To a man reared on johnny cake and skim milk, this wholesale giving from the poor to those who are, and might have been affluent, is little less than highway robbery. Besides, it is not democratic.

The embryo mind can not clearly determine why Rev. Lyman Abbott should be so bitterly opposed to war. The book on which rests the theological fabric, the dissemination of which has been Abbott's

bread and meat for years, counseled war and rapine. If called upon to explain, doubtless the famous dominie would tell us that a war even upon innocent babes would be all right if it received supernatural sanction, but there is and would be no such sanction to a war between England and the United States.

The deficit will remain in the treasury, instead of gold, just so long as treasury notes and greenbacks are redeemable in the yellow coin.
