FORGED JURY VERDICT

Brought Into the Circuit Court on Monday Last.

MATTER SENT TO THE GRAND JURY

Two Candidates For The Insane Asylum—Our Reporter Writes up The Foot Ball Game.

A Clever Forgery.

Quite a sensation was created in the Circuit Court Monday afternoon by a motion tendered by a member of the bar. It appears that some time in the early part of July, the Forest Grove Bank brought suit in Squire Hughes' court against S. B. Gilpin and N. L. Thatcher. The jury in the case brought in a verdict as follows: "Forest Grove, July 2, 1895.—We the jury find for plaintiff. G. T. HOLLISTER, Foreman."

The defendants employed Hon. S. B. Hurton to appeal the case, as the verdict was considered faulty, and it was filed in the Circuit Court on a writ of review, Mr. Langley, the attorney for the defendant in the justice court, procuring the papers in the case and sending them to Hillsboro. After the writ of review and the papers were filed, and the matter had rested some time it was discovered that the original verdict had been torn out and a veridict, substituted, which reads as follows: "Forest Grove, July 2nd, 1895. Bank of Forest Grove vs. S. B. Gilpin and N. L. Thatcher: We the jury find the plaintiff in the sum of \$61.75 principle and interest and ten dollars and his cost in this suit. G. T. HOLLISTER, Foreman."

This mutilation, and what was deemed a forgery was presented to his Honor by Attorney Hurton, who suggested that the matter be investigated. The opposing counsel, Hon. T. H. Tongue desired the case to go to trial, but Judge McBride called in the Grand Jury, presented to them the nature of the misdemeanor and directed them to sift the matter to its fullest extent and bring the guilty parties to justice. The mutilation in itself is a grave offense, to say nothing of the forgery, and it is to be hoped the guilty party or parties will be summarily dealt with.

Mr. Tongue stated to the Court that he concurred with Mr. Hurton, that the matter should be fully looked into.

Two More Unfortunates.

Tuesday morning two unfortunates were brought before Judge Cornelius in the persons of Henry Snyder, an inmate of the County Poor farm, and Charles W. Hawk, of Dilley, a well known circuit driver of Oregon race tracks. Snyder, it appears, has kept the inmates of the poor farm in a constant uproar with his garrulous and lunatic conduct and but recently committed an assault on one of his companions over which there came near being an arrest. Mr. Hawk fell from his sulky while on the race course last summer at Salem and ever since he has evidenced marked mental derangement. Coupled with this he has been afflicted with a partial paralysis on his right side. Both were examined and adjudged insane and committed to the asylum.

Repeated gains were made until the ball was passed to Barrett, who carried it around the end for 25 yards and a touch down, and the game was won for the High School by a score of 4 to 0.

Their goal was not in any danger after that and time was called with the ball in P. U.'s territory.
