BRYAN HAS THREE
PARTY NOMINATIONS

FOR THE PRESIDENCY

Silver Men and Populists
Name the Nebraskan

THE GOLD STANDARD DEMOCRATS

Will Probably put up a Platform and Candidate—Bryan's Nomination Unites the Silver Forces and a Sturdy Fight Will Eleet Him.

The free silver party and the populists have held their conventions at St. Louis and Hon. William Jennings Bryan, of Nebraska, and democratic nominee, had the honor of being nominated by both bodies. His nomination by the populists was effected on the first ballot after a long and tedious fight for position by the factions for and against. They had previously put up Hon. Thomas E. Watson for Vice-President. Watson was at one time a representative democrat of Georgia.

All who are opposed to the gold standard in this county are ardent for Bryan with a few notable exceptions. The Independent, which in 1895 vigorously opposed the gold standard and insisted such a system meant "the spoliation of hundreds of thousands for the benefit of the few," will, it is reported, not support the democratic nominee. The Hatchet, also a free silver publication, will come out for gold and McKinley. It is whispered, however, that the editors of those family journals are following the gold standard policy for the reason they have been for several months vigorously coached by the head of the republican party of this county. Both papers are on record and their action is rather notorious, considering it is such a short time since they espoused the cause of the people. It is held by many that old Washington county will give a majority for Bryan, but the republicans are preparing to put up the fight of their lives. However, their strongest campaigners will spend the most of their time explaining why in 1895 they were so loudly abusing a gold standard man on the strength of his financial views.

If the gold standard democrats conclude to put up a ticket, it is a sure proposition that it will hold eastern support which otherwise go to McKinley. A set of electors may be placed in the field and if any are elected they might be thrown to the Major in return for the eulogy of the democratic administration contained in the republican platform.

As the situation now is, Bryan's election seems almost assured.

As Mr. Tongue has his certificate of election, the burden of proof will lay upon his opponent, and the hearing will be held before the house of representatives a long while hence.

NOT-THE BRIGHT-
EST PROSPECT

FOR A LARGE CROP

Late Sown Grain Almost
A Failure.

WINTER WHEAT A GOOD YIELD

Farmers are Requested to Send in Their Exhibits That Oregon and Washington County may Have Representation at St. Paul.

WESTERN OREGON.

The hay harvest is practically over, and correspondents, quite generally, report the crop above the average. This condition is due to the May and early June rains. The hay was cut and stacked or put into barns without one drop of rain falling on any of it.

Fall wheat harvest is well under way, and in sections, threshing has commenced. The yield has not been to the average, though yields of thirty bushels and more are reported from many counties. The grain is quite plump and will generally grade as No. 1 wheat. In sections, the berry is somewhat shrunken, due to the hot, dry weather. Barley and oats are also being harvested, and they are about an average. The grain, wheat and oats, sown after May 1, is very poor and some of it will not make good hay. That sown after June 10th will not be fit to cut. The season is now so far advanced that even should rain fall, the crops would be but little, if any, benefited. Grain that was properly sown before January 1st is making very good yields. There have been years when such grain has made heavier yields; that sown after January 1st is not so good, and that sown after May 1st is not worth much for anything. Good farming will produce good crops, even under such phenomena as have prevailed this past season, but poor farming under very favorable conditions seldom pays.

Peaches are ripe in the weather conditions in the blooming period were so adverse that the peach crop will be materially below the average. In places there will be few peaches, in others a very fair crop. Early apples are ripening. The apple crop will not be an average, though there will be no failure, and should all apples be well taken care of, there will be an average crop for the market. The prune crop will not be an average one. Some varieties will yield very well while others will be almost a failure. The pear crop will be a fairly good one. The berry crop is, and has been, very fair, though the dry period has cut the expected yield materially. As a whole the fruit crop will not be an average one for Oregon, though as compared with Eastern fruit yields it will be a good one. A clearer explanation of this point is as follows: Some two years ago the director made a trip to the country and in a cherry orchard found on one tree three men busily engaged picking cherries. The question was asked: "I thought your cherry crop was a failure, and see you have three pickers on one tree, how is this?" The reply was: "I usually have six men on a tree, picking for the market, for wishing to pick and market as quickly as possible I have three men who can pick the cherries this year, there are so few cherries on the tree." The tree was fairly well filled but was not propped and guyed up as is so often done to prevent the limbs from breaking. Compared to Eastern fruit yields there is a very good fruit crop in general; compared with the usual Oregon fruit yields there is a poor crop, and in those exceptional places which are always found, the fruit yield is poor.

Hops are in burl. There is not much attention paid to hop yards this year, and unless there is an advance in prices many will not pick from their yards. Corn is growing very well and is now in tassel. The warm weather was very favorable to its growth. It would be benefited by rain. Gardens are greatly in need of rain. Onions are doing fairly well. Melons are growing and will make a good crop. Early planted potatoes are in good condition, while those sown late will make a small crop. Vineyards are very promising and unless something unforeseen should occur, the yield of grapes will be good. There are no conditions present to-day which indicate rain or any material changes from the current weather conditions.
