WILL WE CELEBRATE

Independence Day in Appropriate Manner.

MAYOR BARRETT ISSUES A CALL

For a Public Meeting Saturday Night to Decide Future Action.—Will Answer the Veterans.

As yet there has been no concerted action in Hillsboro towards having a Fourth of July Celebration. Two years ago this city gave a grand celebration which was only handicapped by an incessant rain. However as the rain was a blessing for the farmers, no one thought of complaining of the elements. Last year we had no celebration, and there are many who want to make the coming Fourth a jubilee. It is desirable that a committee be appointed, consisting of good rustling citizens, who will carry the matter through in a successful manner. The Washington County Veteran Association will hold its executive meeting at Beaverton on the first Thursday in May to consider the time and place of holding its annual encampment and its officers desire a proposition from the various towns of the county.

As this encampment is almost necessary to a successful celebration it is deemed of some importance. Everybody likes to have the old veterans and their families present on festive occasions, and as they were treated nicely while here two years ago, another visit to Hillsboro would not be objectionable to them. THE CHAUTAUQUANS

Will Again Convene at Gladstone.

TROUBLE IN A SCHOOL DISTRICT

Teacher Sues for His Salary.—Prominent Hillsboro Young Couple are Married.

The Board of Directors of the Willamette Valley Chautauqua Association at Oregon City are making great preparations for the Fourth Annual Assembly to be held at Gladstone Park in July. Many distinguished speakers have been engaged already among which may be noted Edward Page Gaston of Chicago, the Mexican traveler, explorer and journalist who will give his two great lectures on Cuba and Mexico with ample illustrations collected on the field; Miss Ida Benney, of New York City, who has a brilliant record as a story teller, one of the hardest fields in which to excel. Miss Benney was one of the chief attractions at the old New York Chautauqua last summer; A. W. Lamar, of Georgia, one of the wittiest and most realistic speakers on the old and new south; Miss Ray Frank, of Oakland, California, a talented Jewish lady, the only ordained woman Rabbi in the world. Many other notables are under consideration and will be announced later. Of local talent the list is only begun, among them may be noted a lecture by President Hawley, of Willamette University; one by Prof. Edgar McClure, of State University, on the Acetylene Light; Prof. Whittlesey, of Pacific University on German universities from which he has just returned; Prof. J. B. Horner, of the State Agricultural College, on Robert Burns with appropriate Caledonian accessories; one on Gettysburg, by Gen. Compson, and many others under consideration. The Chemical Society of the Northwest, comprising Oregon, Washington and Idaho will hold their annual session on the Chautauqua ground.

The musical department promises to be unusually strong with Prof. R. A. Heritage of Salem, Conservator of music as Director; two soloists of note are already engaged, Mrs. Hest Mark, of California and Mrs. Brooks, of Eugene; others will be added. Two quartettes from Pacific University, trained by Mrs. Walter Reed will be present and others will be added. Prof. Hilgden, of Vancouver, Washington, just returned from Leipzig is expected to make a forte with his violin. Negotiations are in progress with the best bands of the northwest. The various colleges, religious denominations, scientific and educational bodies are already arranging for headquarters. Many events of the first magnitude are not yet sufficiently matured for public announcement.

Four thousand people were in daily attendance last year and not less than 6000 daily is counted on as the probable average the coming season. The low rates of admission, board etc., the exceptionally good facilities for travel, the pleasures of camping in proximity of the chief cities of the state make this a favored spot for a great Chautauqua and its phenomenal growth from year to year proves the wisdom of its projectors in securing the best talent of the nation to appear upon its already classic platform.
