HOSPITAL OPENS JUNE 4

WALLA WALLA INSTITUTION TO HOUSE WAR VICTIMS. Federal Reservation Which Was Cavalry Post is Converted Into Sanitarium.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., May 20.—Fort Walla Walla, which for 60 years prior to 1911 served as a cavalry post for the United States army, is due to enter a period of new usefulness on June 4.

Following passage of an act of congress a year ago by which the fort was turned over to the treasury department by the war department, the fort has been re-modeled for its new use.

The hospital will include an ambulance ward to accommodate 60 patients, a semi-private ward with 24 beds, patients, and a central heating plant and laundry. The entire capacity of the institution will be 250 beds, together with a staff of 150 doctors, nurses and attendants.

In the vocational training which will be afforded the patients, agricultural pursuits will be prominent. Some 400 acres of rich soil now reserved for wheat farming, and ample water for irrigation purposes is available.
