FOUND A STEEL SAW

In One of the Cells in the County Jail. A Hillsboro Man Loses a Fine Team of Horses—City Election Returns—Report of City Council.

They Wanted Freedom. "Hope springs eternal in the human breast." Such, doubtless is the case with the prisoners, Harry Corbin and E. Smeltzer, who are confined in one cage in the county jail. Yesterday, Sheriff Ford upon information that noises as sawing iron had been heard a day or so back, searched the cells, and found in that occupied by the two mentioned, a saw, manufactured from a corset steel. They had sawed into one bar, a flange nearly 1/4 inch in depth. The timely discover prevented what might have been a jail break. Young Corbin is in for larceny in the express office of this city, and young Smeltzer for larceny of certain articles in the lower end of the county.

Of course it is very hard for Sheriff Ford to discover which one is the offender, or if both, but in all probability both are implicated.

A Team Stolen. F. S. Olsen, who lives within one and one-half miles of Hillsboro, is loser a team of chestnut sorrels. Mr. Olsen went by team to Portland last week, staying there several days, upon going to the barn where the horses had been stabled, the animals, hatters and bridles were gone. On going to the city he was accosted by an unknown party for a trade, and he may be the guilty party. The horses are branded in such a manner as to make identification very easy.
