

YANKS WIN PENNANT, DEFEAT BOSTON, 3-1

New York Cinches Contest in First Inning.

PENNOCK IS MOUND STAR

With Bases Full, Wallie Pipp Singles to Right, Scoring Witt and Dugan.

BOSTON, Sept. 30.—New York won the American league pennant by defeating Boston, 3 to 1, today. The Yankees captured their eighth American league pennant today, after having won the first two games of the series to the Red Sox.

Alex Ferguson started pitching for Boston. Witt led off for the visitors with a single to wide for Pratt. Dugan looped a single to short right. Both hunted down the third base line and was credited with a hit when O'Rourke fumbled as he slipped in fielding the ball. Witt, the bases full Wallie Pipp singled to right, scoring Witt and Dugan. Ruth moved over to third on the throw home. Pennock replaced Ferguson, Ruth scored on Meusel's sacrifice fly to deep center.

For the rest of the game, New York succeeded in making but three hits and could not score. Pennock pitched remarkably well. He gave way to a pinch hitter, and Karp pitched the last two innings.

Boston scored its run in the seventh when O'Rourke singled, took third on John Collins' third straight hit of the game and scored as Mitchell forced Collins at second. In the ninth Hoyt, who had been pitching superbly, passed Mitchell, and Ruel singled to right. Manager Huggins then sent in Bush. On the first pitched ball, Mitchell was picked off second base. Schanz to Scott. Karp walked. Menosky flied out to Meusel in deep right, and Chaplin, batting for Miller, was tossed out by Ward.

WHITE SOX TROUNCED, 11-7

St. Louis Fights for Victory as if All Were at Stake.

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 30.—All pennant hopes shattered by New York's victory over Boston, St. Louis went ahead an 11-7 rout of the White Sox in a game that was a real slugfest. The Sox, who had won the first two games of the series, were trounced 11 to 7, finishing their White Sox twelfth for 16 hits. Johnny Tobin got three hits out of three times at bat, and brought in three runs. It was "Shocker" day and the local right-hander was presented with a seven-pennant anniversary. He pitched fairly well throughout, but in the seventh the visitors tallied five times.

George Sisler, declared the most valuable player in the league this season, got his eighth homer of the season in the sixth by collaring the ball into the rightfield stands. One was on base when the circuit drive came off H. Blankenship. Sisler's double in the first, scoring Tobin. Score:

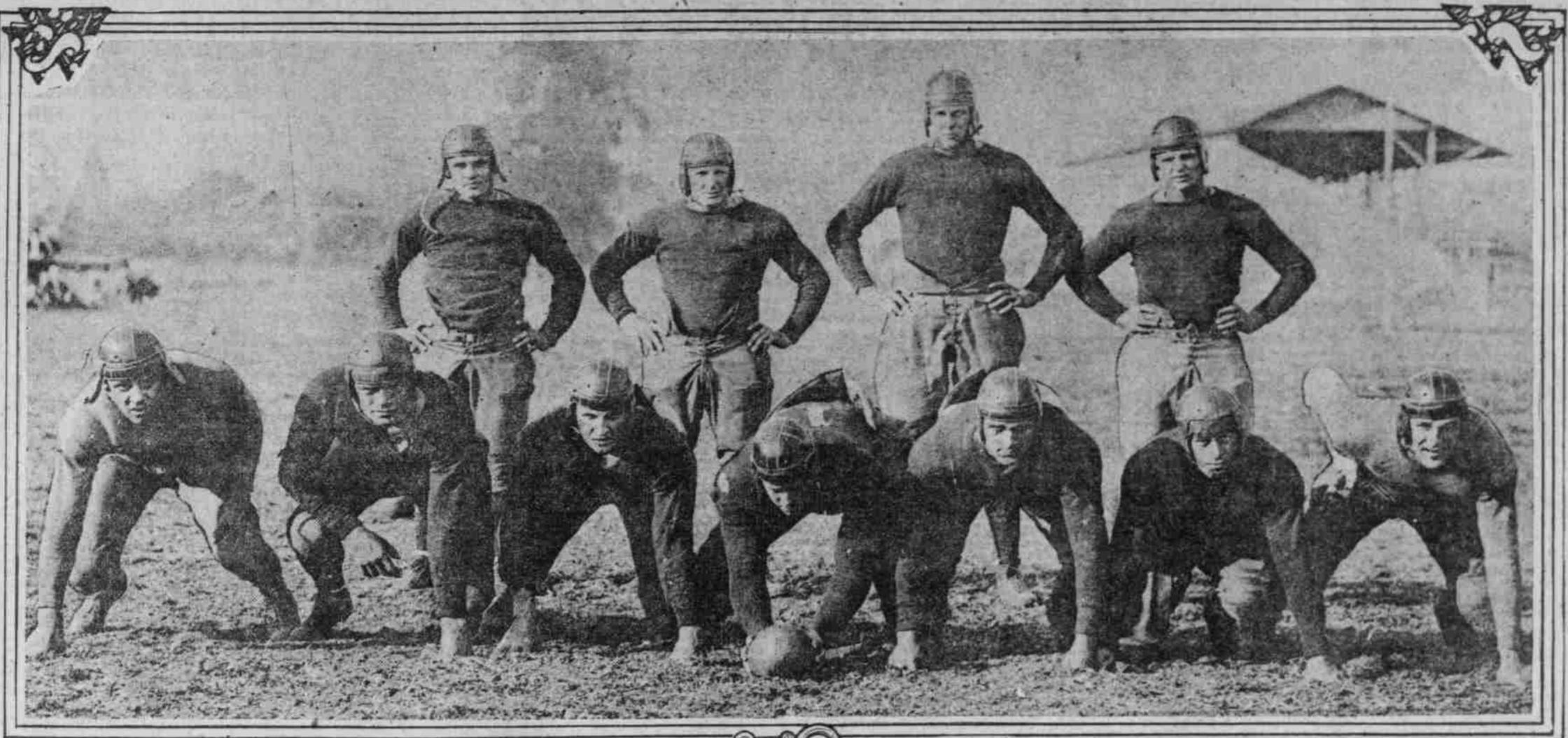
EX-FIGHTER IS MARRIED

Bud Anderson and Mrs. Alexander Wedded at Vancouver.

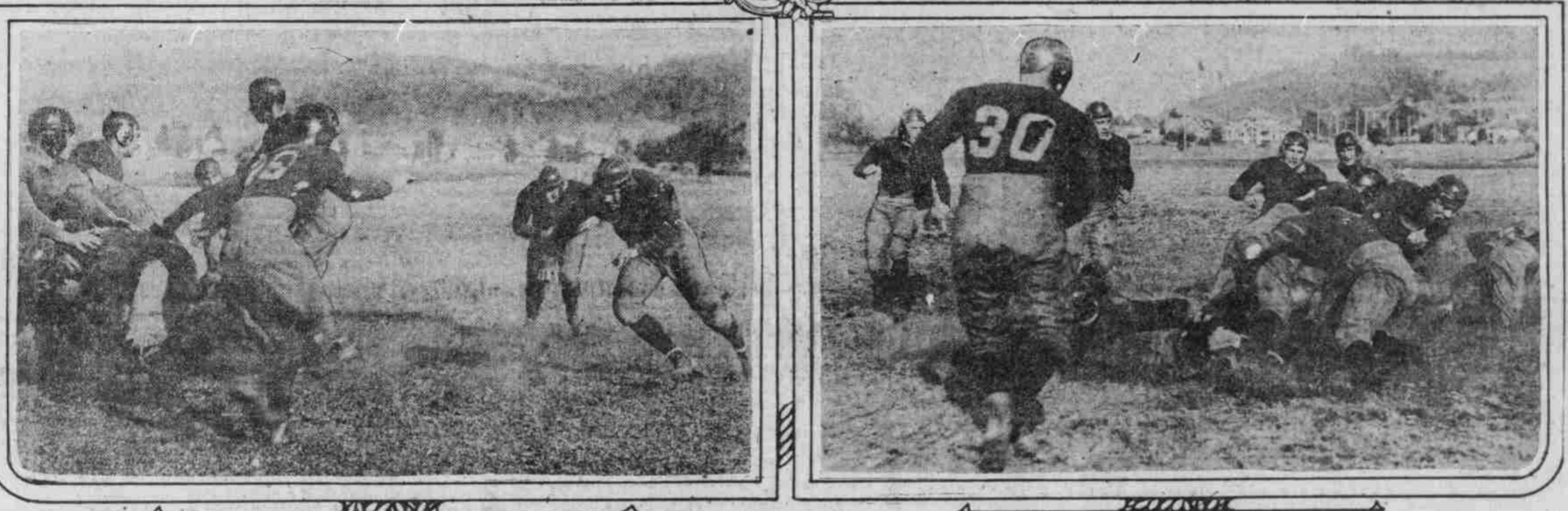

OREGON SWAMPS PACIFIC

FOREST GROVE 11 NEARLY SCORES IN FIRST HALF.

Lenon Yellow Plows Through Foe's Line, Scoring on Line Plays in Final Quarter.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Or., Sept. 30.—(Special)—Oregon opened the local football season today by defeating Pacific university, 37 to 0.

The first half was marked by the ineffectiveness of the Oregon attack and the nearness of a Pacific touchdown. Early in the second quarter after Blackman of the visitors had nailed Latham behind the Oregon line on fake formation and Pacific had gotten the ball on down, a pass from Hoar to Blackman put the ball on Oregon's five-yard line. On the next play Hoar, the Pacific quarter, fumbled a left on yellow back recovered and Oregon was out of danger.

The Oregon machine scored twice in the third quarter and twice in the final period, Chapman converting three out of four possible points from placements following the touchdowns. Oregon's first touchdown came early in the third quarter, with the piskin in Pacific's possession on its own five-yard line. Adams kicked 30 yards to Chapman, who made no gain. On the next play Chapman passed 15 yards to Bill Spears, left end, who raced 20 yards for a touchdown. Oregon scored again in the third frame, with the ball in Oregon's possession on Pacific's 25-yard line. After the Oregon backs had plowed through the visitors' line for five and 10-yard gains, Hunk Latham received a 20-yard pass from Chapman and raced through the Pacific line in the final period on line plays, King and Gram going over for the touchdowns. Chapman booted the two placements following the scoring.

SHROEDER PLAYS BASEBALL JUST AS HE FOUGHT IN WAR

How Player, Single-handed, Seized Machine Gun and Brought Down German Plane That Attacked Battery is Recalled.

BY L. H. GREGORY. It was a chilly morning in the fall of 1918. The date was September 20. The place was in the American line in front of Montfaucon in the Meuse-Argonne sector. Over an American light battery not far behind the front lines swooped a low-flying German airplane. It dived down and with blasts of machine-gun fire scattered the men of a battery to shelter.

That is, it scattered most of them. One man did not scatter. This fellow, a lanky left-handed youth, seized a Browning machine gun, propped it against a hole of dirt that lay in the open, set himself on his steel helmet, elevated the machine gun and calmly began potting back at the airplane. The pilot of this craft swung in a circle and returned to the attack. Flying at an elevation of only 40 or 50 feet, this time he directed all his fire at the lone adversary, who, undisturbed as if watching the spectacle from a grandstand seat, kept shooting away at him.

For perhaps ten minutes this remarkable duel continued, with the airplane shooting a few bursts, wheeling and coming back several times to the attack. Then a lucky shot by the machine gunner on the ground ripped through the German's gas tank and his plane came down. The bold machine gunner who had downed him was unharmed, though the ground all about him was pelted up by bullets. Let this be your introduction to Clyde (Lefty) Shroeder, southpaw pitcher, one professional baseball player who went to war rather than only throughout the United States and in Canada as well. There is no place, in short, where Shroeder may play professional baseball. He is barred from the game as effectively as if a German shell had cut him down. His only recourse is to play bush ball with bush leaguers, and that is what he is doing.
