DEATH OF J. H. FREEMAN.

Occurs Early Thanksgiving Morning. John H. Freeman, well-known in Washington county, died at an early hour this morning at the residence of his mother, Mrs. H. A. Freeman. Deceased was a native of this county and grew to manhood near this city. His generous impulsive nature made and held him a large circle of friends. For several years he has studied dentistry and was about to take his degree when ill health overtook him. He had been a member of Phoenix Lodge, K. of P. for some time.

Mr. Freeman had the appearance of unusually good health until last spring when an attack of pneumonia undermined his health so that he never recovered, consumption setting in. Deceased was 23 years, 7 months and 25 days in age when he passed to the silent beyond from whence none return.

A Dairy Country.
 It would appear that the people of this county are not alive to the adaptability of soil and climate for dairy purposes. The most prosperous farmers we have are those who are interested in the dairy business. It is just as expensive to keep poor stock as it is to keep good strains and the difference in the profits of one year alone will about pay the difference in value between a poor cow and a good dairy animal. Butter has always a market and if the price is somewhat low in summer the extra price of winter more than makes up summer values. Where many of our farmers are running each year at a loss or standstill in raising grains, they could be making their farms paying investments by stocking them with good dairy strains. What this county needs is a few good co-operative creameries where patrons find sale for their product and receive the benefit of the creamery profit at the same time. The time is coming when we will have many of these institutions.

Returned From Alaska.
 D. McCanish and Andrew Miller returned Thursday last from an all summer's visit to Cook's Inlet, Alaska. In company with Geo. Miller, they left Hillsboro early last spring and arrived in the Inlet late in April. For several weeks they prospected and then came back this way from the Inlet 150 miles where they went to work for a Boston Company which is making preparations to do some extensive mining next year. They worked for this company for about 80 or 90 days at \$3.00 per day and then left for Oregon to spend the winter. Mr. McCanish states that his health has been much improved by his trip. He says there was one little settlement of Russians near where they last were, who had farms on which they raised vegetables and kept a few cows. These cows, he says, are stunted little creatures, not standing much higher than our yearlings. Grass grows very abundant up there and the settlement and plenty of milk and butter to sell.
