THE POPULISTS
HAVE NOMINATEDA Full Ticket is Named
and Placed in the Field.

ARE CONFIDENT OF ELECTION

Hillsboro and Immediate Vicinity
Capture a Good Many Nominations—Sanford-Heckart Crowd Badly Set Down on.

At 10:00 a. m. Tuesday morning, Chairman A. O. Brown called to order the populist county convention. There were present, at that hour, delegates and proxies to the number of 107. He first stated that temporary organization should be effected and declared nominations open for temporary chairman and secretary. Nominations for the first named as follows: J. P. Heckert, of the Searchlight; Lewis Ennis, of Tualatin; J. Seaton, of Sherwood, and J. C. Hare, of Hillsboro. Messrs Ennis and Hare declined and the chairman declared the nominations closed, appointing G. A. Sanford and Rev. Black as Tellers. The vote was 59 for Seaton and 48 for Heckert. Mr. Brown then declared the election and Mr. Seaton took the chair. Ward Swope was by acclamation elected temporary chairman. Upon assuming his duties as executive, Mr. Seaton made a neat little speech, advising harmony and a subservience to majority rule.

By motion each precinct delegation selected one of its members to form a committee on resolutions, the result being as follows: Beaver-ton, A. W. Pike; Buxton, M. Burgholzer; Cornelius, J. A. Ruble; Columbia, J. Miller; Dairy, W. Hill; Diley, J. Bucher; East Butte, C. Elliott; Cedar Creek, W. Goble; Gales Creek, Swinney; Mountain, H. B. Keniston; Hillsboro, A. C. Archbold; Forest Grove, A. V. Brown; S. Forest Grove, R. Kuhn; S. Hillsboro, O. C. Zook; S. Tualatin, A. McDonald; Wapato, H. Wall; W. Butte, W. Truesdale; W. Cedar Creek, J. Campbell; Washington, Chas. Hansen.

After desultory motions a committee on credentials was appointed consisting of D. Corwin, A. O. Brown, C. F. Castle, Fred Burgholzer and S. H. Dumbarr. Then followed the appointment of G. A. Sanford, D. B. Emerick and T. J. Leedy as a committee on order of business. The preliminary work being thus disposed of remarks were made by Parlow, of Hillsboro, which was followed by an address from one Timmons, from California, who will stump the county during the campaign. Adjournment followed until 1:30 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The afternoon session opened up with music by the Gales Creek band. After this came the report of the committee on credentials, seating in the convention 122 delegates, which was adopted. The committee on order of business then reported and the motion to adopt came up and carried. One member moved an amendment that after precinct nominations had been ratified that the convention adjourn. Spirited talks were made by several and when the question came to the vote the amendment was defeated by perhaps two to one. There original motion, was then carried. A motion then prevailed that all nominees must come up on the platform, before voted upon, and make an extemporaneous speech that all might, as the mover said, judge of the calibre of his brains. At this juncture it was moved that the present temporary officers be made permanent, which carried. All precinct officers were ratified.

As the committee on resolutions and platform was not ready to report, Hon. W. F. Timmons, of California, addressed the convention, dwelling upon the murders and robbing two old parties, giving each such a drubbing that great applause was provoked. Money, he said, required nothing but a government stamp to give it value. Anything having the government stamp and legislated as a legal tender is good money and better than gold or silver. "Three cheers and a tiger" followed. A motion to go on and nominate the ticket before the committee on resolutions reported was made but withdrawn upon the remonstrance that those on the committee naturally would desire a vote on these important deliberations. As a consequence a recess of 30 minutes was declared.

RESOLUTIONS AND PLATFORM.

At the end of thirty minutes order was again called and the report of the committee was read. This report advocated the legislative enactment of a stay law for the protection of the debtor classes and required their legislative candidates to pledge themselves to work for a reduction of county salaries as follows: County clerk, \$1000 per year; sheriff, \$1000; recorder, \$800; assessor, \$250 per day. It further required the school superintendent to devote his or her entire time to the office. This, with the endorsement of the Salem state platform, constituted the entire report and it was adopted with the amendment

that the assessor's salary remain untouched. Nominations were then opened and Mr. Heckart offered a resolution barring all from nomination who had not been at least 12 months in the faith, and that no populist candidate withdrawing between convention day and election be eligible to further nomination for a period of four years. This was voted down by laying on the table, and thus was Sanford's chestnut raker put on the shelf for the second time. Nominations for state senator were: A. B. McDonald, John Prickett, L. A. Road, E. C. Schulmerich, Judge Archbold, Rev. Anderson, Jos. Bucher and J. J. Seaton. All the populists positively declined except Prickett and Bucher, and Schulmerich's name raised such a hornet's nest that after some parley he withdrew his name. Judge Archbold went in on the first ballot, receiving 77 votes. Representative ticket—

The nominations on the representative ticket were: Wm. Tipton, of Sherwood; Louis Ennis, of Tualatin; John Prickett, of Forest Grove. On every ballot Jos. Bucher was a candidate for this nomination but somehow he was short of votes, perhaps because he had so closely allied himself with the Sanford element.

County Commissioner—But two nominations were offered for this office, V. B. Swinney and Wm. Schulmerich. Mr. Swinney came under the wire with 94 votes out of the 122 cast. The election was made unanimous.

County Clerk—For this office Ward Swope, of Farmington, was placed in nomination but declined, withdrawing in favor of Lincoln Laughlin. The secretary was instructed to cast the convention's ballot for Mr. Laughlin and he was declared duly elected the nominee.

For Sheriff—This office stirred up considerable enthusiasm and nominations were offered as follows: D. B. Emerick, of Scholls; Wm. Schulmerich, of Farmington; A. J. Veatch, of Gales Creek; Archie Wilkes, of Cornelius; S. H. Dumbarr, of Wapato; J. C. Hare, of Hillsboro; J. J. Seaton, of Sherwood. All withdrew excepting Emerick, Veatch and Archie Wilkes. The nominations were declared closed and the first ballot resulted: Emerick, 58; Veatch, 8 and Wilkes, 52. At this time a motion to adjourn until evening, amended to extend the time until Wednesday morning, was voted down. Veatch then withdrew and the chair ordered a ballot, resulting in Emerick receiving 64 and Wilkes 56. Emerick was declared the nominee and the convention adjourned until Wednesday morning 9:30.

WEDNESDAY'S WORK.

Promptly at 9:30 a. m. Chairman Seaton called the convention to order, stating they were now ready to complete the nominations.

For this office were placed in nomination: F. M. Heidel, Hillsboro; B. G. Leedy, Gaston and E. H. Jeter, of Tigardville. The result of the first ballot was: Heidel, 82; Leedy, 17; Jeter, 25. Mr. Heidel was declared the nominee, and on motion was declared unanimous choice.

Nominations: B. G. Leedy, A. O. Brown, E. H. Jeter, A. L. Pike and M. Burgholzer. Messrs Burgholzer, Jeter and Pike declined. Mr. Brown was elected, having received 78 votes to 39 for Leedy. Nomination was made unanimous.

For Assessor—Nominations: J. C. Miller, H. B. Keniston, A. H. Henderson, J. F. Haynie, A. L. Veatch, and B. G. Leedy. The first ballot resulted in no election, Keniston receiving 58 votes. On the second ballot there were but three candidates in the field and the vote was as follows: Keniston, 75; Miller, 30; Henderson, 20. Keniston was declared elected.

For Superintendent—For this office but two names were mentioned: Mrs. F. M. Howard Thorne, Hillsboro and Miss Annie Luster, of Gales Creek. Mrs. Thorne received 114 votes, the largest cast at the convention for any individual nominee. The election was made unanimous.

For Surveyor—G. L. Perrine and Thos. Wilkes were placed in nomination. Mr. Veatch said Wilkes was not a good "middle-of-the-road" populist and beyond the majority of the populists would not support him. Bucher defended Wilkes. Wilkes' nomination was withdrawn and the secretary was instructed to cast the vote of the convention for G. L. Perrine, which was accordingly done.

For Coroner—Robert Kuhn, of Forest Grove, was nominated for coroner, the rules were suspended and the secretary cast the vote of the convention for the candidate.

As this completed the ticket the next in order was the election of chairman of the county central committee. J. C. Hare and J. J. Seaton were placed in nomination but Mr. Hare withdrew leaving Seaton alone. Mr. Hare's friends refused to entertain his withdrawal and upon the ballot the vote stood as follows: Seaton, 65; Hare, 57. Seaton's election was made unanimous and the convention then adjourned.

MAYOR APPOINTS
A COMMITTEE

To Confer With Old Veterans on Re-Union.

WILL INVITE THEM TO HILLSBORO

An Endeavor Will be Made to Have Them Meet Here on July 2nd, 3rd and 4th—Pague Promises Good Weather.

That Mass Meeting.

At the mass meeting held in the city hall last Friday evening enthusiasm was made up for the lack of large attendance. Mayor Goodin called the attendants to order and stated the object of the meeting. On motion a committee was appointed to confer with the members of the Gen. Ransom post, who in turn will place the matter before the executive session of the Washington County Veterans' Association, which holds at Forest Grove, May 7. The committee is a good one and consists of the following citizens: The first named being chairman: J. C. Hare, Dr. W. D. Wood, J. J. Morgan, H. V. Gates, Johnson Freeman, E. J. Lyons and G. W. Patterson. It is expected that the committee will have a conference with the Directors of the Speed and Driving Association to ascertain just what that organization will do to assist in getting the re-union held in this city and on the dates of the race program.

Last year they met here and were treated handsomely, but the inclement weather much detracted from the real enjoyment of the occasion. This year, however, weather Director Pague has been seen in advance and will fill a special order for five days fine weather, a day to come on, three days for the re-union and one to return home. It is desired to having a rousing time on the Fourth and if the Veterans can be prevailed on to come Hillsboro will have another historical Fourth.

THE REPUBLICANS
IN THE FIELDEverything Passed Off
Harmoniously.

J. A. IMBRIE NOMINATED CLERK

The Convention Makes Rapid Work of Nominating—Were in Session Five Hours—Hughes Nominated For State Senator.

The republican county convention met Thursday and put out their ticket. B. P. Cornelius, who was temporary chairman was made permanent executive and L. R. Traver, of Beaverton, acted as secretary. At 1:30 the standing committees reported and they went to work with a will.

NOMINATIONS.

For State Senator—The nominee is S. Hughes, of Forest Grove, and he was named on the 4th ballot. Until that time he had been receiving complimentary votes, and upon being placed in the field received 61. The ballot upon which he was elected was: Hughes, 61; Buchanan, 26; H. V. Gates, 18; F. S. Barnes, 12.

For Representatives—The nominees are J. R. C. Thompson, of Tigardville; G. W. Marsh, of Centerville, and H. S. Hudson, of Gaston. Those placed in nomination were: C. F. Tigrard, C. P. Yates, G. W. Marsh, J. R. C. Thompson, B. F. Purdy and H. S. Hudson. The fourth ballot, which elected Mr. Thompson, gave him 77 votes and the sixth ballot gave Marsh 82. This made two of the representative ticket and a motion to suspend the rules and declare Hudson the nominee, he having received the largest number of votes next to Marsh, was carried.

COUNTY TICKET.

For Clerk—J. A. Imbrie was nominated on the first ballot, the vote being: Imbrie, 64; Kane, 33; Goodin, 20. Nomination made unanimous.

For Recorder—On motion E. L. McCormick was the unanimous choice of the convention, their being no other nominee in the field.

For Sheriff—W. D. Bradford, the present deputy, was nominated on the first ballot, there being five candidates in the field. Result of ballot: Bradford, 61; J. McNamer, of Forest Grove, 37; Benj. Patton, 3; S. Moore, of Glencoe, 8; J. J. Morgan, of Hillsboro, 9.

For Treasurer—The rules were suspended and J. W. Sappington was by viva voce vote declared the duly elected nominee.

For Assessor—Two names were placed in the field. The first ballot was: Geo. Wilcox, of Hillsboro, 81; J. S. Jackson, of Glencoe, 26; S. F. Markham, who was a "dark horse" rec'd 9 votes. Mr. Wilcox was declared the nominee.

For Commissioner—T. G. Todd, of Forest Grove was the choice. In the race there were: Heisler and McRoberts, of Gales Creek and Young, of Cedar Mills. Mr. Todd was selected on the second ballot, receiving 74 votes. H. Isler withdrew after the first ballot.

For Superintendent—Austin Craig and D. H. Thomas, of Forest Grove; J. H. Stanley, of Hillsboro, L. R. Traver, of Beaverton and J. T. Dorreine, of Cornelius were placed before the convention. Craig led from the first and after the second ballot Stanley, Thomas and Dorreine withdrew and Craig went in on the 3rd ballot receiving 61 and Traver polling 55.

For Surveyor—L. E. Wilkes of Hillsboro and L. C. Walker, of Forest Grove were nominated. On the first ballot the first named received 59 votes and Walker 50. Wilkes was declared the nominee.

For Coroner—Two candidates: Dr. Wood, present incumbent and Dr. Large, of the Grove. Wood withdrew his name and the secretary cast the vote of the convention for Large.

The convention then elected a Chairman of the county central committee and adjourned.
