Mrs. MURIEL MCWINEY, wife of the famous martyr of the Irish cause, is touring the country addressing audiences on the subject, "Women in Ireland." She is making her tour in the interests of a fund for those dependent on republican prisoners in Ireland.

Mrs. Viva M. January has achieved the distinction of being the first woman to be ordained as a minister in the District of Columbia. She recently registered as a minister of the United Society. Mrs. January has traveled widely over the United States and is known as a healer, teacher and lecturer on psychological subjects. Mrs. January's husband is executive secretary of the New Thought Alliance.

Mrs. Maude Wood Park, president of the National League of Women Voters, is appealing for a full vote in November. She declares that "men and women who will not vote are doing all they can to destroy the democracy, for no country in which elections are decided by the vote of the country, no country with a great body of voters too lazy of mind to take part in an election, is anything but despotism, the new rule of the indifferent many by the selfish few."

Carcass of Giant Ram Is Found in Rockies.

Hiberto Unbelievable Tales of Big Game Hunters Confirmed.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 21.—The grandfathers of the Rockies, known for their unusual size and successfully sought by big game hunters for many years, recently was overtaken by old age and laid down and died near a crevasse of Blackfoot glacier in Glacier national park. The carcass was found by an Indian guide and brought into Glacier Park station, Mont. The head, now mounted, is a rare specimen, having probably the largest horns on record. Their widest spread is 22 inches. All measurements exceed those of a head now on exhibition in Carnegie museum, as shown by the following comparison:

Lloyd George May Get \$495,000 for Memoirs.

Sum Offered British Premier Said to Constitute Record.

LONDON, Oct. 21.—English writers are still speculating on the amount Premier David Lloyd George is likely to realize on his projected book of memoirs. There is still considerable mystery as to what financial arrangements the publishers have made with the British prime minister for the book and serial rights at home and abroad. One London publishing firm gives the following figures:

American serial rights.....	\$200,000
American book rights.....	100,000
English book rights.....	15,000
English serial rights.....	25,000
Other payments.....	495,000
