

CHARMING GIRL IS CHOSEN BEAUTY QUEEN IN SEATTLE COMPETITION.

Idaho Parties to Nominate Candidates Tuesday.

DELEGATES OFF TODAY

Democrats Mention W. H. Hornbrook If Agreement on Others Is Not Reached.

BOISE, Idaho, Aug. 19.—(Special.)—Charles C. Moore of St. Anthony, present lieutenant-governor of Idaho, will be the republican party's candidate for governor, and Moses Alexander of Boise, twice governor of this state, will be the democratic gubernatorial candidate as the result of the state conventions to be held next Tuesday.

Practically all doubt as to the nomination of these two men was removed Tuesday when the conventions were held in the 44 counties in the state and delegates to the state conventions were elected. Mr. Moore's friends have control of the republican conclave. The St. Anthony statesman will have the unique distinction of being the first representative unopposed, or if opposed only by a dark horse who might be brought out at the last moment, late to turn the trend of sentiment among the delegates.

Mr. Morgan May Withdraw. Mr. Alexander's forces captured a majority of the delegates elected to the democratic state convention. It is not at all improbable that William M. Morgan, whose friends have been active, will withdraw from the race before the delegates actually vote.

The third or progressive party is not so positive as to candidates. But that it will be a factor to be considered, not in the light of winning, but in the light of the number of votes that it will pull away from the leading candidates on the two other tickets, is conceded by party leaders.

The progressives meet at Nampa, the democratic at Halley and the republicans at Walla Walla. The law sets next Tuesday as the date when all three conventions must be held, their tickets nominated and platforms promulgated. Of these conventions that of the republicans will be the largest. Arrangements have been made by the republicans to travel to Walla Walla in a train de luxe, specially made up for the delegates to make the long trip which will take the better part of a week.

Train Will Start Today. This train will leave Pocatello at noon Sunday, picking up at that point all of the delegates from the southeastern part of the state. As it continues west, it will be joined by the delegates from the southern Idaho counties and at Nampa Sunday evening will pick up the southwestern Idaho delegates. The northern delegates will join the special at Spokane.

There is but one development which may change the predictions with regard to the action that these three conventions will take, particularly the democratic. The democrats are desperately anxious that the progressive party should put up a candidate for governor or candidates for state offices. Many of them realize that a three-cornered fight the democratic strength will be serious. They propose pooling of the strength of the democrats and the progressives.

Progressives Against Pool. The progressive leaders are unalterably opposed to this pool. They declare that their party will put up a complete ticket, and that the democrats will likely be the party's candidates for governor and state offices. H. P. Samuels of Nampa, head of the state grange, and C. R. Jepperson of Arco, deal in a man of considerable influence especially among the farmers. Jepperson was the league's candidate for representative.

Failure to bring about this proposed consolidation may result in a changed situation at the democratic convention. Many democrats predict that Mr. Alexander may not be willing to accept the nomination for governor and that the fight for the nomination may therefore be between Morgan and some man whom they have been active to bring about the nomination of Alexander. In that connection the name of Will H. Hornbrook of Boise is heard. Mr. Hornbrook refused to get into the gubernatorial fight, although he was urged to do so by many leaders of his party. Resolutions supporting Mr. Pierce and recommending him to the voters of the state and also advocating a tax reduction were adopted by the meeting.

7000 Acres to Be Developed.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Aug. 19.—(Special.)—The department of conservation and development, through the division of reclamation, has entered into a contract with the White Stone reclamation district to make studies, plans and specifications which will lead to profitable development of between 7000 and 8000 acres of high-class agricultural land lying between Tonasket and Loomis in Okanogan county. Dan A. Scott, director of the department, announced today. The state college of Washington has conducted a soil survey and made a most favorable report as to the agricultural possibilities in the district.

RIVALS COMBINE FORCES

KAY AND BURDICK REPORT-ED JOINING HANDS.

Object Said to Be Defeat of K. K. K. Kuhl for Speakership of House at Salem.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 19.—(Special.)—Denton G. Burdick and T. B. Kay, candidates for speaker of the house of representatives at the 1923 session of the legislature, have formed a coalition in an effort to defeat K. K. Kuhl of Multnomah county, who also aspires to the speakership. This report was said to have been confirmed by Mr. Burdick following a conference with Mr. Kay here last night.

It was reported that both Mr. Kay and Mr. Burdick are out of harmony with Mr. Kuhl and that a caucus of the Kay and Burdick forces will be held soon after the November election, when the speakership will probably be held in Portland. Should neither Mr. Burdick nor Mr. Kay be able to assemble sufficient strength to insure the election of one of them as speaker, they plan to advance the name of a so-called dark horse, who is said to be a former legislator. No information was given as to the identity of the candidate they have in mind, but he was said to reside outside of Multnomah county.

"You will, therefore, readily understand that failure to re-elect Senator Polinder will spell almost certain disaster to the proposed development of the Pacific coast, and might easily result in the loss of many ships being transferred back to the Atlantic.

"I do not know very much about the situation in the eastern papers, but it appears to be fraught with grave concern. The same thought has occurred to others. Dr. Hagan, who represents the Mare Island people here, and Mr. Haas, representative of the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce, and Mr. Armstrong, representative of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce, have spoken to me about Senator Polinder's re-election.

"At the meetings with these gentlemen the conclusion was reached that it might be possible for some of the California people to help in the campaign by writing to their business friends in the state of Washington and pointing out to them the gravity of the situation.

Business Interests Concerned. To bring the thing down to a practical point, Mr. Haas and Dr. Hagan asked me to obtain, if possible, from the chamber of commerce, a list of Californians who are doing business in Washington. If you can compile such a list they would have their own way in writing to their business friends asking them to do everything possible to bring about Senator Polinder's re-election, and stating the reasons therefor. All the information I have had about the forthcoming election indicates that John H. Ball is the only candidate who has appeared against Senator Polinder.

Letter From Washington Urges Coast Commerce Bodies to Line Up for Solon.

PUGET SOUND BUREAU, Seattle, Wash., Aug. 19.—"Failure to re-elect Senator Polinder will spell almost certain disaster to the proposed development of the Pacific coast. If anything is to be accomplished in the future, the attitude that Mr. Polinder is sure to be elected we are likely to get a surprise."

These warnings were conveyed to the Seattle chamber of commerce in a confidential letter from Washington, D. C., and were transmitted by the chamber to the naval affairs committee of the Puget sound inter-city council, along with other suggestions of political activity, with the chamber's notation that they deserved "very serious consideration." The letter also disclosed the deep concern of California business interests in the senatorial situation in this state and the possibility of Senator Polinder's defeat. Traditions to Be Upset. The Seattle chamber of commerce has a traditional policy of non-intervention in politics. So, also, have the chambers of commerce of San Francisco and Los Angeles. But the Washington letter indicated a willingness on the part of California commercial bodies to relax that policy in the desire to aid Senator Polinder. The Seattle chamber's recommendation of a definite plan of political action for very serious consideration. It is the policy of the chamber of commerce to support a similar willingness to upset tradition.

It has been so construed by Austin E. Griffiths, who is seeking the republican senatorial nomination in opposition to Senator Polinder. In some of the ways by which the chamber of commerce has been occasionally become known, Judge Griffiths learned of the letter from Washington and the nature of its contents. He promptly replied to Judge Griffiths, assuring him that the chamber was adhering to its ancient policy; that it had not and would not lend its support to any candidate.

Secret Operations Develop. What Judge Griffiths may not have known at the time of his inquiry, and what he has learned from any of the replies received by him, was the fact that the Washington letter already had been referred to a confidential committee, chairman of the inter-city naval affairs committee, with the chamber's official recommendation for its consideration. The committee, organized last spring, consists of the officers and a considerable number of the most influential members of the Seattle chamber of commerce and the Tacoma commercial club. Its purpose is to promote united action on all matters of importance to the Pacific coast. The chamber's letter of transmission, quoting largely from the Washington letter, is as follows:

Letter Branding Scare-Crow. In his letter of inquiry addressed to the officers and members of the Seattle chamber Judge Griffiths pointed out that the situation had changed materially since the time when it appeared that Major Baillain might be the only candidate against Senator Polinder. Judge Griffiths also declared his belief that the Washington letter was "deserving of the most serious consideration."

"It is one of the usual 'scare-crow' letters sent out by the chamber of commerce for the purpose of drumming up support," wrote Judge Griffiths. "There are several matters in the letter which are worthy of serious consideration. The idea that Californians are interested in the return of Senator Polinder is a very serious matter. It is a matter which should be considered by the chamber of commerce at the Rainier convention. The fact that the chamber of commerce at San Francisco has accepted and determined as the premier naval base on the Pacific coast and that it was a provincial on our part to expect Bremerton to be made more than a subordinate station. 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FAMOUS MASTERS PLAN ART EXHIBIT

Oregon State Fair to Have New Department.

MANY PAINTINGS LISTED

Mrs. Alice Weister of Portland Is Gratified at Response of Eastern Exhibitors.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 19.—(Special.)—Officials of the Oregon state fair have announced a special attraction in the art department this year, a collection of 30 pictures from the Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York city, to be sent west in time to be exhibited at the 81st annual exhibition, which opens in Salem, September 25.

This is the finest loan exhibit that ever has been sent out in the United States and consists of perfect replicas of original paintings by the world's greatest masters. Every school of art, including the

American, will be shown, and it is of particular interest that the group includes one canvas by E. Irving Couse, whom Oregon claims as a local product. Mr. Couse, who has become famous for his paintings of the American Indian, is represented in the collection by his works, which have a place in the homes of relatives—the Kamm family in Portland and Mrs. Claybourne Walker and Mrs. W. Connell Dyer in Salem.

Mrs. Alice Weister of Portland, who comes again to the state fair, as head of the department, has put forth special effort to secure the exhibit and feels particularly gratified over the result. And because of this loan, and its distinction, numerous northwest artists who have not previously sent their work to the state fair will be represented this year.

Mrs. Horstfall to Assist. Mrs. Weister has been working and planning for the department for some time past, directing her activities from her summer home at Manzanita beach. She will be assisted in the department by Mrs. R. Bruce Horstfall, also of Portland, wife of the widely-known painter of bird life, whose work has been exhibited both in Portland and Salem at special affairs.

Practically every Oregon artist of distinction will have work on display, and as heretofore, the children of the state, who will be the state's artists of the future, will have a special section all to themselves. This is in line with the state's efforts to encourage budding genius and stimulate interest in things artistic among the girls and boys of Oregon.

Furthering this effort will be daily informal talks and lectures in the

art department, for the most part covering the loan exhibit and the painters represented.
