OREGON CAMPAIGN
IS NOW RUNNINGFull Blast and Gold Bugs
Straddlers and Loons

WILL MEET ON FIELD OF BATTLE

G. W. Patterson is Nominated for Joint Senator—Hon. W. N. Barrett Loses the Nomination for District Attorney.

The Political Field.

The campaign can now be said to be fairly opened. The congressional contestants are in the field, and district, judicial and joint senatorial nominations have been made. For congress in this district are: T. H. Tongue, the republican nominee; W. H. Vanderberg, of Coos, populist and Jeff Myers, of Seio, Linn county, democratic. Both the latter are running on free silver platforms and Mr. Tongue is on the only "straddle" platform in the state. The race will not be particularly interesting with three nominees in the field, as the republicans have a large plurality over either of the two other parties. For joint senator the nominees are as follows: G. W. Patterson, of Hillsboro, republican; John Hanson, of Tillamook, (formerly of Gales Creek, this county) populist and D. W. Dillard, of Columbia county, democratic. For district attorney, T. J. Cleaton, of St. Helens, republican; J. E. Hedges, of Oregon City, democratic and S. B. Smith, of Clatsop, populist. The situation on these offices is rather mixed but the republicans have a very safe plurality as it now stands. The republican straddle platform is intended to hold the free silver element of the party. Both the other parties have free silver platforms but the democrats accuse the populists of having laid down their cherished principles of populism to catch a few votes and the populists in turn charge the democrats with insincerity. The republicans look on the implacable situation with a broad smile and are resting secure on the "parity" platform, confident in the victory that the divided free silver vote will bring. Occasionally will be found a populist who thinks the democrats are dead and that Tongue will be defeated by Vanderberg but the situation does not bear out the prediction.
