Some Resolutions. At a meeting of the Patriots of America, No. 3, of Forest Grove, Washington county, Oregon, called for the purpose of expressing the views of the members thereof upon the condition of affairs in the Oregon legislature the following resolutions were adopted, to-wit:

Whereas, We regret the inability of the house of representatives of the Oregon legislature to effect an organization; and fully realizing the value of time lost for the much needed legislation, particularly the cutting down of extravagant expenses, by reducing existing high salaries and fees, and by abolishing numerous unnecessary tax eating commissions and other offices and being confident that our representatives desire to conform to and carry out the wishes of their constituents in a just and honorable manner, without compromising their dignity and self respect; and

Resolved, That we earnestly request the minority representatives to make all reasonable and honorable efforts to effect a speedy organization, conformably to their honor and dignity as representatives of the people of Oregon, and with a due regard to the rights of a minority against the coercive power of a majority. And be it further Resolved, That we, speaking for the bimetallic party and reform cause, declare that no representative of the people should compromise himself in the interest of any man for United States senator where by the legislation for the people may be clogged and their interests suffer;

Resolved further, That we endorse so far the action taken by the minority to secure organization upon honorable terms, and have full confidence in their future action.
