

REPUBLICANS HOPE TO WIN TEXAS

Democratic Split Is Taken as Good Omen.

BOURBON FIGHT BITTER

Ku Klux Klan and Prohibition Are Issues on Which Party Is Likely to Be Wrecked.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 5.—Administration leaders who have been watching the remarkable political embroilment which has developed in Texas are of the opinion that the party may afford an opportunity for electing a republican senator, even in such a democratic stronghold as the Lone Star state. With the democrats divided, as it is inevitable that they will be on such intense issues as the Ku Klux Klan and modification of the Volstead law, the reason to assume that an independent republican would be a strong contender in November.

With the primaries in the middle west disposed of this week, much interest will be felt in this run-off primary in August 20. The contenders for senatorial honors are Earle B. Mayfield of Austin, at present a member of the state railroad commission, who is expected to have the support of the militant prohibitionists as well as the Ku Klux Klan, and James H. Ferguson of Temple, the governor who was impeached but who has staged a wonderful "come back." Ferguson is running on a light-wine-and-beer platform, and is the hope of the very considerable faction among Texas democrats who feel that a victory for the Ku Klux Klan is a menace to the orderly processes of the good government.

Party Branch Expected.
The clash of advocates of these two leaders, holding ideas so diametrically opposed one to another, is bound to result in a breach of considerable magnitude in the democratic ranks of Texas, so much in fact that plans already are in the making to contest the right of either one to a seat in the senate regardless of which is victorious.

The certainty of such a contest, the result of which would be in doubt, is looked upon as another factor to aid a republican candidate.

Wayne B. Wheeler, general counsel of the anti-saloon league, an organization which wields more power than any other one agency in Washington outside of the government, has declared his intention of fighting Ferguson in every turn of the road. "He insists that Ferguson is unfit to sit in the senate and, if elected, that the Texas right to do so will be challenged on the ground that he was impeached and removed from office by the legislature of his state."

Issue Is Doubtful.
There are some senators who are inclined to doubt such a fight could be successfully waged against Ferguson, particularly when it is shown that politics entered into his impeachment, but the Anti-Saloon league has a way of winning that is characterized as uncanny.

However, should it be Mayfield, he, too, would be compelled to run the gauntlet of senatorial investigation on the basis of his Ku Klux Klan connection. It has been repeatedly charged that Mayfield is a member of the Klan and, as such, has taken an oath which will preclude the one required as United States senator. A similar contest was filed in 1905, when Reed Smoot of Utah first came to the senate, and when it was charged that as an apostle in the Mormon church he had taken an oath which made him ineligible as United States senator.

Smoot's Right Confirmed.
Smoot's right to his seat was confirmed after two years, but Brigham Roberts, also of Utah, was kept from a seat in the house about the same time under circumstances quite similar. Moreover, it should be borne in mind that Smoot was a republican, tried by a body in which the majority were members of his party, the senate dividing in his case, 25 to 42.

Mayfield could have no such advantage. In fact, the reverse would be true, as he could hardly count on the vote of four democratic senators who are members of the Catholic church, the curbing of which is a cardinal principle of the Ku Klux Klan.

The injured woman was picked up in front of the George Wade farm home and carried in for first aid and taken to St. Joseph's hospital as soon as possible. Today it was reported she probably will recover.

FRANCE RUSHES TROOPS

RESERVE SENT ALLIED ARMS IN CONSTANTINOPLE.

Artillery and Engineers Leave for Mariselles Under Emergency Orders; Advance Opposed.

PARIS, Aug. 5.—France is apparently rushing troops in considerable numbers to Constantinople to reinforce the 12,000 allied troops who are barring the Greek entry to the Turkish capital.

Artillery and engineers have been leaving their depot at Grenoble yesterday and today under emergency orders for Mariselles. Until tonight none of the troops have sailed, but it is widely credited that they will be leaving for Constantinople by instant a boat is available. The deepest secrecy surrounds the destination of the troops.

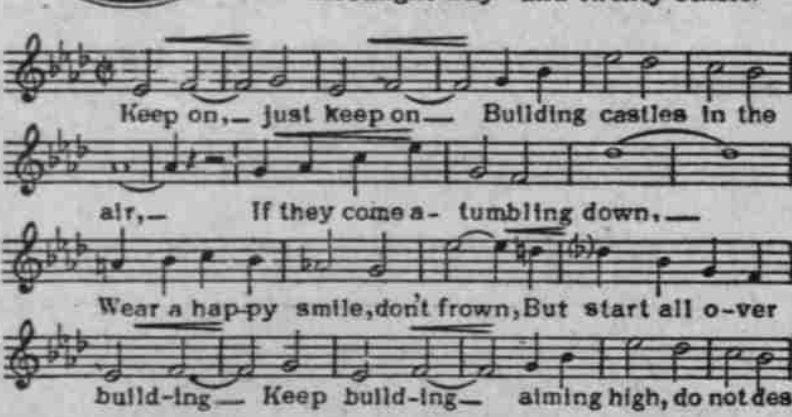
In the face of Mr. Lloyd George's expressed inclination in the house of commons to allow the Greeks to enter Constantinople, the French determination to prevent the Greek occupation of the capital is deeply ominous. French government officials have admitted that 8000 French, Algerian and Senegalese troops along the Chatalia line have received strict orders to prevent the Greek advance regardless of the action of British and Italian troops.

The cynical French are summing up the situation tonight that the Greeks are simply making Constantinople a first-rate affair for trading purposes in London, the British giving concessions on reparations and getting concessions in the Near East.

In its general aspect this is considered one phase of the struggle between French and British over the Mediterranean, where the bisection of the main French and British communications routes is the cause of the chief European jealousy.

FIGHT LOST UNLESS OTHER UNIONS JOIN

Hope of Striking Shopmen Rests With Others.

REPAIR WORK ESSENTIAL

Much Hangs on Whether New Men Are Competent and Rolling Stock Is Kept Going.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 5.—(Special.)—The sole remaining hope of the striking shopmen for winning their strike rests on other railway union organizations becoming involved. As the cards lie today the strike is broken so far as the larger systems are concerned. Some of the smaller roads which do not have terminals in the larger cities are still in difficulties. But the main transcontinental systems have men enough, it is said, to keep their cars and engines in fair repair and are adding to their numbers daily.

There is a serious dispute regarding the competency of these strikebreakers. Railway chiefs who are in Washington to consult with their representatives here insist that the men are doing high-class work. Reports to headquarters of the American Federation of Labor insist that the new men are incompetent and that the equipment of the various roads is getting into very bad repair.

On the truth of the latter statement may depend the outcome of the strike. Naturally the members of the other brotherhoods sympathize with the shopmen who quit to force the roads, if possible, to maintain the prevailing rate of wages. But that sympathy has been moral instead of active. However, when the strike began, officers of the brotherhoods quickly served notice on the various railroad executives that their men must not be asked to do any work which could even be interpreted in spirit as of a strike-breaking character. They were officially assured that their wishes in this respect would be observed.

Hard Problems Sighted.
Now the brotherhoods have let it be known that they will not handle equipment that is damaged or is dangerous. In that position they are entirely within their rights and will be upheld by the railroad officials. But the question of just when the strike will move up to the point of a strike-breaking character. SAFE-CRACKER WALKS INTO REVOLVER OF OFFICER.

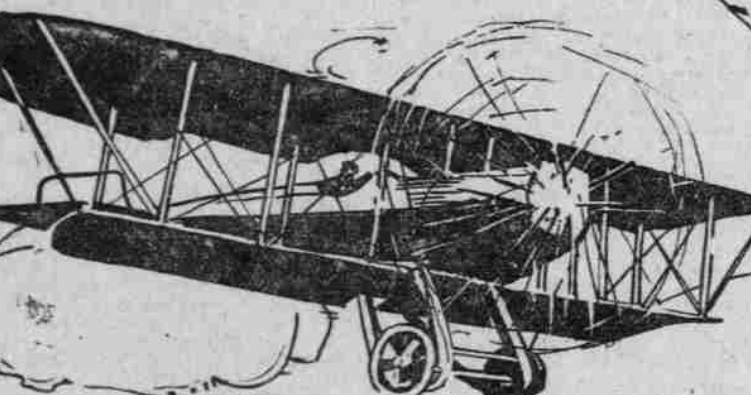
Merchant Patrolman Waits Two Hours to Intercept Unarmed Robber Leaving His Job.
