

BALLAINE STRENGTH BACKS MRS. AXTELL

Anti-Pointdexter Republican Sponsors Woman's Fight.

OPENING RALLY VIOLENT

Speakers Devote Time to Bitter Arraignment of Senator and His Record in Congress.

PUGET SOUND BUREAU, Seattle, Wash., Aug. 5.—(Special.)—John E. Ballaine turned up Friday night as chairman of the first Seattle meeting in the interest of Mrs. Frances C. Axtell's candidacy for the United States senate.

This completes the count of noses of those who, at one time or another this year, have declared themselves so much opposed to the re-election of Senator Pointdexter that they were willing to be candidates for the republican nomination. One after another they either have filed for the nomination or pulled out of the contest. Major Ballaine's appearance in behalf of Mrs. Axtell fits his place in the fight.

Audience Anti-Pointdexter.—Not many Seattle citizens turned out to greet Mrs. Axtell Friday evening and the thousands who stayed away from the Wilkes theater, in which the meeting was held, missed the opportunity of hearing virtually everything of evil report that it seems possible to say about Senator Pointdexter.

The meeting, judged by its demonstrations, didn't seem to be so much pro-Axtell, but it was decidedly anti-Pointdexter. Every hot shot against the senator was hailed with approbation by an audience which partly filled the lower portion of the house.

Senator Branded "Judas."—Ben C. Marsh, representing the Farmers' union, who came all the way from somewhere back east to take part in the Washington contest, referred to Pointdexter as "Judas Iscariot" and got a good laugh and a big hand. Yet this was one of the mildest of the many allusions that every speaker made to the senator.

So far as this meeting is concerned there was no one in the senatorial running except Mrs. Axtell and Senator Pointdexter. Austin E. Griffiths, Colonel George R. Lamping and George H. Stevenson, all of whom have filed for the republican nomination, were passed up as persons of no possible consequence.

Other Parties Ignored.—James A. Duncan, who will be the senatorial candidate of the farmer-labor party, and C. H. Dill, who seems to have a clutch on the democratic nomination, were not even mentioned. Pointdexter, according to the tenor of the speeches, was to be beaten and Mrs. Axtell is the woman who can do it.

The big stage of the Wilkes theater was but sparsely occupied for the occasion. There were Mrs. Axtell, the candidate, Major Ballaine, the chairman, Ben Marsh, the William H. Short, president of the state federation of labor—these four and no more. But all that was lacking in numbers was made up for in eloquence.

Seattle Not Antisocial.—Some of the more shrewd political advisers of Mrs. Axtell's campaign had warned against a meeting in so large an auditorium at this early stage of the campaign. The scant audience in attendance was not to justify the unheeded warning. Seattle is not yet greatly excited over the senatorial campaign.

Senator Pointdexter, with all the prestige of incumbency and the force of a standing organization, was not able to crowd the house at his meeting last night and the newer and less well-known candidates cannot expect to have any better luck until the campaign warms up.

Mrs. Axtell Assured Victory.—Following the comparatively brief speeches of Chairman Ballaine, Marsh and Short, Mrs. Axtell spoke at considerable length, featuring numerous allegations of Senator Pointdexter's unfitness for the office and misrepresentation of the real sentiments of the people of the state and emphasizing her own belief that this is a campaign of progressivism versus standstillism.

Mrs. Julia A. Freeman.—Mrs. Julia A. Freeman, 59, mother of Frank A. Freeman of Freeman, Smith & Camp company and an Oregon pioneer of 1843, died Friday night. Funeral services probably will be held from Finley's chapel tomorrow afternoon. Although definite arrangements were not made yesterday.

She was born near Cincinnati, Ohio, August 29, 1842, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Morgan. With her parents she

came to Oregon, crossing the plains and arriving at The Dalles November 16, 1843. The pioneer party moved down the river and landed near the present site of Linnton, settling on Oak island. Later her father took up a land claim on Sauvie island. She was educated at Oregon City. In 1876 she was married to Andrew Jackson Freeman, who died February 29, 1911.

Two sons and a daughter survive. They are Frank A. and William M. Freeman of this city and Mary Frances Salsbury of Chowchilla, Cal.

Orchardists Want Work Done by Apple Harvest Time.

HOOD RIVER, Or., Aug. 5.—(Special.)—Orchardists of the Barret district today warned the Garrow-Ward Construction company now laying a mile of concrete paving on the main west side road, that they would ask court injunction to prevent work there after August 30. This date, say grocers who have 200,000 boxes of apples to move to the city over the thoroughfare, is the last on which concrete could be poured and cured for traffic by apple harvest time. The company's contract calls for completion of the work by August 20.

FUNDS SUFFICIENT FOR INSTITUTIONS

Only Three Plants to Create Deficiency This Biennium.

PRAISE IS GIVEN HEADS

Although Population Shows Considerable Increase, Expenses Are Reduced to Minimum.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 5.—(Special.)—Despite the marked increase in the population of the several state institutions, all but three of them will complete the biennium without creating a deficit, according to a report prepared here today by R. B. Goodin, state purchasing agent, for the consideration of the state board of control.

The institutions that will not require any money in addition to their appropriations include the Oregon state hospital, Oregon state tuberculosis hospital, Oregon state industrial school for girls, eastern Oregon state hospital and the Oregon state soldiers' home.

Those that are expected to create a deficit are the state penitentiary, Oregon state training school and the Oregon state school for the deaf.

Hospital Gets \$900,000.—The 1921 legislature appropriated a total of \$900,000 for the conduct of the Oregon state hospital. This appropriation included maintenance \$250,000, hospital and amusements \$250,000, transportation for persons committed \$250,000, general repairs \$25,000, laboratories \$27,000, furniture \$25,000, cold storage plant \$50,000, feed barn at cottage farm \$12,000, dairy cows \$5000 and fire prevention and inspection \$12,500.

The showing made by the superintendent of the state hospital is remarkable, officials said, when it is considered that the original appropriation was based on a much smaller population and was twice reduced before it finally received the sanction of the legislature.

Deficit Not to Be Created.—For the state institution for the feeble-minded there was appropriated \$231,300, including \$25,200 for maintenance, \$20,000 for general repairs and replacements and \$15,000 for additional water supply. There had been expended August 1 \$231,347.76, leaving approximately \$9,952.24. There has been expended \$231,347.76, leaving approximately \$9,952.24.

The Oregon state tuberculosis hospital received an appropriation of \$125,750, including \$125,000 for maintenance and \$750 for general repairs and replacements. Of this amount \$104,895.17 has been expended, leaving \$20,854.83 to pay the balance of the institution until January 1. No deficit will be created by this institution.

There was appropriated for the Oregon state school for the blind \$44,500, including \$40,000 for maintenance and \$4,500 for repairs and replacements. There has been expended \$35,254.12, leaving \$9,245.88 for the remainder of the biennium. This amount of money will be sufficient to meet the requirements of the institution until the expiration of the biennium.

For the eastern Oregon state hospital there was appropriated \$202,368, including \$200,760 for maintenance, \$5000 for the transportation of patients, \$1200 for library and amusements, \$12,000 for installing electric generating plant and \$2500 for repairs and replacements. There has been expended of the maintenance fund \$185,574.61 and of the other funds sufficient to bring the entire outlay up to \$202,367.21. There remains of the appropriation for the eastern Oregon hospital \$85,193.25, which will care for the needs of the institution until the end of the year.

Prison to Have Deficit.—The old soldiers' home appropriation, which aggregated \$71,720 and which is financed by federal financial assistance, will be sufficient to care for the demands of the institution until the next legislature. Improvements at the soldiers' home during the last year included a central heating plant at a cost of \$25,000. The betterments there represented a total expenditure of \$22,225.

For the penitentiary there was appropriated \$326,000, including \$296,000 for maintenance, \$20,000 for general repairs, \$10,000 for the purchase of lands and \$3000 for the purchase of vehicles. There has been expended \$310,971, leaving a balance of \$45,723 for the remainder of the biennium. Because of the fact that the population of the prison has increased more than 100 since the appropriation was made, a slight deficit will have been created at the close of the biennium.

There also will be a deficit at the state training school for boys.

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There was appropriated for this institution \$128,300, including \$117,000 for maintenance, \$10,300 for repairs and replacements and \$1000 for the return of fugitives. There has been expended \$118,805.79, leaving only \$9414 to conduct this institution during the latest six months of the biennium. In fairness to W. L. Kuser, new superintendent of the training school, officials said that the greater depletion of the funds accrued prior to the time he assumed charge there a few months ago.

The Oregon state school for the deaf, for which there was appropriated \$104,850, also will have a deficit to present to the next legislature. There has been expended at the school \$101,955.57, leaving only \$12895 to meet the demands of the institution until January 1.

Officials who have studied the figures included in Mr. Goodin's report declared that the financial showing made by the superintendents of the institutions during the past 18 months is worthy of praise. The population of all of the institutions has shown a marked increase, while the cost of labor and materials has been reduced only slightly.

In some instances, it was said, the institutions will require a substantial amount of money back to the state at the end of the biennium.

TROUBLE LAID TO HOLDUP

SUSPENDED BUREAU CHIEF SAYS HE WAS DAZED.

R. G. McMullen, Who Failed to Appear for Work, Declares Thugs Inflicted Injuries.

R. G. McMullen, suspended chief of the bureau of maintenance, was the victim of a hold-up last Wednesday night, receiving a blow on the head which dazed him and incapacitated him for work, according to the story he related to his family. This story he also repeated yesterday to a fellow employee of the city, baring his head to show the welt alleged to have been inflicted by the thugs.

McMullen's story, to account for absence from duty without leave, was that while riding in his automobile in the Lewis district Wednesday evening he picked up two strangers. He had driven them but a short distance when he was dealt a heavy blow across the back of his head and robbed of his watch and what money he had. This alleged attack he did not report to the police.

The assumption is given that the blow so dazed McMullen that he did not know just what he was doing for two or three days. His wife reported to the office of City Engineer Laugaard that he had left both succeeding mornings for his work. Mr. Laugaard waited him at the office in vain. On Friday the order for a 30-day suspension without pay was issued by Mr. Laugaard to the approval of Commissioner Barbur.

Again yesterday morning Mr. McMullen reported that her husband had left for the city hall, but he failed to put in an appearance there before the hall closed at noon. O. E. Stanley, sewer engineer, has been selected by Mr. Laugaard to direct the maintenance work while McMullen is suspended. There are six general foremen and a larger number of sub-foremen engaged on street, sidewalk, sewer and bridge work of the maintenance bureau.

One of the pending tasks just in the line of preparing the bureau budget for 1923, which McMullen was supposed to have completed yesterday.

CHINATOWN BARS PUT UP

Hammering and Sawing Goes on Behind Closed Doors.

Yesterday morning policemen on beat along Second street heard the echo of hammer and saw coming from 73 and 77 North Second street. Investigation proved futile for the policemen and detectives were stopped by locked doors when they attempted to find out what was going on.

Just at present the department is helpless, because there is a temporary restraining order in force against the tearing down of such barriers.
