INTERESTING RECORD

First Instruments Filed in This County.

A BILL OF SALE OF A SLAVE

A Primitive Deed in a Condition of Which Appears the Name of Stephen Holcomb.

Old records are not usually of much interest, but the first miscellaneous instrument filed in this county, April 13, 1854, is worthy of reproduction. Here it is as it appears of record:

D. Snowden to Jane Thomas: Know all men by these presents, that for and in consideration of the sum of five hundred dollars, to me in hand paid by Jane Thomas, late Jane Snowden, a free woman of color, the receipt whereof is hereby confessed and acknowledged, I, David Snowden, of the county of Ray, in the state of Missouri, have bargained, sold and delivered to her the said Jane Thomas, late Jane Snowden, a free woman of color, one certain negro boy slave named Billy, aged about eleven years and son of the said Jane Snowden, late Jane Snowden, a free woman of color. This sale is made to gratify the said Jane Thomas the mother of the said negro boy Billy, as she is about to emigrate to Oregon and wishes to take the boy with her. Given under my hand and seal this 17th day of December, A. D. 1852.

DAVID SNOWDEN.

The foregoing instrument is acknowledged before a Missouri county clerk. The first deed of land is a bill of sale of town property and made as follows:

Know all men by these presents that I Jobe McName of the town of Portland county of Washington and territory of Oregon, grocery dealer, for and in consideration of the sum of six hundred dollars to me in hand paid by Jane Thomas, late Jane Snowden, a free woman of color, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, have bargained, sold and delivered to her the said Jane Thomas, late Jane Snowden, a free woman of color, one certain negro boy slave named Billy, aged about eleven years and son of the said Jane Snowden, late Jane Snowden, a free woman of color. This sale is made to gratify the said Jane Thomas the mother of the said negro boy Billy, as she is about to emigrate to Oregon and wishes to take the boy with her. Given under my hand and seal this 17th day of December, A. D. 1852.

JOBE MCNAME.

McName, according to a condition attached, is to have the property back provided he pays "six hundred dollars" with ten per cent per annum from date it being the amount of a note given to Stephen A. Holcomb bearing the following date, San Francisco August 16th, 1849, and due twelve months from the above date and to be paid in gold or silver with the said 10 per cent interest and without defalcation.

IN CLOSE QUARTERS

A Chicken Thief Captured by Ed. Thomas.

MANY SHOTS ARE FIRED BY EACH

Hollenbeck Escapes From the County Jail and is Yet at Large—A Change of Offices.

Early Wednesday morning, Ed. Thomas, who lives near Beaverton, discovered that during the night his chicken house had been raided and robbed of its feathered crowd. Going to the road, he noted a peculiar wagon tire track—rounded, as it were—and Mr. Thomas armed himself and commenced to track its course. He traced it through Beaverton and back the Hillsboro road to near the Perkins' farm, where the conveyance had turned abruptly into an old road leading into the brush. The pursuer then went on to the Perkins' farm and succeeded in getting an employee to go with him to make the capture. The two went into the brush and found the thief. He had unlatched and built a fire, and was laying on some loose hay. Mr. Thomas covered him with a gun and ordered him to throw up his hands, whereupon the Perkins' employee relieved the raider of his revolver and placed it in his hip pocket. Mr. Thomas then commenced to look for something to tie the prisoner, and so informed his listeners. The thief thereupon jumped to the back of the young man who had taken his gun away, grabbed the revolver out of his pocket and took a shot at him, but the bullet went astray. Shooting the bay horse through the flesh above the withers, the bullet passing clear through. Thomas then opened fire and the stranger commenced backing away toward the brush. After several shots had been exchanged the fellow broke for the dense woods and succeeded in making his escape.

Mr. Thomas went to Beaverton and telephoned Sheriff Bradford, who in company with Constable F. J. Williams, repaired to the scene of the shooting. The man could not be found, but the team and chickens were still there. They hooked up the team, took Thomas' chickens back home and brought the horses and wagon up to this city, where they now are held at the City Livery. The wagon is an old contrivance, with rounded tires and is of 3 inch build. The horses are pony build. One is a bay gelding—the one shot, seven years old. The other is a black mare with some white hairs showing through, and is about nine years old. The man is described as being short in stature, not very heavy, swarthy and with dark moustache. He appears about 45 years of age and resembles a "Dago." Mr. Thomas feels sure that he hit him but no blood could be found to support the theory.

Sheriff Bradford will leave the team at the barn until identified and requests people to see them with a view to identification. The fellow offered to give his team and wagon to Mr. Thomas to square the theft, but as his offer was rejected he evidently thought he could afford to lose his outfit if he saved his liberty.

Hollenbeck Breaks Jail.

H. B. Hollenbeck, who in March was tried for rape, the jury disagreeing, and who has since been confined in the county jail, made a successful break for liberty some time during the darkness of Monday night. The old man's bonds had been fixed by Judge McBride at \$500, and failing to give surety, he was waiting trial—or a chance to take leg bail. The escape had cut a hole in the east end of the lower wall, close to the northeast corner, gently kicked off the clapping-board, and breathed freedom. Sheriff Bradford's dog made considerable fuss and was heard by Bradford's family. However, they thought nothing of it and rested easy, until a few hours after, John Moore, one of the inmates of the jail, awakened and missing the prisoner, sounded the alarm. The Portland police were notified and searchers sent out to capture the refugee but to no avail.

Hollenbeck had been allowed the freedom of the jail corridor and made his escape with but very little exertion. The officers have no idea as to which way he went, but are watching the points most likely to be visited. He has a son in California, and some think he proposes going to that state.

The state had an unusually strong case against him, but somehow the jury could not agree upon a verdict. It is said the prosecution had discovered new evidence for the next trial and as Hollenbeck has broke jail, many who once believed him innocent, now think the defendant believed he would be convicted at the next trial and consequently courted freedom.
