Europe eagerly awaits the diet which these specialists propose. It is taken for granted they can cure Europe's ills or that if they can't, the disease is incurable. Certainly there is much more confidence in the Astoria conference than in either Geneva or The Hague. So far, the commentators say that it is the biggest conference since Versailles. That is a grave reflection on politics and politicians who have repeatedly failed in the task which everybody assumes these financiers can accomplish.

Although ostensibly called to consider merely a quick loan to Germany to tide her over the present crisis, it is certain that Morgan and his associates cannot be satisfied with mere palliatives or the administration of stimulants to a fainting world. They are not limited by any self-imposed rules such as Lloyd George labored under at Geneva. They are free to discuss treaty stipulations or disarmament, but are undoubtedly according to their own prominent place in their deliberations.

Bitter Pills Expected.
In short, their programme for the immediate emergency will carry stipulations for avoiding similar crises in the future.

The medicine to be recommended will include bitter pills for both Germany and France. But while such medicine would not be swallowed if it were to be prescribed by politicians, it is very likely that the prestige of these financial specialists will carry influence.

"The doctor says you must be quick" is likely to prove a potent argument with politicians. So, if the old family doctors will keep their hands off, there is more hope for recovery now than for some time past.

CLOTURE RULE DROPPED

REPUBLICANS FEAR INABILITY TO PASS MEASURE.

Senate Takes Up Consideration of Tariff Rate on Steel Wire, Proposing Increases.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 27.—Although the question is still open, it became increasingly probable, after a conference today of republican senators, that the move to invoke cloture during consideration of the tariff bill, would be successful. With the democrats regarded as solidly against the proposal, an informal canvass on the republican side, leaders said, showed that a sufficient number of republicans were in opposition to defeat a cloture rule in connection with the tariff.

Cloture advocates, failing to obtain a party declaration in favor of the rule, circulated a petition for signatures to a statement placing senators behind the cloture movement, but leaving to the republican conference the time it should be brought forth. The democrats, joined at times by some republicans, made a strenuous fight against the increases proposed, but without success.

The committee, however, receded from all of its original recommendations, cutting the rates proposed, and Senator McCumber, republican, North Dakota, in charge of the bill, intimated that some further reductions might be proposed when the senate took up the paragraph for a final vote after committee amendments in the entire bill have been disposed of.

On steel wire, above 6 cents a pound, and on all other steel wire not specially provided for, the senate approved a duty of 25 per cent ad valorem as compared with the house rate of 30 per cent on the basis of American valuation and a rate of 35 per cent, originally proposed by the committee, in insulated telegraph and telephone wire and other wires and cables, the senate approved a rate of 35 per cent in place of the

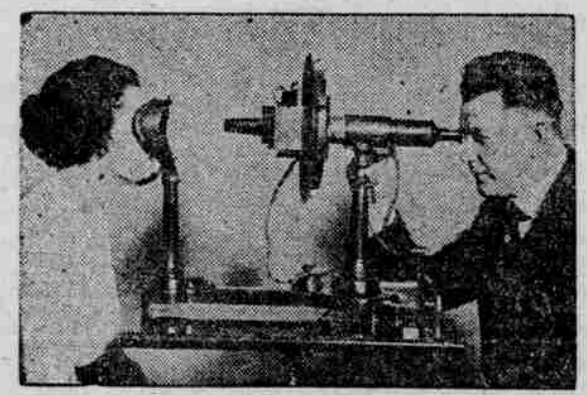
