

ANTI-LYNCHING BILL BEATEN IN SENATE

Bourbon Filibuster Blocks Republican Measure.

FIGHT TO BE GIVEN UP

Party Caucus Decides to Abandon Efforts in Order to Confirm Harding's Nominations.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 2.—Success crowned the filibuster of senate democrats against the Dyer anti-lynching bill today when republican senators in party caucus voted to abandon the measure completely.

The republican majority acted after the democrats, by what is generally conceded to have been one of the most efficiently conducted filibusters in the history of the senate, had prevented the transaction of any business for the fourth consecutive legislative day. The obstructionist tactics of the democrats, moreover, were threatening more than 2000 presidential nominations, which, if unconfirmed by Monday noon, when the special session ends, must be again submitted. The republican caucus was preceded by a conference attended by Senator Lodge of Massachusetts, the republican leader, Curtis of Kansas, the republican whip, and Senator Shortridge of California, in charge of the Dyer bill. Senator Shortridge, who had been unmovable throughout the filibuster, was understood to have agreed at this conference to allow the fate of the bill to be decided by a majority caucus.

Debate Lasts Two Hours.
The question of abandoning the measure, which was passed by the house last season, was debated in the caucus for two hours. It was understood, a small minority holding out for continuation of the fight. The final decision, however, was to direct Senator Lodge to inform the democratic leaders that the bill would be pushed no further either at the special session or at the regular session convening Monday. This means the death of the legislation, which the democrats have attacked as a "force bill" and as unconstitutional.

The decision, republican leaders said, after the caucus will permit confirmation of a large number of the pending nominations at a session of the senate convening at 10 o'clock Monday, two hours in advance of the meeting of congress in regular session. Among these nominations is that of Pierce Butler of Minnesota, to be chief justice of the supreme court.

Majority and minority leaders alike were agreed tonight that the filibuster thus brought to an end by the republican caucus decision will take a place as one of the most notable in senate history.

New System Adopted.
It has differed from previous filibusters in that it involved no long speeches, democrats having utilized the usual routine action of approving the journal. Under separate rules no business can be transacted until the journal or minutes of the previous session have been approved, and the democrats took advantage of this rule refusing approval, presenting amendments, demanding quorum calls and requesting the ayes and nays on every question brought up.

Leaders on both sides were agreed tonight that the filibuster had had the additional effect of directing attention to senate rules under which a minority by well directed moves may block any legislation and which Senator Cummins, Iowa, the president pro tempore, yesterday described as belonging to "another civilization."

PRINCE TUMBLES AGAIN

Wales Goes Off Horse While Negotiating Difficult Jump.

LONDON, Dec. 2.—(By the Associated Press.)—The Prince of Wales, who had just recovered from injuries received in the hunting field, again fell from his horse while negotiating a difficult double jump during Oxford university's and the Billington club's point-to-point steeplechase near Oxford.

The prince was not injured, but did not remount. He returned to the starting point by automobile.

DEPOSED EMPEROR WEDS

Hsuan Tung and Princess Kuo Chin-Si Marry in Peking.

PEKIN, Dec. 1.—(By the Associated Press.)—The wedding of Hsuan Tung, the 17-year-old deposed emperor of China, was celebrated yesterday with all the pomp and ceremony of imperial days. The ex-em-

peror's bride was the Princess Kuo Chin-Si.

Hsuan Tung, the deposed emperor of China, whose marriage is announced, has continued to reside in the ancient palace of the forbidden city since he abdicated with the establishment of the Chinese republic. He was educated under an English tutor and is described as a bright youth, despite the rigid asceticism to which he has been subjected. He receives a yearly allowance from the republic with the right to maintain a royal establishment in keeping with the glory of the old Chinese emperor. Since 1911 he has been practically a prisoner within the imperial precincts, emerging only once in 1917, for a few hours, when Chang Hsun attempted to execute a coup d'etat by again enthroning the boy emperor.

The Princess Kuo Chin-Si, bride of the ex-emperor, is a daughter of Prince Kuo Chin-Si, one of the Manchurian court dignitaries. She is described as pretty, but her beauty was reserved for the unveiling ceremony of the marriage which was to begin early Friday and continue through several days of festivity.

KELLER IS TO BE HEARD

DAUGHTERY CHARGES WILL COME UP TOMORROW.

Open Meeting of House Judiciary Committee Is Arranged; Informal Conference Held.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 2.—Chairman Volstead announced tonight that the house judiciary committee would meet in open session Monday to give Representative Keller, republican of Minnesota, an opportunity to present in detail the charges on which he is asking for impeachment of Attorney-General Daugherty.

The bill of particulars, formed by the committee yesterday, was considered informally at a conference of several members today, but no action was taken.

The meeting for Monday was arranged some weeks ago and the committee by resolution had requested Mr. Keller to file specific allegations, together with the names of witnesses by whom he would attempt to prove them.

It was indicated at the department of justice tonight that the attorney-general would have a full and complete reply to make to the Keller charges, but that he had not yet completed his examination of them.

STILL at Gearhart Captured.

ASTORIA, Or., Dec. 2.—(Special.)—Officers from the sheriff's office early today captured a still at Gearhart and arrested Karl Hill. The still, located in a Finnish bathhouse, was in full operation, and besides it the officers confiscated about 100 gallons of grain mash, half a gallon of moonshine and 40 bottles of beer. The officers say that some weeks ago they confiscated a still belonging to the man, but they were unable to get sufficient evidence at that time to prosecute him. Hill told the officers he was preparing to make some moonshine for Christmas time. The defendant was arraigned this afternoon on charges of manufacturing liquor and having it in his possession. He pleaded not guilty and was remanded to jail in default of \$750 bonds.
