I. E. Clays, ex-Portland policeman, said to have been associated with Dave Lightner and E. A. Brown in beating Japanese sailors out of approximately \$20,000 worth of cocaine, opium and liquor last April, was arrested yesterday on charges of violating the Harrison narcotics act.
