

SUSPECTED SLAYER OF 1907 IS CAUGHT

Man in Peru Thought to Have
Killed Seattle Woman.

IDENTITY TO BE STUDIED

Other Suspect, Held Responsible
for Part in Throwing Body
Into Bay, Disappears.

OLYMPIA, Wash., May 27.—(Special.)—Arrested by the authorities at Callao, Peru, as one of two men implicated in the murder of Mrs. Agnes Covington at Seattle, September 2, 1907, a man believed to be Charles Burlinson is being held there while state and federal authorities here make a further check of his identity. It was announced from the governor's office late today.

Burlinson and Frank Covington, husband of the murdered woman, are charged jointly with causing her death. Mrs. Covington was strangled to death and her body placed in a trunk, which was thrown in the bay at Eagle Harbor, near Seattle. Since the murder state officials and Seattle police detectives have searched unsuccessfully for both Burlinson and Covington, who disappeared immediately after the murder, but without result until three months ago, when it was reported both men had been located at Lima, Peru.

One Suspect Disappears.

While cablegrams were passing back and forth through the state department of the United States looking toward the extradition of the pair, the man believed to be Burlinson disappeared. The other man turned up at Callao a few days ago, and, according to a cablegram from the American embassy at Lima, has been arrested. The man held calls himself Harry Ward and carries personal papers bearing that name, but the owner of the American bar at Callao states that he is known as Charles Burlinson.

Description of the man held checks in many particulars with that of Burlinson, allowing for the change that might take place in 15 years. The man says he arrived in Callao November 20, 1921, but had no passport or seaman's papers, telling the authorities that they had been lost.

Better Identification Sought.

Malcolm Douglas, prosecuting attorney of King county, has called for a conference to determine immediately whether request for the extradition of the man held as Burlinson would be justified. The decision was that a further check on varying points of the man's description should be made before the expense of extradition was incurred.

"We hesitate to put the state to the expense of returning Burlinson to Seattle for trial without being absolutely certain of his identity," prosecuting attorney Douglas said. "We had hoped to apprehend both Covington and Burlinson in Callao, as we would have had an excellent case with both, considering that the murder was committed 15 years ago. Nevertheless, if we can make certain of the identity of Burlinson we feel that we would be justified in requesting his extradition."

Murder Is Brutal.

The murder of Agnes Covington, 17-year-old bride, was of the most brutal kind and in some particulars a parallel to the murder of Mrs. Kate Moore Mahoney in Seattle last year. Covington married Agnes McComb in March, 1907, and they took up their residence at the high apartment house at Ninth and Stewart streets. Burlinson lived with them, the two men being close friends. Both were heavy drinkers. About September one of the tenants in the apartment house complained to the landlady of the noise and disturbance caused by Covington beating and choking his wife.

The landlady, a Mrs. Mackey, asked them to vacate the apartment. Mrs. Covington was last seen September 3 working about the apartment. Two days later Covington and Burlinson removed a trunk, had an expression call for it and take it to the dock, where it was placed on a steamboat and taken to Eagle Harbor, the men going on the same boat. The trunk was not seen after it was unloaded from the boat until it was picked up on the beach at Alki Point, five miles distant, about two weeks later. When the trunk was opened it was found to contain the body of Mrs. Covington, a knotted rope about her neck and in the trunk also were a sheet and a comforter from the Kewick apartments, marked with the landlady's name.

Burlinson left Eagle Harbor two or three days after the trunk was transported, after bidding goodbye to his friends. Covington returned to the Kewick apartments to obtain some personal belongings when his attention was called to the missing bedding he left a pair of blankets in exchange. He also left some personal belongings of Mrs. Covington which he said they could not use as they were camping at Alki Point.

Neither Covington nor Burlinson has been seen in Seattle since September 7, 1907.

Salvation Army Changes Made.

VANCOUVER, Wash., May 27.—(Special.)—Captain and Mrs. J. Pitt of Seattle have been designated to succeed Adjutant Jesse Roe and wife, in charge of the Salvation Army hut and the work in Vancouver. Adjutant and Mrs. Roe will go to Boise, Idaho, from here. They will be given an official farewell at the Sunday evening and on Tuesday evening a farewell entertainment will be given with the girls of the White Shield home of Portland and No. 1 corps bands taking part.

Sunday School Convention Today.

The North Clackamas district Sunday school convention will meet in the Evangelical church at Milwaukie at 2 o'clock this afternoon and tonight. Rev. A. J. Ware of Oregon City, president of the Clackamas County association, and prominent Sunday school workers from Portland will be the speakers. Special music will be rendered by the junior choruses of Oak Grove and Milwaukie.

New Vader Plant Rising.

CENTRALIA, Wash., May 27.—(Special.)—The Vader Sewer Pipe company's new plant, construction of which was started this week, is being erected on the site of the Little Falls Clay company's former buildings, destroyed by fire several years ago, and will be modern in every detail. L. A. Spear, formerly secretary-treasurer of the Washington Brick, Lime & Sewer Pipe company of Spokane, is president of the new concern.

PORTLAND RAILWAY GETS POWER PERMIT

Franklin T. Griffith Is Back
From Trip East.

OAK GROVE PROJECT UP

President of Street-Car Company
Tells Plans for Developing
Hydraulic Plant.

Final approval of the Oak Grove development project, being carried on by the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, was obtained by Franklin T. Griffith, president, from the federal water power commission in Washington, D. C.

Mr. Griffith returned to Portland yesterday from the east, where, in addition to appearing before the federal water power commission, he held consultations with J. G. White & Co. of New York, engineer for the local company. He also accompanied Eric W. Hauser and his party to the White House when an invitation for President and Mrs. Harding to attend the Portland Rose Festival was presented.

100,000-Horse Power Is Aim.

"The Oak Grove project, which is located on the main fork of the Clackamas river, has for its ultimate object development of 100,000 horse power," said Mr. Griffith. "The initial development will be \$5,000, and this part of the project will be completed within two years."

"The type of development, as well as conduit line, were agreed upon in consultation with our engineers. J. G. White & Co. in New York. Several hundred men are now actively engaged on this enterprise, and the work will be prosecuted as rapidly as practicable. We are planning to utilize a large force of men and so plan operations that we can work continuously in the winter as well as in the summer."

"There are several tunnels to be

driven, and this work will be done during the winter."

The project includes the construction of a roadway 25 miles long, a dam in Oak Grove creek and a pipe line from the diversion of the dam to the power house site, a distance of 8 1/2 miles. The pipe line will be constructed of wood stave pipe, 100 inches in diameter, a pipe line which will be supplemented by even larger pipe when additional units are installed.

Other Improvements Planned.

Mr. Griffith stated that during the present year the company would install an additional 5000-horse power generator at the Bull Run plant, and within the next 90 days the company will install a 3000-horse power auxiliary steam plant at Salem to supplement the company's hydro-electric service in the Willamette valley.

In its betterment programme the company, he stated, is employing a larger force of men in Portland than has been the case at any time before in its history. This, he said, was necessary, largely, in caring for extension of services in new districts of the city.

The annual convention of the National Electric Light association, in Atlantic City, where more than 4700 members were registered. At this convention Mr. Griffith was advanced from third vice-president to second vice-president.

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The construction expenditures of the company," Mr. Griffith said, "in all departments, in 1922, will exceed \$1,000,000, a considerable sum of money will be necessary to care for the 1923 improvement programme."

CHAMPION COWS VIEWED

Cup Is Presented to Owner of
World's Most Productive Jersey.

MONMOUTH, Or., May 27.—(Special.)—The second day of the annual Jersey jubilee was passed at Polk county dairy farms. The principal attraction of the day was the McKee farm, three miles south of Independence, where 30 persons gathered to see three world champion Jerseys, including Lad's Iota, which holds the record for butterfat production.

Speakers were made by Professor Thomas Gentle of the Oregon normal

school and Representative C. N. McArthur, who after a brief review of Jersey history, presented to Mr. McKee a silver cup offered by the American Jersey Cattle club for the best record of butter for a period of one year and won by Lad's Iota, owned by Mr. McKee.

The unique feature of the programme was the showing of the three world champion Jerseys, Lad's Iota, St. Maves Lad's Lady, owned by Harry Iliff, whose farm is near McKee place, and St. Maves' Fretty Lady, owned by Lester C. Daniels of Tillamook, who brought his champion cow to the valley for this occasion.

Critic Teachers to Get Help.

OREGON NORMAL SCHOOL, Monmouth, May 27.—(Special.)—Four new instructors will be added to the teaching corps of the Independence training school beginning next September. This will increase the force to eight, one teacher to a grade. Recently the critic teachers threatened to resign unless they were given assistance. A mass meeting of taxpayers was called by the school board, and after a spirited two-hour debate the request for the four new teachers was endorsed by a three-to-one vote. At present the four critics supervise the work of 332 pupils and eight student teachers. Their salaries are paid jointly by the district and the state.

Ferry Starts New Schedule.

ILWACO, Wash., May 27.—(Special.)—The new schedule of the Astoria-North Beach ferry company operating the Tourist, went into effect today. It provides for three daily trips between Astoria and McGowan Stages operating between McGowan and North Bend meet the ferry twice daily. The Tourist was recently rebuilt at a cost of \$4000 and now accommodates 30 cars. A cafeteria will be maintained at McGowan this summer.
