THE June report of Portland just compiled for community chest officials by Mrs. Margaret C. Bean, office treasurer, shows that 611 cases of disabled veterans were looked after during the month. Some of the boys were ill themselves, some asked attention for members of their families who were need of medical aid, and still others were in need of financial aid.

Seven hundred and seventeen office appointments were kept; 889 letters were written in behalf of boys applying for compensation and other necessities; 42 cases of men applying for federal board training were looked after; 160 visits were made into homes of ex-service men in distress by members of the office force; almost 1000 telephone calls from boys asking information and help were answered, and 126 notary seals were placed on legal docu-ments for the boys. The motor corps members were especially busy during the month of June: also cars were always in readiness for funerals of ex-service men or members of their families, as well
