# ASPIRANTS TO HI HAMMER BLOWS

Drive This Week to Decide Election.

## **GOVERNOR WAGERS LACKING**

Pierce Campaign Is Undermined by Exposure.

Speaking Tours, Underground Systems and Special Tickets Figure Prominently.

Hammer blows about to be delivered for this week will settle the homeless persons. When you see election in Oregon. All the campaigning yet to be performed must be concentrated in the next few days, as the polls will open No-

vember 7. Two lines of strategy are being pressed into service. One is publicity through the newspapers and speakers and the other is the underground, gum-shoe type of spreading propaganda. These are being supplemented by the circulation of special "tickets" containing selected lists of candidates who have been indorsed by various groups.

Governorship Wagers Lacking. So confused is the situation relative to the governorship that pracmoney has yet wagered on the outcome. In sporting circles the odds on the school bill are 10 to 7 that it will be defeated, but with respect to the gubernatorial problem betting is conspicuous by its absence.

Toward the end of the current week the drift will probably be so well defined that those who want to take chances will be seeking wagers. The groundswell is now noticeable and has been apparent to discerning observers for some time past, but still money is shy. The groundswell has set in for Ben W. Olcott, ncumbent and republican candidate for governor.

### Pierce Campaign Undermined.

Exposure of Walter M. Pierce's record has done much to undermine and counteract the effect of the This is the kick back which has been proving so damaging to his candidacy. What Mr. Pierce's supporters are now striving to do is to hold their ground without further defections from his camp, and what Mr. Olcott's supporters are bending their efforts to accomplish is to give increased impetus to his steadil; increasing strength. 


