

DRIVE NEARING ITS END

Portland Passes \$180,000 Mark and Salem \$130,000, While Campaign Is Intensified.

There are no more enthusiastic oosters for old Willamette university than the student body and of those classed under that proud name; none are more active in the present forward movement cam-naign to obtain \$1,250,000 as an endowment fund than those from Portland.

Up to last night about \$930,000 had Up to last night about \$330,000 had been subscribed as far as reports were made public, and by tomorrow noon, when the committee meets at the Seward grill for luncheon, it is expected that \$1,000,000 will have been piedged throughout the state. Portland has passed the \$180,000 mark and Salem the \$130,000 mark.


