

LIST OF KLAN IN 6 STATES IS SEIZED

Full Roster of Members in Oregon Is Taken.

GRAND JURY TO GET CASE

Papers Reveal Existence of Organization in Many Cities of California, It Is Said.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., April 29.—Preparations to submit evidence relating to at least 2000 members of the Ku Klux Klan in Los Angeles county to a grand jury which will be selected next Thursday were under way this afternoon.

District Attorney Woolwine said he had his case well in hand and was confident that full responsibility would be fixed for the raid last Saturday night at Ingleswood, which precipitated the investigation of the Klan.

At the same time the district attorney of five other California counties were developing investigations based on documents seized under a search warrant at the Ku Klux Klan "Pacific domain" headquarters here.

Oregon List Is Found.
Complete lists of officers of the states of California, Washington, Idaho, Nevada and Arizona were found, as well as rosters of members in all these states, which Raymond L. Turner, deputy district attorney, said he believed represented approximately the full strength of the organization in each.

Mr. Turner also said that reports of attempts at intimidation had come to his office since the investigation started. A Los Angeles man, whose name was withheld, reported today that he had been threatened by telephone and ordered to stop talking about the Klan. He said he had been outspoken in denouncing the Ku Klux Klan, and the person who telephoned said he would be "bumped off" if he continued to make such remarks.

The Klan, whose existence and membership are definitely established, according to the announcement by Mr. Turner, are those in Los Angeles, Taft, Bakersfield, Fresno, Imperial City, Calexico, Coalinga, Glendale, San Jose, Covina, Redondo, Huntington Park, Azusa, Venice and Orange county.

Ingleswood Klan Started.

Ingleswood was in process of getting a Klan when the raid took place which resulted in the final winding up of the stable M. R. Mosher, one of the raiders. At the inquest over Mosher's body it was brought out that a preliminary meeting had been held, at which from 15 to 20 men took the "first oath," while another Ingleswood man testified that he had been told by W. S. Coburn, "grand goblin" of the Ku Klux Klan of its Pacific domain, was closeted with Mr. Woolwine and Deputies Turner and W. C. Doran for about an hour today. The district attorney said later that the conference had developed nothing of importance which he could divulge. The grand goblin refused to comment upon his visit.

The grand jury venire were ordered to report next Thursday morning.

MAN IS FOUND INJURED

JAMES O. DEWELL'S CASE IS MYSTERIOUS ONE.

McMinnville Resident, Indicted Recently for Embezzlement, Has Fracture of Skull.

Was James O. Dewell, McMinnville resident, the victim of a would-be assassin, or did he fall from a trestle and fracture his skull?

Dewell, who was indicted on January 8 for the alleged embezzlement of various sums while agent for the Southern Pacific railway at McMinnville and Dayton while that road was under federal control, was found about 6 o'clock Friday night lying unconscious upon railroad tracks between Timber and Cochran, and near the hotel of his employers, the Dooty Lumber company. He was brought to St. Vincent's hospital late yesterday, where the injury to his skull was diagnosed as a probable basal fracture.

Mrs. Edith Dewell, his wife, who accompanied him to Portland, said that last night he was delirious and talking of the approaching trial. Mrs. Dewell declared that, in her belief, her husband was innocent and was the victim of an assassin.

Dewell's trial was to have been held in Portland on May 8. It probably will have to be postponed.

By special arrangement with the Selberling-Lucas Music company a series of daily concerts will be held during the week between 3:30 and 4:30 o'clock. These will be given by the orchestra of the Oriental cafe, the orchestra of the Oriental grill, the Oregon grill, the Multnomah hotel, the Buescher Saxophone quartet, the accordion player, the John Sylvester. In addition all the new Victor records being released for May will be sent broadcast in connection with these afternoon concerts.

The Metropolitan trio, a body of local artists consisting of Charlotte Kramer, piano; Agnes Zook, violin, and Elsie Rice, violin, will play for the radio. This trio is well-known in Portland by reason of many concerts of splendid nature and the programme to be rendered assures the radio audience of an unusual treat.

The programme for Wednesday night will be divided into two separate concerts of an hour each, and each of an exceptionally meritorious nature. From 3 to 4 o'clock the Portland Scottish Bagpipe band will play. This body of highland musicians consists of seven pipes and five drums, besides two soloists and a Scottish comedian. All the numbers will be Scottish music. This will be the first time this kind of music has been transmitted by radio in Portland, and J. B. Weed, local manager of the Selberling-Lucas Music company, is conducting experiments in arranging the pieces to insure perfect transmission.

Three noted Portland artists will take part in the second concert. Frederick T. Crowther, baritone, widely known as director of the Portland Opera association, will sing

four selections with accompaniment on the piano by Carl Vincoast, conductor of the Portland symphony. The other vocal soloist will be Alice Price Moore, contralto. She will sing four numbers and will be accompanied on the piano by Helen Van Houten.

The third part of the last concert will be another organ recital rendered by Frederick W. Goodrich. Organ music, tried for the first time two weeks ago over the radio, proved an instantaneous success, and brought in many requests that more of it be sent broadcast. It is high among the musical favorites in the tastes of radio listeners, and Mr. Goodrich's recital will prove highly satisfactory. The organ to be used has been furnished by Sherman, Clay & Co. A number of dances to be given in the city next Friday night will be broadcast.

HEADS FOR FAIR NAMED

DEPARTMENT SUPERINTENDENTS ARE SELECTED.

State Board Decides to Bar All Gambling Games and Devices From Grounds Next Fall.

SALEM, Or., April 29.—(Special.)—Members of the Oregon state fair board held a meeting here today and elected superintendents of the various departments for this year's fair.

William Schulerich of Hillsboro will have charge of the cattle department, while Professor O. Nelson of the Oregon Agricultural college will supervise the sheep department. Thomas Brunk of Salem will be in charge of the swine department. Edward Shearer of Estacada, the poultry department and James Forbes of Portland the floral department. The dairy department will be in charge of C. L. Hawley.

All gambling games and devices will be barred and solicitors for newspapers and magazines which offer premiums will not be allowed to operate on the grounds.

The premiums and purses for this year's fair will aggregate approximately \$75,000. Night horse races will be one of the features of the event.

Although not yet definitely decided it is probable that the 1922 fair will start on the grounds and continue until the next Saturday night. Sunday will be devoted to sacred concerts, while the opening Saturday afternoon will be given over to the speed events.

Improvements contemplated this summer include new roofs on the livestock barns and installation of new swine pens.

Members of the fair board in attendance at today's meeting included J. E. Reynolds of La Grande; H. E. Browne of Portland; C. E. Gates of Medford; James Linn of Salem and A. H. Lea of Portland.

Mr. Lea is secretary of the board.
