A DON QUIXOTE PRAY.

Our friend the Independent, is somewhat agitated over the presumption that Hillsboro's city council is profligate. Sometime since, one "Economy," buckled on an armor of mathematical illusions, locked the outer door and with one bottle of ink, did severely to task, take our city fathers. Why he had not invited "Veritas," "Pro Bono Publico," and "Tax Payer" to his feast of reason and flow of Arnold's writing fluid, deponent knoweth not. Perhaps "Economy" was weighted down with the idea that he had a lone hand and that alone would he play it. This bucolic "Economy" made the room redolent with burning issues, and in a few moments had our dignified city council, figuratively speaking, up a tree, and then with a huge paper knife, commenced to chop at the base of the tree mentioned. Vigorously did he fall to upon his enemies and much did he question their business instinct. Knowing that election was near at hand, and that he and his friends have always sought in vain for office, did this Economy take time, he of olden mien and many years, by the foretop and lead him hither and thither, showing him much unseemly conduct. When all had been proven, "Economy" started to see "Veritas," "Tax-payer," et al., but passing the Independent office, an idea struck him, just in which particular place, no one knows. This idea denoted that he had "a call," so to the editorial rooms of the Independent, he hied. His diligent "write up" was published, and the fame of the writer spread on one side, from the classic banks of the Tualatin to the muddy, turbulent waters of Dairy Creek, on the other. As an astute worker for public weal, "Economy" grew famous. In a subsequent issue of the Independent one of the council had an open letter calling upon the savior of Hillsboro to come forth from the dense and Egyptian darkness of his non de plume, but as yet "Economy" is silent, the Independent taking up the cudgel for his defense. There are many who think the castigator of our city dads is up near Buxton, watching his fame spread in a lurid blaze, out on the waters of the broad Pacific. As "Economy," cunning wight, has started the ball rolling, and then gallantly slid to the grand stand, what he says is of little moment. But the Independent has made some startling statements which need correction, not that THE ARGUS was, or is, adverse to bonding Hillsboro twenty years, but because of the apparent intent of the strictures, which doubtless were issued for election purposes only. It will be observed that the paper has stated the council was profligate in more ways than one, that the Recorder's office cost the city \$75 for the year, which is an error, the same but footing less than \$25. Again, he says the street committee which laid the plank on Main street lost the town much—some 24 feet on each plank. This is decidedly untrue, as Hillsboro paid for 22 feet lumber, the bevel of which, being lost, caused the town to pay for 1 foot lost on each plank laid down. As a matter of fact there were some planks, from which 3 feet were sawed, and the city gained the refuse, now using it for firewood. The foot on each plank paid for, and lost, doubtless is more than made up by the extra wear the street will stand by being so laid. But, that has nothing to do with the Independent's statements which were not well put. As to the street work not being put in the hands of a committee, that is folderol.

To return to the question of bonding. It might be the proper thing for the city to bond for 20 years, and it might not. It is generally the rule of well regulated business concerns to get out of debt as soon as possible and then stay out. Computing on a basis of what has been

done the past year, the city could wipe out the warrant debt at the end of 6 years, then floating new bonds for 5 years at lower interest, taking up the old ones, buying the water plant, at the end of that time it could be free from debt and have as assets, the water and light plant and the City Hall. These statements are made from actual computations. It will be noted that our contemporary does not mention the receipts of the city but lays great stress on the expenditures, and kicks very viciously at the council for not bonding for a long period. He seems to use his figures at an inverse ratio only, not considering, or realizing that by wiping out the debt in 11 or 12 years that a saving of several thousand dollars can be effected. If the Independent's statement on the Recorder's cost to the city are so far from correct, what confidence can be put in its general deductions? Its only excuse can be, "It will soon be election!"

Next week THE ARGUS is going to seek "Economy" and interview him, just to see what and why, and wherefore he sayeth such things without first putting up a forfeit.

The democrats will now get together in the east and endeavor to do something. They have discovered that a party cannot stand, divided, against a common enemy. They will compact their ranks and meet the republicans next year with some showing. Here in this state but little is to be expected as there is one metropolitan daily, the Evening Telegram, purporting to be a democratic organ, which is a republican offshoot of the Oregonian, published simply to sow discord amongst democratic leaders. It is, of course, a paying institution, not from democratic support, but from the fact it captures the Chief of Police sales of Portland. The democracy can expect to do nothing in this state until some man, like C. S. Jackson, of the East Oregonian, recognizes that there is a field in Portland for a good Jeffersonian paper, and gets good solid support.

When the news of the election reached Roseburg, the inmates and officers of the Soldiers' Home picked the institution cannon on a neighboring hill and proceeded to burn powder and drum tom toms "that the nation was saved." This snatches strongly of childishness and the officers of the Home, which is a state institution should see to it that blind partisanship is relegated to the rear in such places. It was as much out of place as would be a partisan speech at a Fourth of July celebration.

The American people are prone to look at threadbare humorists with something like toleration, but recently the populace of Patterson, N. J. decorated Bill Nye with over-ripe hen fruit. It perhaps was an even exchange, although the chestnuts Bill gave them smelled not so frosty as did the rotten fruit of the hay-mow.

WASHINGTON county should have several good thoroughfares running through its domain, radiating from Hillsboro the county capital. Not for the benefit of the wheelmen, but for the comfort and convenience of its producing element, and the natural enhancement of property values which would be sure to follow.
