POINDEXER HOLDS OWN

James A. Duncan, Seattle Laborer, Enters Race as Champion of Farmer-Labor Party.

PIQUET SOUND BUREAU, Seattle, Wash., Aug. 12.—Senator PoinDEXER is back in Seattle for a few days' rest.

All candidates for the republican senatorial nomination thus are accounted for at the moment.

Progress Is Made Despite Insufficient Money.

GOOD SHOWING REPORTED

Miss Cornelia Marvin Prepares Statistics Covering Many Branches of Service.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 12.—(Special).—The public libraries of Oregon, although not receiving financial assistance sufficient to meet the requirements of the American Library association, in many instances have operated on a plane of efficiency not excelled by libraries in any part of the United States.

Miss Cornelia Marvin, state librarian, has prepared statistics covering the public libraries of Oregon for the year 1921.

The American Library association, according to Miss Marvin, has indicated in its report that \$1 per capita is necessary to properly conduct a public library.

Medford Leads Cities. Medford, which Miss Marvin said has one of the most modern and active public libraries in Oregon, received 97 cents per capita during the 12 months covered in the state library's report.

Medford ranked first with a circulation per capita of 1.13, while Portland ranked second with a per capita income of 95 cents.

The Dalles public library scored first with relation to its registration per capita. The registration of this library, based on its population, was 91 per cent, and compares well with any library in the United States.

Miss Marvin explained that it was difficult to compare registrations of the libraries in various parts of the state because of the different systems of conducting the institutions.

Other public libraries of the state, ranked according to population, follow: Umatilla county—Population, 25,846; circulation, 30,923.
