

## NON-PARTISANS JOIN LIBERALS IN IDAHO

Parties Unite to Strengthen Political Chances.

### FARMERS BEHIND MOVE

H. F. Samuels, Millionaire, Who Deserted Republicans, Likely to Be Candidate for Governor.

BOISE, Idaho, April 1.—(Special.)—Political activities in Idaho have been confined almost exclusively to the so-called progressive or liberal party this week. A conference of the leaders took place in Boise at which time the combining of the interests of the non-partisans and liberals was perfected. This action was taken as a result of the recent convention held at Nampa when the league decided to throw their lot in with the liberals in the hope that the combined strength of the two parties will result in making a showing politically in this state.

The committee of 45, which is behind this combination in Idaho, has given evidence that it is willing to spend a little money to carry on the campaign. The Nampa Free Press, formerly a league paper, is said to have passed, so far as control is concerned, into the hands of the liberals. This deal was closed during the week. Men identified with the liberals have been elected members of the board of state ex-officials of the management of the paper.

**Paper to Back New Party.**  
It is understood that the Free Press is to champion the cause of the new party in this state and will shortly start launching broadsides. The official organ of the league has been the Leader, which was published for several years, lapsing during the off political days and coming to life during the campaigns. Whether or not it will be revived does not seem to have been definitely determined.

H. F. Samuels, a millionaire who left the republican party to become identified with the league and was its candidate both for governor and senator, has been here for the past week in consultation with Ray McKaig, who has been in charge of the league's affairs and with Frank E. Johnsen, state chairman of the liberal party and official representative of the committee of 45.

Commenting on the activity of the new party, Mr. Samuels said: "Ever since the state convention of the non-partisan league last month, the league has been holding county caucus meetings over the state co-operating with the committee of 45 in making the new progressive party. I have been busy in the northern part of the state explaining the plan to the farmers and find a unanimous spirit for this new movement. The farmers are tired of the old bank. They are strong for the progressive party. Of course, it is too early to make predictions, but many farmers tell me that neighbors who were ardent supporters of the old party are ready to accept the new party now."

**Dissatisfaction Is Found.**  
Mr. McKaig was also willing to talk about political conditions as he said he found them in this state from his own observations.

"I find much political dissatisfaction," he said. "Men who would live as a year ago, but who are now a year ago for the open primary and have not forgotten who beat the bill before the last legislature. It looks to me that the old party organization will hold their caucus in a telephone booth, a prophesy made at the last session. There is too much general dissatisfaction in state politics for anything else to happen." It is considered by more than likely by republican and democratic leaders that the progressive party will bring out Samuels as its candidate for governor. Samuels, who has had the experience in campaigning but he has the money to put into the campaign, two important factors. There are just two names now being linked with the governorship in the two major parties, those of C. C. Moore, present lieutenant-governor for the republicans, and M. Alexander, twice governor of the state, for the democrats. It is known that Lieutenant-Governor Moore has taken the stand that he will not go into a party fight to secure the nomination for governor and that he insists that the party leaders get together and agree to present a united front in the next campaign, which will be necessary if the party hopes to be successful. This seems to be pretty generally the sentiment of the men prominent in the party.

### POLICE CHIEF LIKES WEST

Banker of North Dakota Town Asks Homeseeker Book for Officer.

OLYMPIA, Wash., April 1.—(Special.)—Maybe Antler, N. D., wants to get rid of its chief of police, or there may be some other reason. At any rate, Secretary of State Hinkle has made certain that the chief of police, if looking for another location, may know something of what Washington offers to the homeseeker.

E. L. Walker, chief of Antler, in a letter received by the secretary of state yesterday, saying that he understood a new publication had just been issued setting forth the advantages of the homeseeker in this state "and what it offers to honest-to-goodness settlers, even if they did once belong to the non-partisan league or were once in favor of the league of nations," asked that a copy be sent to "Hon. Bill E. Knox, who is chief of police of this town and has money enough to get to God's country and who wants to go." Mr. Hinkle sent the book.

## POLITICAL WARFARE FOR SEATTLE VOTE

Conference of ex-Service Men to Be Held in Seattle.

### BOLO CLUB UP IN ARMS

Call for Assembly Signed by A. S. Kresky of Centralia, Reputed Candidate for Congress.

PUGET SOUND BUREAU, Tacoma, Wash., April 1.—Political warfare for the control of the ex-service men's vote in the state of Washington will be launched at Seattle tomorrow when former soldiers from all sections of the state will gather in conference at the Free hotel.

The conference, called for the express purpose of "discussing politics," was agreed upon at a meeting of the American Legion commanders held in Seattle, March 4. The proposal for the conference was approved and the intention of those interested in the movement was maintained a secret until the latter part of last week, when Charles W. Hedger, a member of the Spokane post of the American Legion, made public his invitation to attend the gathering.

**Kresky of Centralia Signs Call.**  
The call for the conference was signed by A. S. Kresky of Centralia, a member of the American Legion and the last session of the legislature. While Kresky's signature is attached to the formal invitation, the following men, active in the legion and in state politics, are closely identified in the movement: Thomas Swale, former state commander; Paul Edwards, E. A. McCabe and Henry Wise, all of Seattle; E. K. Brown of Ellensburg; Paul Weyrauch, Walla Walla; C. E. Chase, Wenatchee; Frank Christensen, Olympia; W. L. Lemon, Yakima; Joseph Kinney, Bellingham; L. E. Wilkinson and DeWitt M. Evans of Tacoma; Floyd Dysart and A. S. Kresky of Centralia.

The proposed conference, according to Kresky's call for the meeting, is for the purpose of discussing politics and planning for the active participation of the American Legion members in the coming elections, through a strictly political club.

**Storm of Protest Follows.**  
This proposal on the part of the American Legion chiefs has raised a storm of protest among the Bolo club members of the state. The Bolo club is primarily a political club of former soldiers, formed by Spanish-American war veterans. Scores of American Legion men have joined the Bolo club and have been conducting their political activity through the older organization.

In the formation of a new organization, the Bolo club members see a division of the former soldier vote, and fear that the unity of veterans as a working organization will be lost.

The call for the Seattle conference carrying as it does the signature of Kresky, who was a candidate for the appointment as United States senator for western Washington, has caused the Bolo club to wonder. This on top of the fact that those receiving the invitation were urged to keep the matter secret until after Sunday is creating something of a furore in soldier-political circles.

**Bolo Club President Talks.**  
Robert Arlson of Chehalis, president of the state Bolo club, was in Tacoma today on his way to Seattle.

"The state Bolo club has received a copy of the Kresky invitation. It was sent to a member of the club who forwarded it to the executive committee," he said. "A glance at the names of the men representing this meeting explains the whole affair. 'It all dates back to Kresky's ambition to get the appointment of United States senator. The Bolo club had endorsed the candidacy of Ed Benn of Aberdeen, who was later appointed. Mr. Benn had been one of the friends of the ex-service men and the Bolo club fought vigorously for his appointment and against Kresky. Tom Swale, at that time state commander of the legion, was a supporter of Kresky—in fact it was the popular belief that it was Swale who persuaded Kresky to enter the race against the advice of Kresky's political and personal friends."

**Swale Said to Be Sore.**  
"Swale has always been a seeker after political power. He endeavored to use his position in the legion to further his own political ends. Naturally he is sore at the Bolo club. He has been in the Bolo club since he was a boy and he has been inclined to be disgruntled over the failure of the legion to endorse them politically also appear on this list."

"I do not know if they plan to organize another ex-service men's political organization or to endeavor to gain control of the Bolo club. If they form another political organization the Bolo club wishes them luck. Such an organization would be a personal machine for some of those who have been active in its inception. It will not attract many ex-service men. The fact that the Bolo club has refused to allow its name to be used for selfish aims by any individual or group has naturally created enemies. I hardly think those attending the Seattle conference will attempt to or get control of the club. It will be interesting to watch the suits and even amusing. The Bolo club will continue to speak for the ex-service men politically, I believe."

**Rumors From Seattle Given.**  
The sudden publicity which has attended the announcement of the Seattle conference was preceded for several days by rumors from Seattle to the effect that members of the American Legion would meet at the Free hotel, endorse a candidate to oppose United States Senator Poinsett and enter the state legislative campaign this summer with a strong organization.

It was reported that Albert Johnson, congressman of the third district, would be given the endorsement. The gain of control of the Bolo club would get an endorsement for congress in the third district. This rumor was later repudiated by friends of Johnson and Kresky. Members of the American Legion in Tacoma, who have taken a more or less active interest in politics, are opposed to having the name of the legion drawn into a political fight as such. Very few of them, as well as members of the other veteran organizations in Tacoma, have been invited to attend the Seattle gathering.

**Work on Box Factory Begun.**  
LA GRANDE, Or., April 1.—(Special.)—A large force of men is at work at Lone Pine, three miles east

of La Grande, on the box factory being erected by the White Pine Box & Lumber company. It is expected that the building will be finished within two weeks and the machinery will be installed, part of which is now in use in a factory in Imbler. The mill in La Grande, on the box factory being overhauled and will be placed in operation within a short time. It is expected that the box factory will run steadily throughout the year.

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**Cremery Building Assured.**  
EUGENE, Or., April 1.—(Special.)—Enough stock in the Eugene Farmers' Cremery association has been sold to insure the starting of construction work on the new cremery building. A campaign for the sale of \$20,000 additional stock was inaugurated recently and the goal almost has been reached. It is expected that work on the new structure will start within two months.

**State to Sell Land, Timber.**  
OLYMPIA, Wash., April 1.—(Special.)—State Land Commissioner J. L. Savage announced today that land and timber valued in excess of \$200,000 will be offered for sale next Tuesday by various county auditors of the state in which the land is located, that being the date of the regular quarterly state land sale.

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**Terminal Rate Granted.**  
MILWAUKEE, Wis., April 1.—(Special.)—The Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railroad has granted terminal rates to Shelton which places the small mills here in position to ship

east and removes the ban which has prevented new industries in Mason county. Other lines will follow, relieving local mills of the car-ferry charge of \$75 a car.

Local interests have tried for years to obtain this concession but M. E. Reed, president of the Peninsular railroad, was successful on a recent visit to headquarters in Chicago. He also received assurance that the Milwaukee would consider actual connection with the Peninsular railroad when possible to open new feeders.

The Peninsular extends 35 miles west of Shelton toward the coast into a great field of fine timber in the Olympic mountain watershed, where the best of veneer and long timbers are found, and the present daily output at Shelton is around 600,000 feet, all of which is towed to sawmills. Only four small saws and shingle mills are operated near Shelton, because charges have prohibited outside shipping. But several interests are already considering locating plants here for the abundant raw material including "hardwoods" within reach.

### ROAD WORK PROGRESSING

NORTH BANK HIGHWAY EXTENSION ASSURED.

Route From Canadian Border Near Oroville to Columbia River.

Certainty of Near Future.

OLYMPIA, Wash., April 1.—(Special.)—With the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railroad committed to a plan of co-operation, federal approval obtained for paying the Biddle cut-off near Camas, and both the Rand-Greenleaf section of three miles in Skamania county and the Underwood-Major creek job in Klickitat county ready for contracting on June 1, there is every prospect that the North Bank highway will be open to travel as far east as Lytle over an improved roadway by the summer of 1923.

Contracts have been let and \$54,539 worth of work is being done on the four-mile section between Ogaga and Underwood. The new reinforced concrete bridge at Stevenson is finished, and a mile of surfacing with gravel is being done at Lytle. The most difficult section of the highway to be built is that between Underwood and Major creek, a 12-mile portion of the road that involves difficult rock work and also weaves on and off the right of way of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle. For eight of the 12 miles the railroad gives up a part of its property to make the highway possible.

The 14 miles of paving on the Biddle cut-off near Camas will complete the paving to that city. The Rand-Greenleaf work is an easy job. It is possible to get through to Underwood on the route of the North Bank highway, but beyond Underwood one has to go up to Snowden, traveling 25 miles to reach Lytle. The Underwood-Major creek work will cut off 14 miles of this distance.

When the highway is built from Goldendale to Bunsen a route from the Canadian border above Oroville to the Columbia river at Maryhill will be opened up over the Chelan and Okanogan highways. The Sunset and Inland Empire highways.

**POLICE HEAD TAKES OATH**  
New Tacoma Commissioner Says He Will Fight Bootlegging.

TACOMA, Wash., April 1.—(Special.)—Paul Newman, newly appointed commissioner, took the oath of office yesterday and today occupied the chair in the department of public safety vacated last Monday by Fred Shoemaker, majority candidate.

"No revolutionary changes in the conduct of the department will be made," he said. "I will hit the bootleggers as hard as I can. I have not touched a drop of liquor myself for 15 years. I am not a radical, however, and if Statesmanhood allows me to have liquor, it would be different. As long as the law is what it is, it is up to us to observe it. Liquor is being sold and I will try to stop it. I am not going to upset the department for the two months I will be in charge. I will not appoint a new chief of police."

### LOGGING LINE TO BE BUILT

George Palmer Company to Make Extensive Improvements.

LA GRANDE, Or., April 1.—(Special.)—The George Palmer Lumber company has announced extensive improvements to be made this spring. Additional railway lines, totaling about 10 miles in length, will be built into the woods to bring out logs. Two large bridges also are to be constructed. The sawmill here was overhauled during the enforced shutdown of the last two months, when heavy snow prevented logging.

The mill will reopen in about a week and continuous operation will be necessary to keep up with the orders for lumber. E. L. Kennon, president and general manager, expects the 1922 season to be the largest in several years.

**Campfire Council Is Held.**  
ABERDEEN, Wash., April 1.—(Special.)—The grand council of seven Aberdeen campfires was held in the American Legion building last night, with 44 campfires and bluebird members taking part. Foreword of the ceremonial will be devoted to furnishing the headquarters recently opened in the Washington block. Following opening exercises, each campfire responded to roll call with an original stunt or song. Mrs. C. E. Hodges and Rev. P. W. Greene addressed the girls following this ceremony. The rank of wood gatherer was conducted by Miss Nettie Smith, and that of torchbearer by Miss Greene.

**School Directors Fined.**  
KELSO, Wash., April 1.—(Special.)—Mrs. Pearl Gould and Mrs. Hollis, directors of the rural school near Olegua, were fined \$10 and costs by Justice Robins of Castle Rock for neglecting to send the students to school during a quarrel. It was alleged that they said she was not fit to teach school and told her not to teach any more and ordered the students to stay away from school. County Superintendent Gardner will hold a hearing next week.

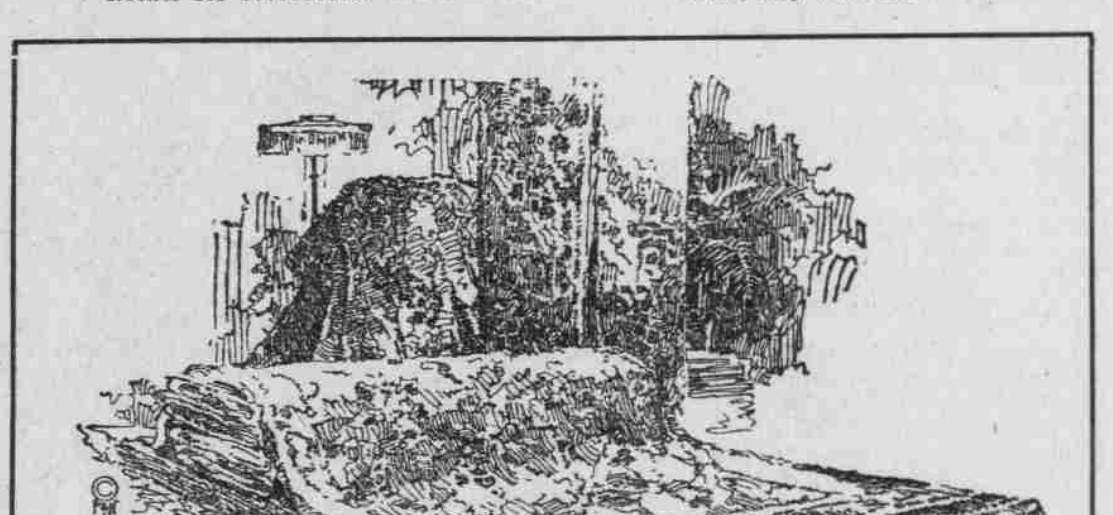
