THE MEETING A BIG SUCCESS

Speed & Driving Association Stockholders.

MET IN THIS CITY SATURDAY

Eight Directors Elected and Capital Stock Will be Increased to \$2500
Galloway Will Make a Good Receiver.

Stockholders' First Meeting.

The first regular meeting of the stockholders of the Washington County Speed & Driving Association occurred Saturday last at E. J. Lyons' hall, and the attendance certainly augured well for the future of the institution. Every share of stock was represented by the owner or his proxy. J. C. Hare was chosen temporary chairman, and C. W. Redmond, secretary.

A motion to increase the capital stock of the association to \$2500 was submitted and carried unanimously, after which the election of the eight directors was commenced. Those elected will work to the best interests of the association and their names are a sufficient guarantee that no duty will be ignored. The newly elected are: Messrs. E. J. Lyons, W. V. Wiley, Dr. Ward, Thos. Talbot, John Northrop, Jos. Downs, G. W. Patterson and I. E. Berst. Monday evening the directors met and elected officers. The selections are as follows: President, E. J. Lyons; vice-president, Dr. Ward; secretary, C. W. Redmond; treasurer, G. W. Patterson.

Secretary Redmond will at once take steps to secure the lease and active work will commence as soon as the weather clears up to place the track in condition. The board of directors will consider the celebration of the Fourth in conjunction with the race meet, and if all goes well, Washington county will have an industrial fair this fall that will outlive any thing of its kind in the state.

The New Receiver.

Welcome news it is to those on government land that a new Receiver has been appointed in this district. Hon. Wm. Galloway, of McMinnville, having been appointed to succeed Peter Paquet, the present republican incumbent. Mr. Paquet has been ill for several months, and had allowed a vast amount of work to accumulate to the distress of many settlers in the district who were awaiting final proofs, decisions, etc.

At last the complaints became so numerous that an Inspector was sent from Washington to ascertain the trouble. When the safe was opened a great volume of work was found untouched and the entire business of the Land Office was practically blocked. Checks nearly a year old, and money orders verging to the outlaw limit, so it is said, were found, which must have been reported with the papers which were unacted upon. Many complaints have been registered by the homesteaders from this county alone, and being in ignorance of the true status, the administration was charged with the negligence, and Col. R. A. Miller, the Register, was much abused. The fact of the matter is the Register was simply powerless to act, as the Receiver's office is not under his command. This is a civil service regime, and in this instance it has worked a hardship on the administration.

The new Receiver is a man of good executive ability, a democrat of state renown, and a man of integrity in the strictest sense of the word. His bond has been filed and he will take possession in a few days. It is to be hoped the settlers will now have their business promptly attended to, and from what is said of Receiver Galloway, there is no doubt the change will be an acceptable one.

Hillsboro's Congress.

Hillsboro's High School has formed itself into a legislative body. This refers to Supt. Stanley's room. Its last impersonation was a bill allowing women the right of franchise. Seeing the young ladies were in a majority the bill passed, and to keep up with the times a governor was immediately elected that the bill might be signed and become a law. Judge J. I. Knight was elected and the bill sent him for action. Here is the document the governor returned:

OFFICE OF THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE
State of Oregon,
Hillsboro, March 2, '96

To the Honorable:
The Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Oregon; in legislative assembly:

I herewith return to you the bill entitled "An Act to Amend the Constitution of the State of Oregon" with my approval and for the following reason and for no other, to-wit:

The passage of this bill, and its subsequent approval and becoming a law of our great and glorious State of Oregon, simply means, in the opinion of your humble ser-

vant, and by the way, a servant of the people, the robbing of the rising and future generations of this now great State, of the teachings of the principals of religion during childhood, as is now the universal and laudable custom of mothers. For were the female portion of our populace entitled to vote and assist in the manipulation of the machinery of our State's government, this would almost entirely rob their minds of the now present and more than commendable theme of showing the young minds how to serve their creator, and supplant them with the universal theme in the minds of the male portion of our population, to-wit: How to carry a primary or defeat an opposing party's candidate. For this reason, I veto the bill.
