

RECLAMATION BILL DECLARED AT CRISIS

Delay of Measure Due to
House Steering Committee.

SENATE PASSAGE SLATED

Western People Must Insist on
Congress Keeping Harding's
Pledges, Says E. F. Blaine.

THE OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, D. C., May 13.—The Smith-McNary reclamation bill is at a crisis, declared E. F. Blaine of Seattle, representative of the Western States Reclamation association, today. "The republican national platform endorsed reclamation, and stood unequivocally for reclamation; the chambers of commerce of the United States want on record for reclamation and declared for land settlement in aid of the ex-service men. President Harding in his message to congress at the opening of the present session and later before the farmers' conference called particular attention to the reclamation of the western lands. It is a fair-minded desire that the pledge of the republican party should be kept.

Government Credit Provided.
"The McNary bill was reported out by a unanimous vote of the senate committee on irrigation and reclamation, and the same bill introduced in the house by Representative Smith of Idaho was also favorably reported by unanimous vote.

"The enactment of this bill into law involves no drain on the public treasury; the money is returnable to the government. The government simply lends its credit.

"The passage not only would give employment to thousands of men in construction work and in making the arid lands productive, but it also would stimulate manufacturing and transportation. Literally, thousands of carloads of commodities manufactured in the western states are shipped to the reclamation projects of the west every year.

Passage in Senate Expected.
"There is no doubt the senate will pass the bill. The house steering committee, this committee seems to have its opinion on the measure upon the plea of economy. It appears willing that its party shall not keep faith with the electors.

"It is up to the west to see to it that the republican majority in the house permits the passage of the Smith bill in order that waste lands may be reclaimed and in these times of stress employment be given to the willing and worthy.

"The people of the west must speak in no uncertain terms if the bill is to be saved from defeat. They must insist that congress fulfill the pledges made by the president in carrying out the expressed will of the American people."

state were to make public the aid and assistance that they received through our efforts in the matter of law enforcement and clean government they would give the lie to the statement of Governor Olcott.

"In fairness to everyone concerned I am firmly convinced that the proclamation of Governor Olcott is merely a matter of politics, he hoping to win to his support the various people whom the opposition to the Ku Klux Klan have stated time after time that the Klan was making no attempt to injure in any way any of the organizations who are supposedly fighting us at this time. The religious question has been gone into in the proclamation of the governor without any proof or just reason for believing that this is so.

"Replying to the governor's statement of making us being permitted to roam promiscuously at large I wish to state that there are no masked men in the Ku Klux Klan permitted to roam at will. The terror of the masked and robed Klansmen has been devised by the enemies of this organization for the purpose of inciting race and religious prejudice against the Ku Klux Klan, as the only time that masks or robes are used promiscuously or publicly in any way is at public parades or ceremonies; at no other time are masked or robed men to be seen. We do not sanction the use of robes, masks or members allowed to have their robes except for this purpose, and in any case this is not done without first obtaining the consent of the authorities in the city in which said parades or use of the robes is being made.

"The governor's statement refers to the dangerous forces that are insidiously gaining a foothold in Oregon. If by insidious forces the governor means that forces are being organized whose sole purpose is the maintenance of the constitution and laws of the United States of America and state therein and for the purpose of assisting in every way possible the regularly constituted authorities of the several municipalities within the state, then we plead guilty. Further, the Ku Klux Klan presupposes and membership certain generally recognized facts in the foundation and development of the country.

"1. The United States was founded by Protestants of the white race, mainly Anglo-Saxons.

"2. Every race predominantly Protestant has been and is a progressive free people. Where such predominance does not prevail there is a conspicuous absence of progress and freedom.

"3. The Klan presupposes its right to establish and carry on an organization exclusively American, whose members are pledged and dedicated to a defense of the principles and ideas of American liberty and justice.

"4. It presupposes its right to formulate a policy and program based on its constitutional provisions which pledges its members to the maintenance of the Protestant faith and American practices.

"5. It presupposes its right to admit to membership only those who are native born Protestant Americans. In making such a regulation the organization had good precedence and authority for many millions in this country who are Americans by adoption and citizenship are, because of racial or religious ties, foreign in condition of mind and heart and do not hesitate to make the interests of this country secondary to the interest of their foreign relations.

"I will state further that Governor Ben W. Olcott has at no time in the history of this organization asked for information of any kind or nature

whatsoever, I also affirm that if he as governor of the state of Oregon has evinced any interest in the work or the nature of this organization the information would have been cheerfully given by myself or any other officer of the Ku Klux Klan.

"Finally, I will say that the Ku Klux Klan is the largest, numerically, of any internal organization in the state of Oregon today; that our organization is based on the principles as set forth herein; that we are absolutely law-abiding in every particular. As such an organization we ask the people at this time to compare the statements with those of the governor of Oregon, who admits in his own statements that whether the facts set forth in this article are or are not so is immaterial. We are firmly convinced that this is done for no other reason than his own political advancement.

SAWYER MAKES STATEMENT
Klan Lecturer Denounces Governor's Charges as False.

R. H. Sawyer, grand lecturer of the Ku Klux Klan, issued a statement yesterday afternoon in reply to the proclamation from Governor Olcott. It follows in full:

"The pre-primary proclamation prepared by Governor Olcott bears all the earmarks of Roman politics. As a resident of Oregon for many years I feel that I have gained a personal knowledge of the Klansmen that are unjust, misleading and untrue—and the governor's proclamation assuredly contains all these un-American characteristics.

"The Knights of the Ku Klux Klan are not endeavoring to usurp the rights of government, and for any man to make such a statement in the face of the published principles of the organization is to cause fair-minded persons to wonder what compensation could induce such a plain departure from truth and justice upon the part of one who chances to hold a position of such honor.

"The Knights of the Ku Klux Klan have been bitterly attacked by certain religious and political enemies because they bar from membership all who cannot or will not assume an oath of unqualified allegiance to the government, and it is believed that the governor's attack is inspired by the leaders of these un-American elements.

"The following taken from the published principles of our organization, will suffice to prove to thinking men the unjust and untrue accusations.

"No man is wanted in this order who will not or cannot swear an unqualified allegiance to the government of the United States of America, its flag and its constitution.

"No man is wanted in this order who does not accept the government of the United States above any other government—civil, political or ecclesiastical—in the whole world.

"No man is wanted in this order who is not a native-born American citizen who believe in the tenets of the Christian religion and owe no allegiance of any degree or name to any foreign government, nation, political institution, sect, people or person are eligible."

"Oron needs no masked riders, no invisible empire to control her affairs," says our ambitious governor; but his personal communications to the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan were couched in language much more courteous before it became clear to his somewhat biased mentality that his would not hope for a trip from the lawful organization to again enunciate the high position which fell to his lot.

"As to the sanctity of the churches being invaded, the governor either is misinformed or willfully seeks to mislead the people of Oregon. The letters received from pastors of Oregon churches, and the fact that many of them are Klansmen and that others are making application for membership at every meeting, ought to be sufficient to satisfy the governor. FRANCE PLEADS FOR U. S. PARTICIPATION

Appeal Made Through American Ambassador.

GENOA DEADLOCK HOLDS

French, With America Represented, Would Agree to Russia's Presence on Commission.

GENOA, May 13.—(By the Associated Press.)—France has appealed to the United States to participate in the proposed international commission to investigate the Russian situation. The American ambassador, Richard Wash Child, informed the Associated Press tonight that such a proposal had been submitted to him by the French delegation.

The ambassador understood that the French proposal suggested that the United States, if the invitation, which she did not approve. If the United States accepts, France would agree to the Russians being represented in the commission.

Premier Lloyd George and M. Barthou were in private conference for two hours this afternoon, apparently without reaching an agreement for solving the Anglo-French deadlock on the plans to continue the discussion of the Russian problem. The sub-commission on Russian affairs also met and argued for more than three hours without definite results.

Mr. Lloyd George will have a conference at his villa tomorrow morning with Baron Hayashi, M. Barthou, M. Jaspard and Signor Schanzer, in an effort to reach a compromise.

Hope Not Yet Abandoned.
After the meeting of the sub-commission Sir Edward Grigg, secretary of the British prime minister, said there had been progress but gave no definite explanation of its nature. The French and British delegations, he asserted, were well on the road to an agreement but nothing definite was reached. Accounts of the meeting by members of other delegations, however, give little indication that a compromise is any nearer.

The Russians have announced that they will not accept any plan excluding them from the discussions. On one thing all the delegations agree the inviting powers, the little Russian and the Baltic states as well as the neutrals—namely, that some of the United States must be induced to participate in the mixed commission. M. Corlat, French undersecretary of state, informed the Associated Press that he still felt confident of an accord.

France is still unwilling to have Russians sit with the mixed commission discussing Russian finances, but suggestions have been made that a special commission of Russian experts be formed which may be called in by the mixed commission when it desires information.

Problem Difficult One.
Again the Russians declare they will not accept any such plan, as that would not be dealing with them on an equality basis and it is difficult for the delegations to find any plan appealing to both the French and British and yet not offensive to the Russians.

The afternoon meeting of the sub-commission was chiefly an exposition of the views of the powers which had not entered into the discussion at the morning session. Japan, Poland, Czechoslovakia and the Soviet government, as well as France and Great Britain, set forth their views. Viscount Iahli supported the British position that the Russians should participate in the mixed commission. He regarded the task of the Geneva conference as too important to be lightly abandoned, since it really concerned the reconstruction not only of Europe, but the whole world. He finally expressed the hope that he should participate in the conference, as some method of procedure.
