BOURBONS TO MEET
IN CONVENTION

Will Assemble April 7 to
Elect State Delegates.

SIX OF THEM WILL BE ELECTED

A Total of Seventy-One Delegates

Will be Present—Time of Pri-

maries to Meet is Set for

March 31st.

Washington County's Democratic Central Committee met in this city Tuesday and it was decided to issue a call for the election of state delegates for the convention to be held at Portland, April 9th. The meeting was called to order in the Union block. Ira E. Purdin was elected temporary chairman and J. M. Wall, the regular secretary, recorded the business. Those present were: J. M. Wall and G. W. Schulmerich, of Hillsboro; Ira E. Purdin, of Forest Grove; Wm. Thompson, of Cedar Mill; F. M. Robinson, of Beaverton; R. Sandford and I. B. Darity, of Glencoe; M. J. Gleason, Jr., and H. Wehrung.

The primaries will be held in each of the several precincts on Tuesday, March 31st, when delegates will be elected for the county convention. The number of delegates to be elected from the several precincts are as follows: Beaverdam, 6; Beaverton, 5; Buxton, 2; Cornelius, 3; Columbia, 5; East Cedar Creek, 3; West Cedar Creek, 3; Dairy, 6; Dilley, 1; East Bette, 5; South Forest Grove, 4; North Forest Grove, 5; Gales Creek, 2; North Hillsboro, 5; South Hillsboro, 5; Mountain, 1; South Tualatin, 3; West Butte, 2; Wapato, 2; Washington, 2.

This delegation is based upon one delegate for each 10 votes and fraction thereof over 5, cast for Judge A. S. Bennett at the last campaign, the one delegate at large from each precinct inclusive. The general sense of the members of the Central Committee is that the democrats will put up a full ticket and work for it tooth and nail, and if good candidates are selected—it is generally conceded that the record of the republican party in the state will be very good campaign ammunition—a very creditable poll will be counted at close of election day.

McGinn on the Bench.

Owing to the indisposition of Judge McBride, Hon. H. E. McGinn, of the Circuit Court of Multnomah county, opened court Monday morning for the county of Washington. Mr. McGinn received his appointment to the Multnomah bench last fall, and he is considered one of the hardest workers in that county's judicial field. His speedy disposition of business leaves the inference that he is not at sea weighing actions in the scales of justice. Mr. McGinn's appointment by Gov. ord was somewhat unexpected as he is known to be no political favorite of the Executive. McGinn is a sturdy Hiibernian and has surmounted many obstacles to build in the profession of the law. His physical courage is well known in this section, his personal encounter with Sheriff Sears, of Multnomah county, over differences arising out of the last session of the legislature, proving that he is not adverse to Donnybrook methods if the occasion requires. In this affair it will be remembered that Mr. McGinn and the doughty sheriff were separated before much blood was spilled. Mr. McGinn is state

senator for Multnomah county, and considerable of a politician.
