INADVERTENTLY GIVES TROUBLE

Cave's Speech Before the Democratic County Convention—Contrast of Now and When the Republican Legislative Ticket Came Home From Salem.

Didn't Sign Certificates.

The candidates of the recent republican convention were much exercised Friday last, and may they have been, for their Secretary of the previous day had departed without properly signing the certificates of nomination. Friday morning a team was dispatched to Mr. Traver's supposed home at Beaver-ton to have the necessary signatures attached, when it was discovered that he had gone to Portland. As Friday was the last day to file acceptances with the county clerk there was much consternation among the honored ones and the Chief of Police was notified to detect and hold Mr. Traver, if possible. The supposed fugitive was found at his father's store at the metropolis and taken to the station where he was held until the parties from this city arrived. He was brought to Hillsboro late that evening and signed the necessary papers after which he was allowed to go on his way rejoicing, leaving many happy candidates behind.

All day Friday there were many ridiculous rumors afloat, some intimating that Mr. Traver had secluded himself because of the humiliation of being defeated as a candidate for nomination as school superintendent. This report was occasioned by the knowledge, doubtless, that the A. P. A. candidate was Craig, the successful nominee, and partially because many, laboring under a such in the convention, supposed Mr. Traver was a catholic.

Mr. Traver was not chagrined over his defeat although we may think the method was peculiar, and his not signing the certificates was due to no bias, but a complete oversight as he was not aware of the time limit.

SENATOR HUSTON.

Record as a Citizen and as Legislator True to His Pledges.

S B. Huston was born in Washington county, Indiana, March 16, 1858. His father, Oliver W. Huston, enlisted in Co. "G" 18th Ind. Vol. and remained until his death, February 12, 1863, dying of wounds received at the battle of Stone River. In 1866 his mother remarried and removed to Illinois. He was raised on a farm, attended the common school and took a partial course in college, but never completed it, taught school and worked at most anything that came handy. He studied law and was admitted to the bar in December, 1879, shortly afterwards starting west, traveling over Montana, Idaho, Utah, Texas and New Mexico. He entered the employ of the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fee R. R. Company in New Mexico and remained in their employ until March, 1883—about two and one-half years—filling various positions from section hand to freight agent. Mr. Huston came to Oregon in May, 1883; was broke when he got here and went up into Cedar Canyon, Northwest of Greenville, and took a job in a shingle mill at \$25 per month and board. The camp shutting down he went to Forest Grove and went to work on Dr. Geiger's farm where he put in 5 months; then went to work in the flouring mills at Forest Grove; and then employed on a hay baler of M. H. Shipley at Forest Grove. It became known to a few intimate friends that he had been admitted to the bar; he was employed to assist in the prosecution of a druggist for selling whiskey, T. B. Handlev, of Hillsboro, being attorney for defense. The druggist was convicted and Handlev offered Huston a position in his law office at Hillsboro. He came to Hillsboro in February, 1884, where he has since been engaged in the practice of law. He was married in June 1884 to Miss Ella Geiger, of Forest Grove. In 1888 he was a candidate for state senator against Hon. T. H. Tongue, and although defeated ran ahead of his ticket. In 1892 he again opposed Mr. Tongue, and this time was successful, having been elected by 157 majority.

In the senate he was a consistent advocate of economy in appropriations. During the first session of the legislature an Act passed giving \$40,000 to the state militia in addition to the fixed amount previously provided for. Also an Act appropriating \$60,000 for an exhibit at the World's fair. Both of these bills were vetoed by the governor. He voted against these bills in the first instance and voted to sustain the governor, but they were passed over the governor's veto. The legislature also passed an Act providing for an Eastern Oregon Insane Asylum and appropriated \$175,000 therefor. He voted against this and when the general appropriation bill was brought in it was so grossly extravagant he would not vote for it.

He also took an active part in the amendment of assessment laws, and it is due to him as much as to any other member that we have our present system of collecting taxes, by which all taxes are levied and collected upon one assessment and one collection. He also voted for the bill placing the county officers on salary. The bill was a senate bill and he fixed the officers salaries of Washington county as follows: Recorder, \$1500; Sheriff, \$2000; Clerk, \$1800; with a deputy for each one at a salary of \$600 a year. In this shape the bill passed the senate and went to the house.

It was there amended so that the clerk of this county should receive \$2200 and the sheriff \$2500, and their deputies were raised to \$800 per year each. The recorder's salary was not changed. If the bill had been allowed to pass the house without amendment, so far as applied to Washington county, there would have been a saving to the taxpayers of this county of \$1300 a year on the offices of clerk and sheriff.

But Simon and McGinn were in control of the senate and

were determined not to allow it to become a law but insisted on senate bill No. 1, known as the McGinn bill, and which took effect at once. The result was that a lobby was organized against the McGinn bill, which only effected Multnomah county, and it was defeated and the people got no law at all.

Mr. Huston has no doubt that a bill can be passed easily reducing the salaries if it does not go into effect as to those holding offices at the time. If it does do so, however, it is sure to meet with a very determined opposition.

In the campaign of 1894 a great deal was said about reform and economy and a great many pledges were made with regard to it. After the election most members forgot their pledges, but not so with Mr. Huston. He voted against every one of the extravagant appropriations made by the legislature.

On February 5, 1896, the Daily Oregonian published a tabulated statement of all the bills carrying appropriations of money which passed the last legislature, with a table showing how each member voted upon each one of those bills, and showing the total amount of money voted for by each member. The name of the member voting for the greatest amount of appropriations was placed at the top of the list. The next highest second on the list, etc., with the name of the member voting for the smallest amount placed at the bottom of the list and that name was Huston. Showing that he was the most careful and economical member of either branch of the legislature. It would seem that the people if they are really in earnest when they ask for economy—and they certainly are—ought to emphasize their desire in this respect by returning Mr. Huston to the senate by a large majority. Where so many men forgot their pledges, one who remembered his pledges ought to be remembered by the voters.

Mr. Huston did not seek a nomination—in fact, he tried earnestly to avoid it, as those who participated in the convention well know. Having been nominated, however, it is but natural that he should desire a verdict of approval of his course in the legislature. If re-elected, he will pursue the same course that he has in the past. He will oppose all appropriations of money except those that are absolutely necessary. He will assist by voice and vote in repealing the laws providing for useless commissions. During the last session he and other members from this county, particularly Mr. Gates, made an earnest effort to repeal what is known as the Act creating the railroad commission. If re-elected he will renew that fight. While he voted for the present assessment law and considers it an improvement over the old one, yet he realizes that it works an injustice in many cases and allows a great deal of property to escape taxation and will gladly assist in an effort to remedy these evils.

At the beginning of the last legislature the State Dairy Association met in Salem to prepare a bill in the interest of the protection of their business from bo us butter, cheese, etc. After they had agreed upon their bill relative to oleomargarine, Mr. Huston went before the association and suggested an amendment making the law more effective. The association at once adopted the suggestion and substituted the section off-red, in place of their own. He then labored earnestly for the passage of the bill as submitted by the Dairy Association and with assistance secured its passage; but for some reason the governor vetoed it. He is ready to renew the fight for this bill.

In the election of a United States Senator, he will try to represent the sentiment of the people who elect him, believing that it is his duty to represent the people and not simply his own views.
