WASHINGTON TRIMS CHICAGO

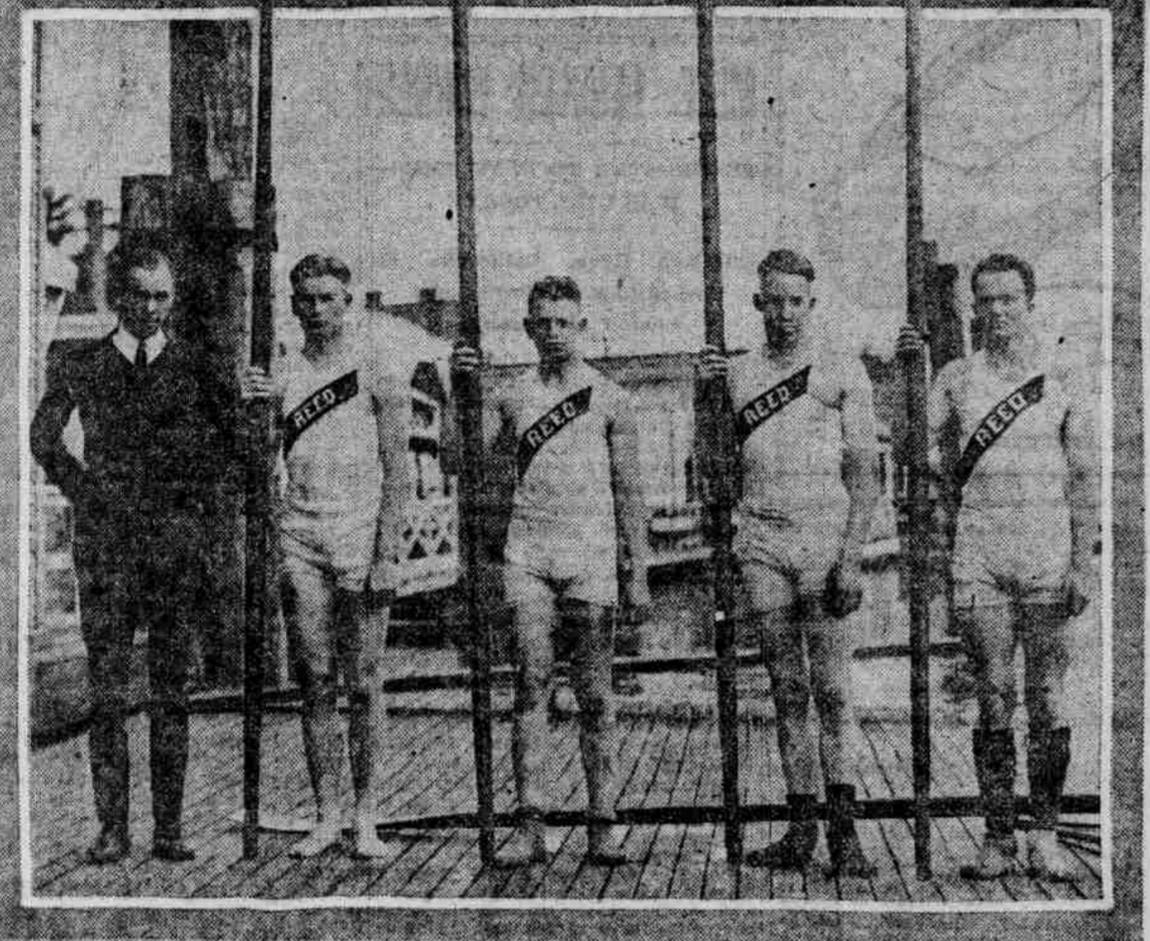
Ferd Schupp Falls in Initial Effort to Stage Comeback.

DICK HANLEY SUCCESSFUL

COACH OF PENDELTON HIGH IS ATHLETIC WIZARD.

Former W. S. C. Star Pilots Teams to Two School Championships in Succession.

PENDELTON, Or., May 20.—(Special.)—Coach Dick Hanley of Pacific coast football fame has closed his activities as athletic director of Pendleton high school after coaching and directing athletics for the past two years. He has the enviable record of winning six straight eastern Oregon championships, a perfect score in the two complete school seasons.

Coming here in the fall of 1920, Hanley took a raw football squad to the right field bleachers with the school administration, where each male student is examined and corrective calisthenics are taught. Over 100 of the male students are in competitive athletics.

Hanley came to Pendleton from Washington State college, where he was in all his branches of athletics, where he held four letters in football. In 1915 he was right halfback on the W. S. C. coast championship, and in 1916 he was quarterback on the team which played Brown university at Pasadena that Christmas, defeating the easterners by a score of 14 to 6.
