

PREPARATION IS BEGUN IN PEKIN OFFICES

Wu Makes Drastic Changes In Government.

PREMIER IS DISMISSED

Arrest of Liang Shih-Yi Also Is Ordered—Two Ministers Ousted and Detention Decreed.

PEKIN, May 6.—(By the Associated Press.)—Sweeping governmental changes followed today the success of General Wu Pei-fu in winning the military mastery at Peking. President Hsu Shih-chang issued a mandate dismissing Premier Liang Shih-yi and ordering his arrest. Finance Minister Chang Hu and Minister of Communications Yeh Kung-cho also were dismissed and their arrest was ordered. General Chang Tso-lin, the Manchurian leader, who has been in the campaign just ended, has been dismissed from his office of inspector-general of Manchuria. Premier Liang Shih-yi, who is now in Tien Tsin, where he has been on leave for several months, has been charged with conspiring with Chang Tso-lin to promote civil war.

DEFEAT BECOMES DEBACLE

Hordes of Defeated Soldiers Pass Through Tien Tsin.

TIENTSIN, May 6.—(By the Associated Press.)—Chang Tso-lin's defeat fast is becoming a debacle. Hordes of Fengtien soldiers are passing through Tien Tsin, some climbing to the outside of the over-crowded railway cars and motor trucks and filling all available space on the locomotives. General Chang Tso-lin left his headquarters at Chumiangcheng, presumably for Mukden, early today. The troops passing through Tien Tsin are orderly.

There is a representative popular government," he said, "with political parties the governing agencies, I believe the political party in power should assume responsibility, determine upon policies in the conference which supplements conventions and election campaigns and then strive for achievement through adherence to accepted policy. "There is vastly greater security, immensely more of the national viewpoint, much larger and prompter accomplishments where divisions are along party lines in the broad and loftier sense than to divide geographically or according to pursuits, or personal following. For a century and a third parties have been charged with responsibility and held to strict account. When they fail they are relieved of authority; and the system has brought us to a national eminence no less than a world example. "The anti-primary movement, therefore has the president's influence squarely behind it. First efforts of the campaign will be directed at the eastern states, for they are not believed to be so firmly wedded to the system as the west, whence the movement for another primary has been started. raising money outside of Portland, it was intimated that the various cities and counties of the state would be asked to contribute of their funds to assist in the project. At the time the exposition was undertaken, it was estimated that approximately \$6,000,000 would be required to defray its cost. It was proposed that \$1,000,000 of this amount should be raised by popular subscription in Portland, that \$2,000,000 should be raised by taxation there and that the remaining \$3,000,000 should be provided by a state tax. This proposal was defeated when the legislature at its new session refused to approve the gasoline tax which was substituted for the general plan of taxation in the state at large. Members of the committee sponsoring the constitutional amendment are confident that the exposition will be held and that the counties and cities outside of Portland will be willing to contribute in proportion to the benefits they will receive.

LADY ASTOR MEETS ALICE ROBERTSON

Women Show Mutual Appreciation of Merits.

MANY IDEAS ARE SHARED

Both Remembered to Have Voted Against Bills Planned for Feminine Rights.

C., May 6.—(Special.)—America's only woman representative in congress and England's only woman member of parliament met in Washington this week and the lady from Oklahoma shares generously in the spotlight which beat about the lady from Plymouth. Miss Alice Robertson, somewhat cubicle figure loomed beside the liltedness of Lady Astor, like a soft gray dove who regards quizzically the dartings of a bright-winged humming bird. "Miss Alice" has neither a title nor a hundred million dollars nor a slim figure nor a brace of dimples. She could not, for instance, step up to our most august statesman, straighten his tie and tell him that he would always be re-elected because the women are so susceptible, and get away with it gracefully. She does not shine forth from a background in one of the first families of Virginia, an adoring husband and six appealing children.

WOMEN OFFER CONTRAST.

Miss Alice is a stalwart; Lady Astor is conciliatory. But both have voted against certain legislation introduced solely in behalf of women. Lady Astor voted against giving women equal rights of divorce; Miss Alice voted against the maternity bill. Miss Robertson has taken a bold stand upon the bonus question. Lady Astor agrees with her that the bonus is an unwise piece of legislation, but here Lady Astor has nothing to lose by making such a statement except the good graces of a representative who rebuked her for "butting in" in American affairs. On the other hand, Miss Robertson is standing by her convictions in the bonus matter while forced to offend the boys for whom she has often expressed the greatest affection, and at the same time to endanger her political career, already in jeopardy because of her vote on the maternity bill.

MEETING IS FRIENDLY.

But whatever other people might say about either of them they apparently have a most sincere appreciation of each other. Lady Astor's greeting of Miss Robertson when they met for the first time was a warm tribute. Miss Robertson eulogized Lady Astor afterward when she said: "I have been impressed with an appreciation of the fact that the safest and sanest women active in political work are wives and mothers accustomed to think for the future of their children and actuated by the unselfishness which in the wonderful beauty of motherhood they have a poise attractive in the extreme."

The women of Washington meantime are saying that "Mary of the time-clad cottage" boosted Albert J. Beveridge of Indiana into the nomination for senator over his rival, Harry New, Mr. New did not bow out at the beginning of his campaign to organize the women in his faction.

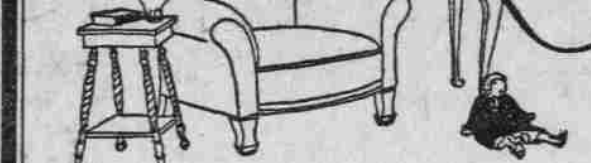

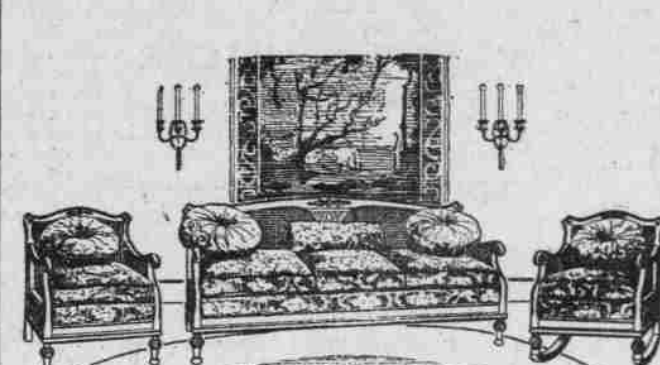
