HENRY GARDNER IS KILLED

A Tree Falls on Him While Working in the Timber—William Wilkins in Limbo.

The Fourth of July will be duly celebrated by Hillsboro, and with the races as well, it will be a great day. The declaration of Independence will be read, Hon. T. J. Cleaton, of St. Helens, our next District Attorney, will deliver the oration. There will be music galore, and plenty of fireworks. At the Fair grounds in the forenoon there will be bicycle races, foot races, 100 yards free for all, and a race for boys under 15. The traditional greased pig and climbing the greased pole will be on the program and the public will be warranted a good time in every respect. In the afternoon the races at the track will come off on the regular program, and the day will be one of varied change.

Efforts are being made to procure the McMinnville band and if it be not otherwise engaged it will be on hand for the day.

Henry Gardner Killed.

R. C. Hollenbeck, of Mountaineer, was in the city Tuesday, and detailed to THE ARGUS a sad accident which Monday evening, between 3:00 and 4:00 p.m. Henry Gardner, one of Dairy Creek's most respected farmers, was out falling a cedar tree out of which he intended to make posts. After having sawed the tree off it fell against some tall dry fir, which were dead, one of which in the rebound, broke and fell on Mr. Gardner, breaking an arm, a leg, and his back.

His youngest son, who was with him at the time of the accident, gave the alarm, and the injured man was immediately removed to the house, but he soon expired.

Mr. Gardner was a substantial citizen, a careful prudent farmer, and was in fair circumstances. He leaves a wife and three boys, one of which is now about grown to manhood. For about twenty years he had lived in the locality where he met his death and his honest character had made him a large circle of friends who keenly felt his ending and sympathize with the stricken family.

CROP REPORT.

WESTERN OREGON.

Crops—Sheepshearing is about over. The correspondent from St. Paul, Marion county, reports a case of two sheep giving 36 pounds of wool. The wool lately clipped is better than that clipped in May for the warm sunshine brought out the oil.

Hops are growing rapidly. Many are to the top of the poles already. Those yards which have been well worked have an excellent appearance. The hop house has made its appearance in the town, except on the bottom land along the Columbia, and in this section planting cannot be done until the water subsides. Potatoes in the overflow district can be planted as late as July 10 and make good yield. Tomatoes are in bloom in the southern counties, and peas are ripe. Cabbage, cauliflower, onions, etc., are all growing finely. The weather is most favorable to all vegetation.

Fruit—Cherries are ripe. The injurious effects of the phenomenal April frosts and late cool rains, extending almost to June 1, are now showing most plainly. The cherry crop has been seriously damaged. Peaches, which at the time were reported in these bulletins as having been injured, have not in moved. The peach crop was more seriously injured than ever before. The serious injury extends to apricots, pears and apples. Some fruit continues to drop, and there appears to be no hope for the fruit crop. The frosts injured the buds, the cold rain prevented pollinating and killed the embryo fruit. April and May are the critical months for fruit, and this year was the exception to the saying that the weather in Oregon never injures fruit. Strawberries are ripening rapidly and the markets are filled with them. Berries of all kinds are prolific, and a large amount of new stalk is growing for the crop next year. Many apple growers are in hope that the injury to the crop this year will prove a blessing, for it will cause extra care to be taken with the crop that will mature, and possibly the ravages of the insects may be lessened, and to a great extent destroyed.
