PROF. G. W. SHAW
OF CORVALLIS
O. A. C. CHEMISTTALKS TO THE
BOARD OF TRADE.

On Beet Culture Monday Evening—A Very Interesting Address—Seed Will be Planted Under The Direction of The Oregon Agricultural College.

Hillsboro's Board of Trade had a very interesting and enthusiastic meeting Monday evening. There was present with them, Professor of Chemistry, G. W. Shaw, of the Oregon Agricultural College, of Corvallis, who addressed the members on the subject of sugar beet culture and its attendant needs. He stated that seed would be furnished our Board of Trade for distribution amongst our farmers and that the crop would be raised this year under the direction of the Agricultural College. The Board of Trade, of course, will exercise its judgment in the proper distribution and only those who will strive to give culture its proper attention will be recipients. Printed directions will be furnished and if these are properly complied with good results are confidently expected. Mr. Shaw thought that the chances for a beet sugar factory in the Willamette valley in the near future were very bright and that Washington county had as good a chance as any to secure the prize. He was asked if he thought the failure of the legislature to pass a bounty law on the manufacture of beet sugar would lessen the chances of starting the industry and he replied that he did not so think. Mr. Shaw was asked some questions relative to the raising of flax, but replied that he was the "sugar beet crank," while Mrs. W. P. Lord, wife of the governor, was interested in fostering flax culture. The meeting was a very instructive one and will be productive of much good.

County And State.

This office has received the biennial report of State Treasurer Metcalf and the volume is replete with valuable information. The balance in the treasury on January 1st was over \$368,000, of which nearly \$200,000 belongs to the state school fund. The balances show that Washington county yet owes on the University tax of 1892, \$443.08; current expense tax of 1895, \$8,700; total \$9,143.08.
