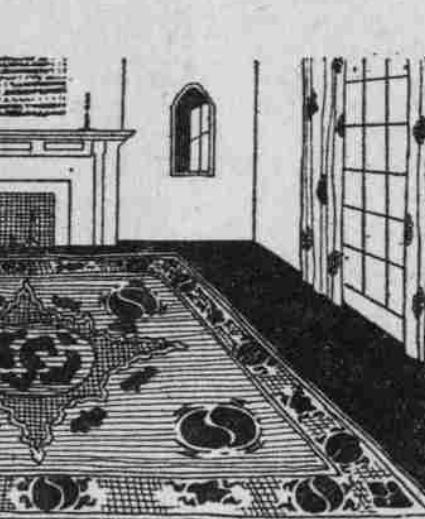

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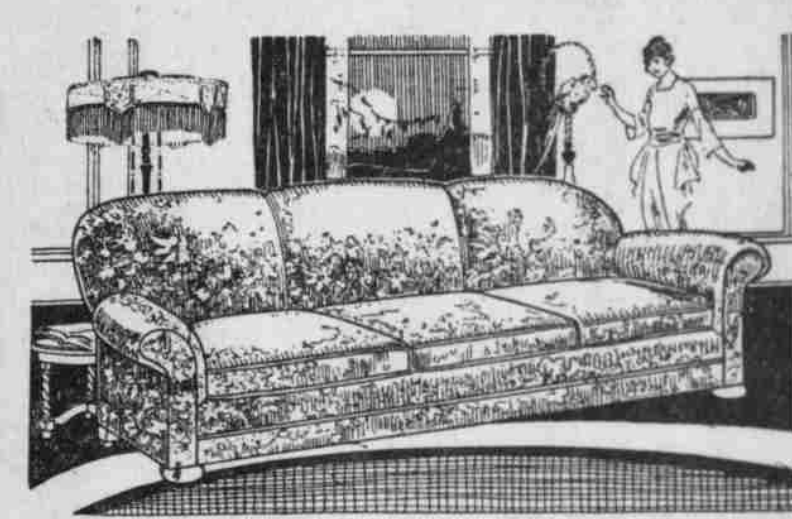
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
