Another pair, of black kid also, has the cuff embroidered in white in a lace effect. Some of these bags are of satin-striped moire with white frame and clasp; others are of shiny, black leather with clasp and frame of pierced white metal.

"O, I hope not," she replied, "I just hate home-caught fish." L. R.

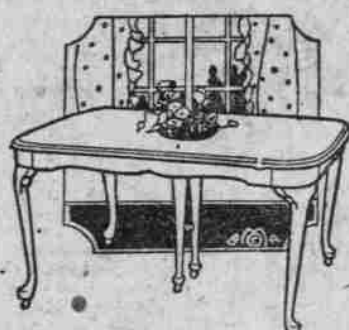
