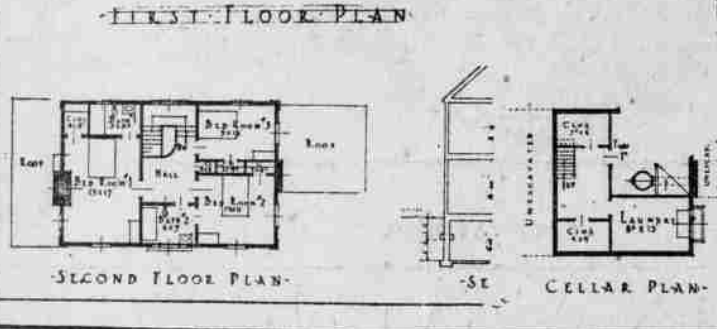
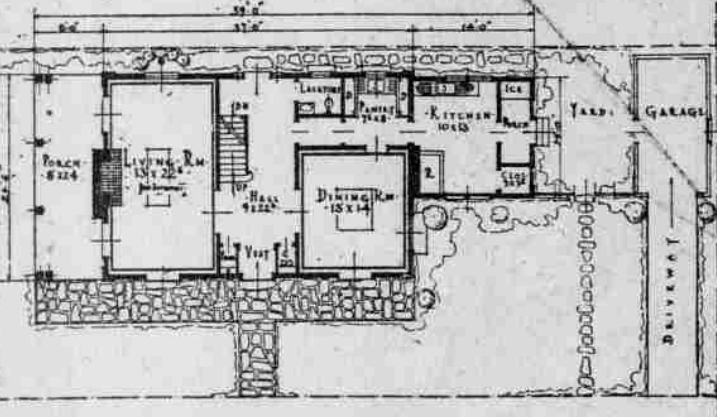
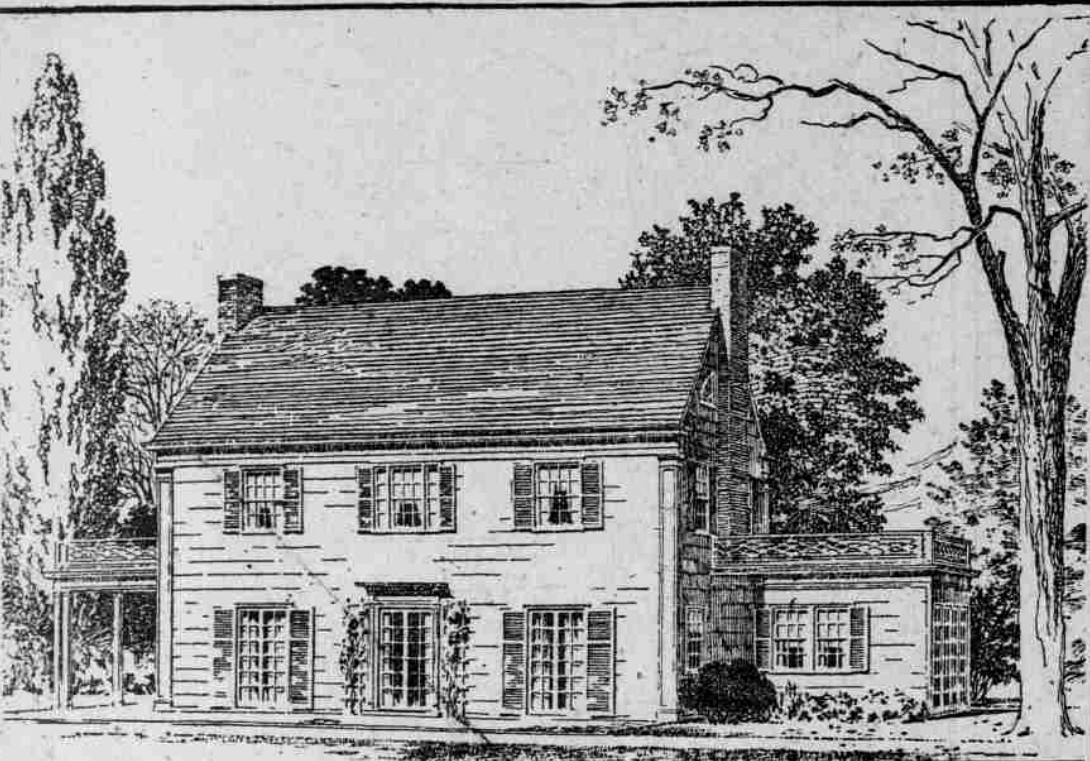


STALWART COLONIAL RESIDENCE CALLS EARLIER PERIOD TO MIND OF BEHOLDER

One's Imagination Can Easily Picture Quiet Evening on Commodious Porch—Lovers of Simple Dignity Will Be Enamored of Delicate Lines of Front Entrance.



REMINISCENT of an earlier period is this stalwart, upstanding colonial residence with its commodious porch at one end, where one's imagination can easily picture a pleasant, quiet evening. Lovers of simple dignity will be enamored of the delicate lines of the front entrance, with the doors of many glass panes and the flanking trellises entwined round about with climbing roses. The colorful blinds and double hung windows upstairs are artistic.

Kitchen Is Interesting.
Interesting also is the separate one-story kitchen jutting out from the house proper and the railing which makes a balcony of the roof. The placing of the kitchen to one side is a custom handed down from a past generation. On a hot summer's day, when the heat from cooking and baking in the kitchen discommodates the occupants of most houses, no discomfort is experienced in this, with the kitchen set apart. Nor need those in the kitchen itself be unduly troubled by the heat, because, with its direct exposure on three sides, large windows and doors, proper ventilation is an easy matter.

A vestibule admits us into a large stair hall, on one side of which we find a small coat closet, and on the other a phone booth. A large living room, 13 feet by 23 feet six inches, with an ample brick fireplace and a tile hearth, opens out onto the porch and the flagstone walk previously mentioned.

Dining Room Has French Door.
On the other side of the stair hall is the dining room with its French door opening on the walk. It is handsomely served from a butler's pantry with its own sink and built-in drawer cabinets on each side.

These are of the type which, fortunately, can now be obtained ready built from the mill, at a considerable saving under the cost of specially built equipment.

The washroom, a necessary convenience on the first floor and which most residences of the up and down stairs type lack, is located just off the stair hall. It is finished with a tile floor, and the wainscot, placed on cement plaster, is reinforced with metal lath.

The kitchen wing includes a service porch with separate ice compartment. The kitchen itself is well lighted and has a broom closet which helps keep everything in place.

Throughout, except in the kitchen, lavatory, and service hall, which are of maple, oak floors are used.

A large bedroom with bath, two smaller ones, and another bathroom occupy the second floor. The large bedroom has its own real fireplace and roomy closet.

Each of the other bedrooms is a cheery, corner room, well lighted and ventilated. All rooms on this floor are trimmed with birch and enameled old ivory. Floors are oak, except those of the bathrooms, which are tile.

Just a word, now, respecting a phase of home construction which is being closely watched by the careful homebuilder—fire safety. Unfortunately, many homes built with such attention and expense given to outward appearance have been slighted in this most important feature, because the better construction it necessitates costs a trifle more than ordinary inflammable construction.

Fire Protection Important.
Nevertheless, just as important as the decorations or the size or arrangement of the rooms is built in fire protection, such as concrete walls, cement basement floors, and metal lath on the plastered underside of the stairway, in the bearing partitions supporting the floors and in the firestops between the exterior wall studs on which the clapboards are nailed.

The flue lining for the massive chimneys is another important fire protection feature. All of these safeguards are essential in a building of the type described today, and are a most important element in removing its only drawback, namely, the danger to life in case of fire, especially when the alarm is sounded at night when all the occupants are above stairs.
